Prime Minister Khaleda Zia files for Islamabad today on a three-day state visit to Pakistan to conclude several deals in diverse areas to promote bilateral cooperation in trade, agriculture and tourism.

Highly placed sources said Bangladesh and Pakistan are expected to sign Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) on agricultural cooperation, promotion of tourism, cooperation between two export promotion bureaus and on standardisation of weights and measures. A bilateral agreement on visa abolition of diplomatic and official passports is also on the cards.

AL returns to JS today

Hasina to place reform proposals for caretaker govt system, EC

Ending a prolonged boycott, the main opposition Awami League (AL) returns to parliament today to place proposals for reforms in the caretaker government system and the Election Commission (EC) that may witness heated debates in the House.

Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina will place the opposition's reform proposals in her address to parliament but Leader of the House Khaleda Zia will not be present at the time of her speech. She leaves for Pakistan on a three-day visit in the afternoon.

This is for the first time in the

last 16 months that the ruling and the main opposition parties are set to face each other in parliament not only over the crucial reform proposals, but also the issues like militancy, price hike, and the crises of power, fuel and fertilisers.

The opposition will also protest strongly the much-talked-about bill to amend the Telecommunication Act, which will be passed in the House today allowing the law enforcement agencies to tap telephonic conversations of users.

The main opposition party walked out of parliament on September 15, 2004 as its demand for holding a discussion on the August 21 grenade attacks adjourned.

The Jatiya Sangsad holds a general discussion and adopts a censure motion today on the issue of the Danish cartoons satirising the Prophet Hazrat Muhammad (SM).

AL chief Sheikh Hasina has already prepared her speech and will issue an ultimatum to the government to meet the opposition's demand for reforms. The government is however rigid on its negative stance on the caretaker government reforms.

Several AL lawmakers have submitted notices demanding discussions on fuel and power crises, price hike of essentials and the appointment of two election commissioners.

Govt loses crores of taka to sluggish ADP

34 donor-aided projects spent only 16pc fund in Jul-Dec as govt counts the costs

The implementing agencies of 34 donor-aided development projects could spend just 16 percent of their annual allocations in the first half of the current fiscal year (FY).

Of a total Tk 2,543 crore allocation for FY06, they so far have expended only Tk 305 crore, with as many as 18 projects spending nothing at all, says a report of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) and the planning ministry.

The ERD and the planning ministry have identified these 34 sluggish projects under the Annual

Development Programme (ADP) as 'problematic' and low utilised foreign aided investment projects'. The report also identified delays in consultant appointment, NGO selection, and getting approval from the Cabinet Committee on Purchase and clearance from the donors as some of the major obstacles to speed up the projects.

For four of these projects, the government is already paying huge 'commitment charges' to donors in addition to interests on their funds. "Because of inefficiency of the health ministry and the Rural

RU TEACHER KILLING

Mohiuddin confesses to involvement

Names Shibir leader as his accomplice, say police

Rajshahi University teacher Mia Muhammad Mohiuddin yesterday confessed to his involvement in the killing of Prof S Taher Ahmed and named RU unit Islami Chhatra Shibir President Shalehi as his accomplice, police said.

The police started a hunt for Shalehi after the arrested teacher's confession during interrogation.

Police sources said several teams of detective and special branches of police are trying to trap

Shalehi. The police are ready to pay up to Tk 30,000 for information leading to his arrest, they added.

Jahangir and Nazmul, two arrested suspects, have in their confessional statements before a magistrate also named Mohiuddin and Shalehi as the masterminds of the killing.

The absconding Shibir leader, heavily guarded by cadres, showed up during a huge showdown in Shaheb Bazar on February 10 and went into hiding again.

Erratic power supply serves another blow to boro

Erratic power supply for about 15 days coupled with supply shortage and high price of diesel has thrown out of operation a large number of power pumps for irrigating farm land in eight northern districts, posing a serious threat to boro cultivation this season.

Frequent voltage fluctuations and a nagging low voltage of electricity have created widespread frustration among farmers about irrigating their boro fields.

Rangpur Chief Engineer of Power Development Board (PDB) Rabindranath Ghosh explained that excess load on the national
