Chance of national consensus slim

Invited 30 parties, 15 trade bodies divided over joining the dialogue

The prime minister until yesterday invited 30 political parties and 15 professional bodies to a national dialogue on combating terrorism, but with the invitees clearly divided over the issue little possibility is there of striking a national consen-

Except Jatiya Party (JP-Ershad), the mainstream opposition parties and opposition-backed professional associations refused outright to join the dialogue, while the ruling alliance partners, some minor political parties and progovernment professional bodies

accepted the invitation.

Cabinet body rejects losing road contract

Turns down inflated health ministry proposal, okays 4



A meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Purchase yesterday rejected a communications ministry proposal for awarding a Tk 9 crore contract to a private firm to collect Tk 8 crore in revenues for the government.

The proposal projecting a Tk 1 crore loss was for contracting a certain private company to operate and maintain the 74km Jagadishpur-Sherpur segment of the Dhaka-Sylhet highway and also

proposal grossly flawed. One of them said, "Firstly, how can they want to pay this contractor Tk 9 crore when the income from this road is Tk8 crore? Then, as this is an operation and maintenance contract, why there is no description of what maintenance tasks will be undertaken?'

The cabinet committee directed the communications ministry to either reduce the contract amount to a reasonable level or to scrap the whole idea and run the toll centre SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

Natwar finally CEC keeps on kicking quits cabinet up controversies OUR CORRESPONDENT, New Delhi

The chief election commissioner (CEC) is taking all decisions unilaterally on preparing a fresh voter list for the next parliamentary polls bypassing the Election Commission (EC) and keeping the two election commissioners in the

The CEC decided on his own to make a fresh voter list and completed all preparations ignoring the objections of the two commissioners. Finally on Tuesday, the EC secretariat under his directive declared a timetable for preparing the list without consulting them.

The unilateral move and decisions of CEC MA Aziz has apparently turned the EC into a dysfunctional body, creating controversies over the preparation of voter list, the first vital task for holding the next parliamentary election.

"We don't know what is going on in the name of the Election

Commission," Election Commissioner AK Mohammad Ali told The Daily Star. "Nothing is being done in accordance with the decisions of the commission," he

The secretary of the EC, who boycotted the EC meetings for about two years during the tenure of immediate past CEC MA Syed, has become very close to the incumbent CEC and is playing significant role in the present tuation, sources said.

Without consulting his two colleagues or discussing it at EC meeting, MA Aziz has been speaking for the last few months about a set of proposals for reform of the

"We never discussed the issue of reforms at the Election Commission meeting," Mohammad Ali said when asked about the reform pro-
