

200 dead, 1,500 missing in Philippines landslide

About 200 people were believed killed and 1,500 others were missing in the central Philippines yesterday when a landslide buried an entire village, the Red Cross said.

Eye-witnesses said only a few houses were left standing after the landslide hit the village of Guinsaugon in the south of the Philippines island of Leyte.

"There are about 1,500 missing, 200 dead," Richard Gordon, the head of the Philippine Red Cross, said in a radio interview.

The first footage from the devastated village showed a sea of mud covering what had been lush green valley farmland.

Only a few sheets of tin roofing and the occasional coconut tree could be seen. Tiny groups of mud-splattered survivors were also shown, walking through the muck, apparently stunned by the scope of the destruction.

In a televised address to the nation, President Gloria Arroyo said rescue teams were rushing to the area from "air, land and sea" to cope with the catastrophe.

"I have ordered the Coast Guard and our entire naval force in the (central Philippines) region to the area," she said.

"Naval ships will be used as floating hospitals and command centres for relief and rescue."

Leyte Governor Rosette Lleras

said the latest census indicated there were 375 houses with 3,000 people living in Guinsaugon before the landslide. She described the village as totally flattened.

"It was like mud running down the mountain and it covered the village in seconds," she said, quoting survivors.

Experts blamed deforestation for the tragedy, which came after days of rainfall that was five times higher than usual.

Lleras said that many Guinsaugon residents had been evacuated after landslides earlier in the week had killed more than 20 people on Leyte, but that many had returned Friday because the rains had stopped and the sun had come

out.

A mild 2.6-magnitude earthquake which struck before the landslide may also have helped set off the wall of mud that crashed down on the village, said Rene Solidum, head of the government vulcanology office.

"The area could have really been ready for a landslide because of the amount of rainfall and if there was a minor earthquake, it might have hastened it," Solidum said.

Army Colonel Nestor Sadirin, head of a rescue task force, said 16 dead bodies had been recovered so far and 100 people rescued.

Back home with no future in sight

At least six children who were abducted and trafficked to the United Arab Emirates (UAE) in their early ages about a decade ago are still passing their days like orphans even after their repatriation as they fail to recall memories of their parents and home addresses.

The children who underwent physical and psychological tortures in a number of ways while used as jockeys in traditional camel races in the Arab land are now again frustrated and uncertain of their future.

"We do not know what to do now. We learn numbers and letters in Bangla and roam about here," Sohel, who is assumed to be 14 years old, told The Daily

Star recently at the shelter of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers Association (BNWLA) in Dhaka.

Sohel, who worked as a camel jockey for about 10 years in the UAE, thinks his birthplace was called "Gunapoti" in Comilla, but cannot remember the faces of his parents. "The names of one broker who took me to India was Giasuddin and another who took me to Dubai from India was Swapani," he recalled.

These children were repatriated between September 27, 2005 and January 24 of this year in different groups, after the repatriation process began in August last year following an agreement between the United Nations Children's Fund

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Salman Khan jailed for poaching

A court in western India yesterday sentenced Bollywood superstar Salman Khan to a year in jail for shooting two rare black buck deer.

The court has sentenced Salman Khan to one year's imprisonment. He also has to pay a fine of 5,000 rupees (113 dollars), his lawyer Vinay Sarswat told AFP.

The actor would appeal and apply for immediate bail, the lawyer said.

Khan, 40, who enjoys a massive following in India, was accused of poaching the protected species in the Jodhpur district of Rajasthan in September, 1998.

The lawyer said the eight other accused, including actor Satish Shah, were acquitted.

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No EC meet on voter listing since Aug

Time for fresh enrolment ends on Feb 20

The Election Commission has not met even once since August 6 to discuss voter list preparation while the EC Secretariat continues with preparing a fresh roll with a deferred deadline of February 20.

"No meeting has been held since August last on voter list preparation. And I have not received any information officially about the ongoing voter-listing work," Election Commissioner AK Mohammad Ali told The Daily Star.

The fresh voter-listing task at an

estimated cost of Tk 146 crore began on January 1 according to a unilateral decision of Chief Election Commissioner MAAZiz.

The EC Secretariat last Monday issued a circular directing the district election officers to complete preparing the draft voter roll by March 12, sources said.

It however is yet to clarify its position on remuneration of the 3-lakh-strong staff recruited to carry out the voter listing across the country.

In the circular, the EC Secretariat asked the district elec-

tion officers to start preparing the draft roll after February 20 using the prescribed form, said some of the officers. But, "the Secretariat has sent us only one copy of the form and asked us to photocopy it, though it has not given us the money for the photocopying," a district election officer told The Daily Star wishing anonymity.

In the wake of the widespread controversies and legal litigation, the EC now keeps mum. The officials, who had prepared the last voter list in 2000, expressed

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'Biharis' in Saidpur split over inclusion in new voter list

The community of 60 thousand stranded Pakistanis in Saidpur has divided over their inclusion in the list of prospective voters, raising the spectre of clash between the opposing groups.

Stranded Pakistanis General Repatriation Committee (SPGRC), an organisation dedicated to repatriation, opposes the inclusion while other organisations of the community are in favour of being on the list.

Sources said that field level workers of the Election Commission (EC) have included a good number of stranded Pakistanis in the list, bowing to pressure from the ruling alliance activists.

Locally known as Biharis, the people of this community have long been living in the camps run by International Red Cross Committee in Saidpur.

The leaders of the Repatriation Committee strongly protested the bid to enrol any stranded Pakistani in the voter list. General Secretary of its Saidpur unit Riaz Akbar told The Daily Star that they are the citizens of Pakistan and they should not be included in a voter list of Bangladesh.
