A new variety of onion that can be grown round the year and yields three to four times the existing varieties is being cultivated in some areas of northwestern region of the country.

Production of the new big-size onion ranges from 10 to 13 tonnes per acre against 3-4 tonnes of the other varieties, growers said.

Bangladesh Agriculture Research Institute (Bari) developed the new variety -- Bari-2-3-- through scientific transplantation with imported varieties a couple of years ago. The Northwest Crop Diversification Project (NCDP) funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) has initiated steps for large-scale cultivation of the new variety.

After successful test production, seedlings of the new variety were distributed among the farmers, and around 525 tonnes of onion was produced in the last summer sea-

Experts pointed out that the main advantages of the new variety are its big size and that it can be produced throughout the year, instead

of only in winter as is the case with the existing Faridpuri and Taherpuri costing around Tk 500 crore in foreign currency.
