Sophisticated 3-dimensional Naval Force to be built: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia vesterday said new-tech warships, helicopters and maritime patrol-aircraft will join the naval fleet to build a sophisticated and balanced threedimensional Bangladesh Naval Force.

"Though Bangladesh is not very big in dimension, our maritime boundary is large. Due to geographical location and strategic reason, it is important to ensure well-protection of this boundary and to have all time vigilance in the sea," she told the President's Parade of Bangladesh Naval Force.

The winter parade was organised to mark the successful commissioning of the Midshipmen of Naval Academy's 2004 Alfa Batch.

Khaleda, who is in charge of the Defence Ministry, said despite resource constraints, her government continued efforts to establish a strong Naval Force through its modernisation and enhancement of its capability. Within this short time, five offshore vessels, two Tugs and two-PPM Boats already joined the Bangladesh Navy, she added.

"Our avowed target is to build a modern, efficient and balanced three-dimensional Navy that is in the process," she told the function at the parade ground of Bangladesh

She said the immense responsibility and round-the-clock duty of the naval force "is not only necessary at wartime but also in the rough-wavesea in normal time.' Ministers, MPs, diplomats, chiefs

Naval officers of various levels from Qatar, Palestine, the Maldives, Sri Lanka, India, Pakistan and Turkey are receiving training from this academy, Khaleda said, expressing her happiness to know that four midshipmen of Palestine got also commissions through today's programme. President Iqbal Mahmud Sohel and Assistant Sports Secretary Masum Mia Sohag.

Witnesses said the BCL took out a procession to mark the fourth death anniversary of its leader Ali Martuza Chowdhury who was shot dead alleg-edly by Shibir cadres near his village home at Fateyabad in 2001.

But the Shibir activists suddenly attacked the procession without any provocation, they added.
