HC halts jetty building on Cox's Bazar sea beach

Asks govt to prove legality

UNB, Dhaka

The High Court (HC) yesterday ordered the government to refrain from constructing a jetty at the Cox's Bazar-Teknaf sea beach.

A HC division bench comprising Justice MA Matin and Justice M Rezaul Haque issued an interim injunction. It also asked the government and other authorities concerned to explain why the decision to construct the jetty for commercial purposes in the eco-logically critical area (ECA) should not be considered unlawful.

The injunction and the rule came upon a public interest litigation (PIL) writ filed by the Bangladesh Environment Lawyers' Association (Bela) challenging the SEE PAGE 15 COL 8

Ershad backs out of party presidium proposals

Jatiya Party (Ershad) reportedly under duress of the prime minister's office refrained from accusing Jamaat-e-Islami of harbouring militants at the dialogue yesterday and instead proposed a judicial inquiry into the allegations of militant links against a section of the ruling alliance.

Rare species of birds, animals seized in raid on pet market

A Forest Department team in a drive yesterday recovered 127 different rare species of wild birds and three monkeys from the Kataban pet market in the city. The team led by Dhaka Divisional Forest Officer Md Abdul

Latif recovered 40 parakeets of two species--rose-ringed and blossomheaded, 12 partridges, 21 hill mynas, 31 spotted doves, a kite and a purple moorhen. The team also recovered three rhesus monkeys from the market.

However, the bird traders had fled the market with a number of rare birds as they had come to know about the raid beforehand, Forest Department sources said.

The birds and animals recovered in the raid have been kept at SEE PAGE 15 COL 2

Sensing an imminent defeat, the Pakistani occupation army and their local collaborators -- Razakar, Al-Badr and Al-Shams -- abducted frontline Bengalee intellectuals and professionals on December 14 in 1971 and killed them to cripple the nation intellectually

The killers dragged renowned academics, litterateurs, doctors, engineers, journalists and other eminent personalities out of their houses in Dhaka and massacred them at Rayerbazar, Mirpur and other killing fields in the city.

The martyred intellectuals include Prof Muneir Chowdhury,

import through Benapole land port PM announces at knitwear expo

Govt to allow yarn

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday announced that the government will allow knitwear manufacturers to import yarn from India through Benapole land port, a longstanding demand of the apparel manufacturers and exporters.

"All necessary steps will be taken to reopen the land port as soon as possible to facilitate the growing [knitwear] sector," she said at the inaugural ceremony of the second Bangladesh Knitwear Exposition 2005 at Dhaka Sheraton

The prime minister's announcement came as a relief to the apparel exporters who have been demanding reopening of the land port for import of yarn from

The government banned yarn import through Benapole land port in March 2001 to prevent unscrupulous businessmen from importing or smuggling yarn by taking advantage of inadequate infrastructure facility at the land port.
