Goldman Sachs, a US-based investment banking and securities firm, in a report on world's potential economies has placed Bangladesh on its "Next Eleven" list as a key member.

WORLD POTENTIAL ECONOMY

The report said, "Bangladesh, the world's tiny economy with most corrupt brand, will power the global economy something of the magnitude of the BRICs economies."

The "Next Eleven" is the second term the Goldman Sachs has coined to describe economies with high growth potential, such as the "BRICs" economies encompassing Brazil, Russia, India and China.

Bangladesh on Goldman

Comparing the 22 economies of the G7, BRICs and Next Eleven, the report said Bangladesh will grow faster than predicted earlier. The main reason for the change in projection is the faster growth seen

The criteria for the Next Eleven list included macroeconomic stability, political maturity, openness of trade and investment policies and quality of education.

The other countries on the list are Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, South Korea, Mexico, Nigeria, Pakistan, the Philippines, Turkey and Vietnam.

Sources said Jamaat's Amir Motiur Rahman Nizami also the minister of industries has been consulting with his party policy makers regarding the party's position in context of the current developments. The anxiety has also spread to different levels of leaders who are asking the policy makers

about the party's future plan of action.

The party top brass who met on a number of occasions in the last few days also considered the vote matrix in case they have to contest the next elections alone. They also discussed how BNP might fare in the next elections if it chooses to contest the elections without Jamaat.

Opposition Sheikh Hasina at Awami League office in Dhanmondi, the families said they fear of departing the country if Jamaat is not banned. Hasina assured them that she


would fight against those, who opposed the country's Liberation War, until her death.
