





Today Sri Lanka celebrates the 58th Anniversary of Independence. On this

happy occasion I wish to extend my warm greetings to the Government and the people of Bangladesh on behalf of the Government and the people of Sri Lanka.

Since the birth of Bangladesh, Sri Lanka has maintained friendly and co-ordinating relations as two neighbouring countries, who share a common cultural heritage. The Board of Investment of Sri Lanka

The Board of Investment of Sri Lanka celebrated on 8th April 2005 its 27th anniversary. This was a very significant event and a landmark in the economic history of the country. The Board of Investment (BOI) has its origin in the Greater Colombo Economic Commission, which was established in 1978. Fourteen years later, in 1992 the Commission was reconstituted as the Board of Investment of Sri Lanka.

The BOI is structured to function as a central facilitation point for investors. It operates as an autonomous statutory body. It has a Board of Directors drawn from the private and public sectors and several departments that are geared to facilitating the investment process.

Significantly, when you sign an agreement with the BOI, the specific incentives granted to an eligible company which may include tax holidays or preferential tax rates, exemption from customs duty and foreign exchange controls remain valid for the life of the enterprise. Successive governments cannot change the provisions and the spirit of "The Agreement". This is the fundamental strength of a BOI agreement that few other countries can offer or match. In October 2005 a total of 152 projects were approved (under section 17).

The BOI Today


At present there are 1,760 companies that operate under the BOI regime. Their sizes and the scope of their activities vary considerably. A total of 49% are locally owned Sri Lankan investment projects while 24% are foreign owned. Jointly owned projects (i.e. Sri Lankan and Foreign) amount to 27%.

FDI has also grown in value from the previous year. In 2004 Sri Lanka attracted US\$ 234 million in FDI which was the highest figure reached by the BOI without privatizations. While the 2005 figures are not yet fully compiled, a further increase in FDI is expected.

A major objective of the BOI is to promote greater employment opportunities in the country. Companies that operate under the BOI regime currently employ more than 450,000 workers directly. This in turn has led to considerable direct employment opportunities. The major proportion of directly employed worker is now located outside the Board's 12 Export Processing Zones (EPZs). This amount to 332,000 which in turn represents no less than 74% of the total number of workers employed by BOI companies.
