Bomb scare forces Indian parliament to adjourn abruptly

The Indian security establishment was plunged into a tizzy yesterday following a bomb scare on the parliament premises here, after which the sessions had to be abruptly abandoned and Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, his cabinet colleagues and hundreds of members of Lok Sabha and Raiva Sabha were escorted out.

Both houses of the parliament were adjourned at about 11:48am SEE PAGE 15 COL 6 during the question hour, soon after

Speaker Somnath Chatterjee and . Rajya Sabha Chairman Bhairon Singh Shekhawat had received communications to the effect that a bomb had been planted somewhere on the parliament premises.

Bomb disposal squads of the Army and the elite National Security Guards, which were promptly called in, searched the entire parliament complex for possible explosives and gave an all-clear signal after about an hour and a half.
