Manpower export low as ME demand drops

Govt fails to explore new market

PORIMOL PALMA

High cost of migration coupled with failure to explore new markets and the country's foreign missions' apathy towards emigrant workers are thwarting the promotion of manpower export and bringing reduction in benefits for the workers abroad, experts observe.

The government has not taken any significant initiative to explore new markets while manpower export to traditional markets like the Middle Eastern countries is declining and an unhealthy competition among the recruiting agencies is increasing the cost of migration.

A worker now pays Tk 2 to 2.3 lakh for a job of a cleaner in Saudi Arabia at a salary of 350 Riyal (Tk 5,600) whereas the cost was Tk 1.4 to 1.7 lakh only a few months ago. said sources in the Bangladesh Association for International Recruiting Agencies (Baira).

The crises have been aggravated as the importing countries are now encouraging the employers to hire their own unemployed youths coining the terms like Saudiaization, Omanization, Emiratization, etc. of

their workforces

According to the Bureau of Manpower, Employment and Training (BMET), the KSA alone employed almost 72.48 percent of total manpower exported from Bangladesh in 2002, the number came down to 35.60 percent during January to September this year.

The massive decline in Saudi demand has pushed down overall manpower export 15.45 percent in 2005 compared to 2004.

Height limits ignored

by high-rise builders

Strict height limits throughout the city, particularly in Dhanmondi and Lalmatia, are silently being undermined by builders, causing frustration to residents and confusion among Rajuk officials.

According to the Ministry of

Housing and Public Works, nobody is allowed to construct above six storeys in residential areas throughout the city. Despite tremendous pressure from the landowners, especially on the four declared commercial roads of Road-2, Satmasjid Road, Sheikh Kamal Avenue and Mirpur Road, the ministry had remained firm about the neight limit in both the areas

The ministerial notification on the height limit was served on the basis that if the height limit goes up, the density of population would be too much for the existing amenities such as water, gas, electricity, telephone, sewerage and road But recently things have silently

changed. In Lalmatia, Rajuk has approved an unspecified number of nine to twelve storey buildings. And every day more high-rise buildings are in the offing throughout the city in violation of the existing policy.

To the 'frustration' of other landowners and residents of Satmasiid Road and Lalmatia, Rajuk has approved, for the first time, a ninestorey structure on Satmasjid Road for a 150-bed hospital called City Hospital. The structure, on the fringe of Block-E of Lalmatia but situated on the Satmasjid Road, is fast nearing completion. The Managing Director of the City Hospital Habibullah told The Daily Star that they had obtained approval from "sixteen different" departments of the government including that of **SEE PAGE 15 COL 7**
