Govt's successive failure causes people's miseries
BDB chief tells party activists

Successive failure of BNP-led coalition government in all sectors is mainly responsible for present day miseries of the country, said Bikalpa Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) President Prof AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury yesterday.

"People have become victim of poverty, price hike, terrorism, bomb culture and corruption due to misrule of Khaleda-Nizami alliance government," said the former president while addressing the party activists of Bagerhat at its Baridhara office in the city.

He urged people to get ready for giving a befitting reply in the next general election for the misdeeds of the government.

"The alliance government must be defeated in the election despite its efforts to prepare fake voter lists," he added.

Beg Mahtab Uddin, convenor of Bagerhat District Unit BDB, presided over the meeting where party Secretary General Major (Retd) Abdul Mannan, Organising Secretary Mahi B Chowdhury MP, Vice-president Prof Dr Mozafer Ahmed, and Office Secretary Major (Retd) Sheikh Nadir Ahmed were present.

Eskayef launches drug for prevention of bird flu

Eskayef Bangladesh Ltd., a leading pharmaceutical company, has launched the drug oseltamivir for the first time in the country for the prevention and treatment of bird flu, says a press release.

The brand name of the drug is SK-flu and it is provided in the form of 75mg capsule. The recommended oral dose of SK-flu is 75mg twice daily for five days for treatment and 75mg once daily for 10 days for prevention of bird flu.

Though currently there is no evidence of bird flu virus in Bangladesh, the birds can be easily affected by the virus through migratory birds. If the virus starts spreading inside this densely populated country, with inadequate medical infrastructure and lack of proper preparedness, a large number of virus-infected deaths may occur, the press release warned.

Considering the emerging threat of bird flu worldwide and the scarcity of its treatment, Eskayef Bangladesh Ltd has taken the initiative to produce SK-flu as a safeguard for the people. The drug will be dispensed on doctor's prescription only.

Bomb hurled at Khulna police outpost

Unknown criminals hurled a bomb at a police outpost under Khan Jahan Ali Police Station around midnight Wednesday in the Khulna city.

The fourteen policemen staying at the Shrimoni police outpost at that time escaped injury. Police sources said the bomb struck the sunshade of a ground-floor window.

The sentry on duty at the gate was alleged to have dozed off when the bomber took the advantage of darkness during a power cut. Bewildered policemen fired some shots in the air and cordoning the area off but failed to arrest anyone.

It may be mentioned that three hours before this incident a bomb was hurled at an Awami League (AL) leader in front of the AL party office at Phulbari Ghat in the city under the same police station.

Bring reforms to edn system to resist imperialism, fanaticism

Speakers tell discussion

Speakers at a discussion yesterday called for bringing reforms to the education system in order to resist imperialism and religious fanaticism and to strengthen the democratic movement in the country.

The political parties and the civil society should make concerted efforts to modernise the madrasa education and revise the university curriculum, they said.

2 Killed in Ctg port accidents

Container handling suspended for 5 hrs

Container handling at the Chittagong Port had been suspended for five hours after the death of a worker in an accident inside the Multi-Purpose Berth (MPB) Yard early yesterday.

A truck assistant was also killed yesterday noon in another accident at the Yard No. 6.

Sources said Saifuzzaman Bakul, 35, son of Shams Uddin of Alapur, Natore, and a tally clerk of a clearing & forwarding (C&F) agent, was crushed under the wheel of a straddle carrier at

around 1.30am at the MPB Yard.

Protesting the incident, port workers staged a demonstration, suspending activities from 2.00am to 7.00am. However, they resumed their activities after the CPA officials assured them of looking into the matter.

Another straddle carrier hit Sumon, a truck assistant, from behind at around 1.00pm yesterday, leaving him dead on the spot.

Police recovered both the bodies and sent to Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) for autopsy.

'Country needs leader like Moni Singh to establish secularism'

Gonotanti Party leader Azizul Islam, Gono Forum leader Shamsuddoha, Awami League leader Nurul Islam Nahid and trust secretary Shekhar Dutta spoke at the meeting held with trust member and President of Sammilito Samajik Andolon Ajay Roy in the chair.

The communist leader died on December 31, 1990.



HC grants ad-interim bail to CPB chief

A High Court (HC) division yesterday granted ad-interim bail to CPB president and its 15 leaders and activists in a case filed by Jatiya Party (JP-Ershad).

The bench comprising Justice Md Abdur Rashid and Justice ATM Fazle Kabir issued the order when Manzurul Ahsan Khan, president of Bangladesh Communist Party (CPB) and 15 others appeared before the HC seeking ad-interim bail.

Barrister Shafiq Ahmed conducted the case on behalf of the accused while Deputy Attorney General Advocate Walir Rahman Khan stood for the state.

Rezaul Islam Bhuiyan, office secretary of JP, filed an attempted murder case against CPB President Manzurul Ahsan Khan, its acting General Secretary Shah Alam and 16 others on January 1.

At a rally at Ashkona Bazaar in Uttra yesterday, the CPB leaders demanded immediate arrest of JP leaders and activists as they threatened to demolish the CPB office.

They also demanded arrest and trial of JP President Md Ershad and other party members as they attacked the CPB rally on January 1.

The speakers also urged all to strengthen the movement against the misrule of the four-party alliance.

Another CPB unit also held a protest rally at Nurjahan Road crossing Mohammadpur.

Meanwhile, the CPB president and the acting general secretary in a joint statement condemned the police firing on the subscribers of Palli Bidduyut Samity in Chapainawabganj on Wednesday that left three people dead and 16 others injured.

They demanded immediate arrest and trial of the police officers involved in the killings and compensation for the treatment of the injured.

Accused tries to commit suicide in court

An accused in a rape case yesterday made an attempt to commit suicide by stabbing himself in a court dock as a Dhaka court rejected his bail petition for the five consecutive dates.

Mohammad Alam, 23, son of Chand Miah under Baksiganj in Jamalpur district, arrested on charge of raping a 14-year-old girl, made the attempt when the court asked his lawyers that the order of granting or rejection on the bail petition would be passed later.

Earlier, Judge Monwara Begum of the Second Special Tribunal for Prevention of Women and Children Repression had rejected Alam's bail prayer five times.

Moving the bail petition, Advocate Kazi M Sajwar Hossain yesterday mentioned that his client was falsely implicated in the case. Moreover, his client is already married to the victim with her consent.

On the other hand, Special Public Prosecutor (SPP) Arfan Uddin Khan opposed it saying that the accused kidnapped the victim and raped her.

After hearing both the sides, the court asked the defence lawyers that she would pass order on completion of all cases fixed yesterday for the BSF.

Soon after the court order, Alam attempted to commit suicide by stabbing in his throat repeatedly.

The court directed the on-duty policemen to send him to a medical for treatment when the SPP drew its attention.

According to the prosecution, Alam along with his two accomplices Mofiz and Masum kidnapped the victim from her residence at Azimpur in the city at about 2:00pm on April 30 last year. Later, the gang took her to a residence at Shikha Shabir Bazar where Alam raped her for two days.

The court directed the on-duty policemen to send him to a medical for treatment when the SPP drew its attention.

'Enact consumer rights protection act soon'

The government should enact the consumer rights protection act immediately to enable the consumers to take legal measures against the producers of sub-standard commodities and adulterated food, speakers at a discussion said yesterday.

They also stressed the need for institutional structure to effectively enforce the law after its enactment.

The Consumers' Association of Bangladesh (CAB) organised the discussion on 'The obstacles to the Consumers' Rights Protection Act (draft)-2004 and our responsibility' at the National Press Club.

The cabinet approved, in principle, the draft act on August 9, 2004 and sent it to the law ministry for scrutiny. The law ministry then raised the number of sections to 83

from 31 and sent it to the commerce ministry, said CAB General Secretary Qazi Farque.

Journalist Borhan Ahmed, president of CAB, presided over the discussion moderated by advocate Syeda Rizwana Hasan, executive director of Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers' Association (BELA).

Awami League lawmaker Faruk Khan said if the AL is voted to power in the next general election, he would try his best to enact the law at the very beginning of the new parliament.

Prof Abu Ahmed, chairman of Bangladesh Shilpa Bank, said only enactment of the law is not enough. An institutional structure is also needed to enforce the law.

In a written statement, CAB General Secretary Qazi Farque said consumers are frequently deprived of their rights. They are forced to

buy products at high prices and also sub-standard commodities. They also receive low-quality service from different service providers.

But due to the absence of a relevant law, they could not take legal measures against the producers of adulterated food, he added.

Major Gen (Retd) Moinul Hossain Chowdhury, Prof SM Al-Hussain, former chairman of Bangladesh Public Service Commission, Dewan Sultan Ahmed, vice-president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry, M Abdul Momen, president of Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Wali-ur-Rahman, director of Bangladesh Institute of Law and International Affairs, and Tushar Rehman, executive director of Karmakutir Foundation, also spoke.

BDR-BSF MEET BEGINS IN SYLHET Smuggling of explosives dominates talks

The three-day meeting between Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and Border Security Force (BSF) of India began in Sylhet yesterday.

BDR Deputy Director General Brigadier General Golam Rabbani and Inspector General of Shillong BSF Srivastava led their respective sides at the meeting.

Different trans-border problems including smuggling of explosives from Indian states into Bangladesh, killing of Bangladeshi nationals by the Indian border guards and armed civilians and harbouring of miscreants dominated the first day meeting.

The Indian officials in the first session agreed to take effective measures to stop smuggling of high-powered explosives and firearms into Bangladesh as the BDR raised the issue with highest importance and sought necessary assistance from the BSF, said an official.

The BDR also raised the issue of killing Bangladeshi civilians by the Indian BSF and armed people while asking for immediate stopping of such incidents.
