

INDEPENDENCE AWARD  
Ministers' names  
on list protested  
by colleagues

Two ministers yesterday expressed their reservations about the inclusion of three cabinet ministers on this year's Independence Award short list, saying that it would politicise the prestigious award.

Fisheries and Livestock Minister Abdullah Al Noman and State Minister for Sports Fazlur Rahman raised the objections at the cabinet committee meeting on National Award, which was chaired by Environment and Forest Minister Tarique Islam.

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman, Water Resources Minister Hafizuddin Ahmed and State Minister for Religious Affairs Mosharef Hossain Shahjahan have been nominated for this year's Independence Award.

The cabinet committee, however, did not exclude the ministers' names and sent the list to the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) for final approval.

Five ministers were also nominated for Ekushey Award earlier, but the prime minister dropped those names.

The other nominees for this year's Independence Award are Prof Emajuddin Ahmed for education, Prof Anwarul Karim for research, Dr Ashraf Siddiqui and Al Mahmud for literature, Murtaza Bashir for art, Col (rtd) Oli Ahmed MP for his role as a freedom fighter, and Bangladesh Betar for its role in the Liberation War.

# 50 Taliban militants killed by Pak troops

At least 50 pro-Taliban militants and five Pakistani soldiers were killed in one of the heaviest clashes in a restive tribal region bordering Afghanistan, officials said yesterday.

The fighting erupted Saturday afternoon and raged through the night in the towns of Miranshah and Mir Ali in North Waziristan tribal district.

A military statement said the security forces retaliated after militants attacked army and paramilitary camps from three directions with rockets and small and heavy arms.

"The security forces responded effectively and inflicted heavy casualties on them," the statement said, adding the miscreants had

been evicted from a telephone exchange and other government buildings they had seized on Saturday.

The statement did not give figures of casualties, but a senior security official told AFP "at least 50 militants were killed in the retaliatory fire."

Interior Minister Aftab Sherpao said the fighting had subsided and telephone communications were being restored.

"There is no fighting now and authorities are working to restore the telephone link with Miranshah," Sherpao told AFP.

Sherpao said the army used artillery and gunship helicopters to restore peace and order in the area.

Officials said five soldiers were killed, including two paramilitary troops when militants ambushed

their convoy in Mir Ali. Some 14 troops were wounded.

The fighting came three days after Pakistani forces smashed a suspected al-Qaeda training camp in Saidgai village in North Waziristan killing 40 militants, including foreigners.

Wednesday's attack coincided with the visit of US President George W Bush to Afghanistan. The latest clashes occurred as the US leader was in Islamabad for talks with President Pervez Musharraf on intensifying the war on terrorism.

Bush, who left Pakistan late Saturday, pressed Musharraf to do more to defeat al-Qaeda and Taliban, whose leadership is believed to be hiding somewhere in the rugged mountainous border

A party unhappy with Rahman's capture: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday alleged that an opposition political party is unhappy over the arrest of terrorist kingpin Shaikh Abdur Rahman as it wants terrorism to continue and innocent people killed by the terrorists.

"All quarters, including political parties and religious leaders, have congratulated the government on its success in capturing Rahman, but they [opposition] are unhappy," she said addressing a public meeting at Shaheed Smriti Model School ground.

None of the terrorists would be spared, the prime minister said and expressed firm optimism that the remaining members of the terrorist gang would be arrested and brought to book soon.

Khaleda said the main opposition party cannot tolerate welfare of the people. While in power, they established a reign of terror and they want it to continue.

# LPG price spirals out of reach

Price of Liquified Petroleum Gas (LPG) has gone beyond the reach of its consumers.

The abnormal price hike is forcing a few of the LPG importers to consider withdrawing themselves from the business as the number of consumers is decreasing everyday.

The price of a cylinder of LPG has increased by 120 percent in the last 16 months and the traders fear that the price would see another hike within the next week.

In October-November 2004 the price of a 12.5kg cylinder of LPG was Tk 340-360. A same size cylinder filled with gas is now selling at Tk 720 to 730 a piece on the market.

"LPG mainly is a by-product of petroleum, with the price hike of the mother component on the international market and devaluation of our currency against dollar, the price of LPG is increasing," said Mohammed Nizam Uddin, sales and marketing manager of Kleenheat Gas Bangladesh.

Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) produces 21 metric tons of LPG a year meeting 25 percent of the country's total demand.

"For more than a decade the project has remained an idea only. No government took steps to establish such a plant," said a source in the power, energy and mineral resources ministry.

Metropolitan Magistrate Suzayet Ullah rejected Bidisha's petition as she is on bail in a money laundering case filed with Gulshan Police Station.

Earlier on February 22, Bidisha's lawyer Kamruzzaman Mahboob submitted the petition. The petition said Bidisha and Eric are ill and they would only be cured if they were treated abroad.

Following the hearing, the court directed the investigation officer (IO) of the case to submit a report within a week whether her travelling abroad would have any

# IAEA meets today to make way for action against Iran

Tehran still defiant

The UN atomic watchdog opens a meeting today that is expected to clear the way for the UN Security Council to consider acting against Iran over fears it seeks nuclear weapons.

Iran stuck to its hard line yesterday, saying it had the right to uranium enrichment as part of a peaceful energy programme, although the United States and Europe fear enrichment could be used to make atom bombs.

"Nuclear research will go on, and threats, propaganda and bullying will not affect us," foreign ministry spokesman Hamid Reza Asifi said in Tehran.

"If the atmosphere gets tense, the other side will lose," he warned. "It is not the Islamic republic alone which will lose."

The board of governors of the UN watchdog International Atomic Energy Agency meets this week in Vienna to consider a report from IAEA chief Mohamed

**Radio collar attached to second tiger**

Bangladesh wildlife experts have fitted a radio collar on a second Royal Bengal tiger living in a dense coastal mangrove forest to learn more about the habits of the elusive cats, officials said yesterday.

The tiger called the Queen of Shapakhal was the second to be fitted with a radio collar after the first -- the 12-year-old Queen of Jamtala -- died suddenly, leaving the species unfished.

Tagging the eight-year-old Queen of Shapakhal would help experts learn more about the animals' sexual habits and prey targets, chief forest officer of the Sunderbans, Shaikh Mijanur
