

'Forge solidarity among women across world for empowerment'

Speakers at a discussion yesterday called for building solidarity among women across the world to ensure their rights, empowerment and gender equality. They said discrimination against women still prevails although they have achieved a lot with regards to empowerment. The Indian High Commission organised the discussion titled 'Celebrating women as leaders' at the Canadian Club in the city to mark the International Women's Day. Women diplomats and out-standing women leaders from different fields attended the programme. Indian High Commissioner Veena Sikri, Canadian High Commissioner Barbara Richardson, Norwegian Ambassador Aud Lise Norheim, Swiss Ambassador Dora Rapold and Swedish Ambassador Britt Hagstrom were present as panel-

lists while Chairperson of Arlinks Group Rokia A Rahman, Chairman of Narayanganj Pourasava Dr Selina Hayat and Sammilita Garments Sramik Federation President Nazma Akhter also took part in the discussion. Team Leader of Manusher Jonno Shaheen Anam moderated the discussion and placed the demands of women, including recognition of and support to women's productive and reproductive roles, violence-free environment at home and outside and a uniform family code for all women. Speaking on the occasion, the diplomats highlighted the status of women in their countries, their advancement and obstacles to empowerment. "In governmental sectors, women are much advanced and their achievement is higher than in the private sectors," said Swiss Ambassador Rapold. Constant efforts are needed to keep up what women have achieved, she added.

Swedish Ambassador Hagstrom said women's rights activists played an important role in enacting progressive laws in her country. Indian envoy Veena Sikri said Mahatma Gandhi had recognised the women's strong power and contribution to independence of India, which led to women's advancement and empowerment. "Not only social justice but also political growth is important. The policy to achieve emancipation and empowerment through education has played an important role in the advancement of women in India," she added. Highlighting Bangladeshi women's role in business, Chairperson of Arlinks Group Rokia A Rahman said they have been working hard in their professional life as well as in their families. Federation President Nazma Akhter said that although women have been protecting themselves, working hard and fighting everyday to establish their rights, they are neglected at the decision-making level in professional sectors. "We want the government to show respect to the garments sector, in which mostly women are employed, as we have been earning 77 percent of foreign exchange," she said. MILITANT ARRESTS Diplomats to be briefed today

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan today will brief the foreign diplomats stationed in Dhaka about the arrest of two most wanted militant leaders. The briefing will take place at the State Guesthouse Padma this noon, a highly placed source at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs said. Apart from the latest arrests, the foreign minister will also talk about government's sincerity in eliminating all sorts of religious fundamentalism, terrorism and militancy in Bangladesh. Since the August 17 countrywide serial blasts and suicide attacks, there had been demands from different levels to arrange a briefing for the foreign diplomats on these attacks. The government, however, refrained from arranging any such briefing, as the situation was not in favour, said an official on condition of anonymity. With the arrest of militant kingpins Abdur Rahman and Bangla Bhai, the government now finds the time right for holding the briefing. Besides, the arrest of several hundred JMB cadres and recovery of huge bomb materials and weapons by the law enforcement agencies are also considered a success of the government, the official added. He further said that the government is determined to dismantle all terror networks as well as to capture the terrorists in hiding and bring them to justice.

Arrest of Bangla Bhai second act of drama Say 14-party leaders

Leaders of Awami League (AL) and the 14-party alliances yesterday termed the arrest of Bangla Bhai "the second act of a drama staged by the government". The government, following their premeditated plan, has shifted Bangla Bhai and Abdur Rahman from the political custodians of the government to the custody of police and Rapid Action Battalion (Rab), they said. The leaders said this while attending the 14-party divisional

grand rally in Barisal yesterday. Abdul Jalil, general secretary of AL, said the government is staging scenes of a drama one after another. Bangla Bhai and Abdur Rahman are the creations of four-party alliance government who is now staging the drama to misguide people, he added. Tofail Ahmed, presidium member of AL, said AL demanded the arrest of Bangla Bhai when he was killing and torturing people in Rajshahi but the government had denied even the existence of Bangla Bhai. The government had told people Bangla Bhai was the media's creation. Rashed Khan Menon, Workers Party president, said it appears militant kingpins were arrested before every grand rally of the 14-party alliances. They (the militant kingpins) had been in their (government's) custody all along and are now being brought out one by one, he added. Hasanul Huq Inu, Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD) president, said the government had all along been aware of their locations and presence and the arrests are part of a government play. Fazle Hassan Badsha, mayor candidate of Rajshahi City Corporation and politburo member of Workers Party, said he had demanded the arrest of Bangla Bhai first from Rajshahi. The government did not listen to him, on the contrary, the administration protected Bangla Bhai and the police provided protection to his processions, he said. He however said these arrests should not be viewed negatively and it was necessary to find out the forces behind them.

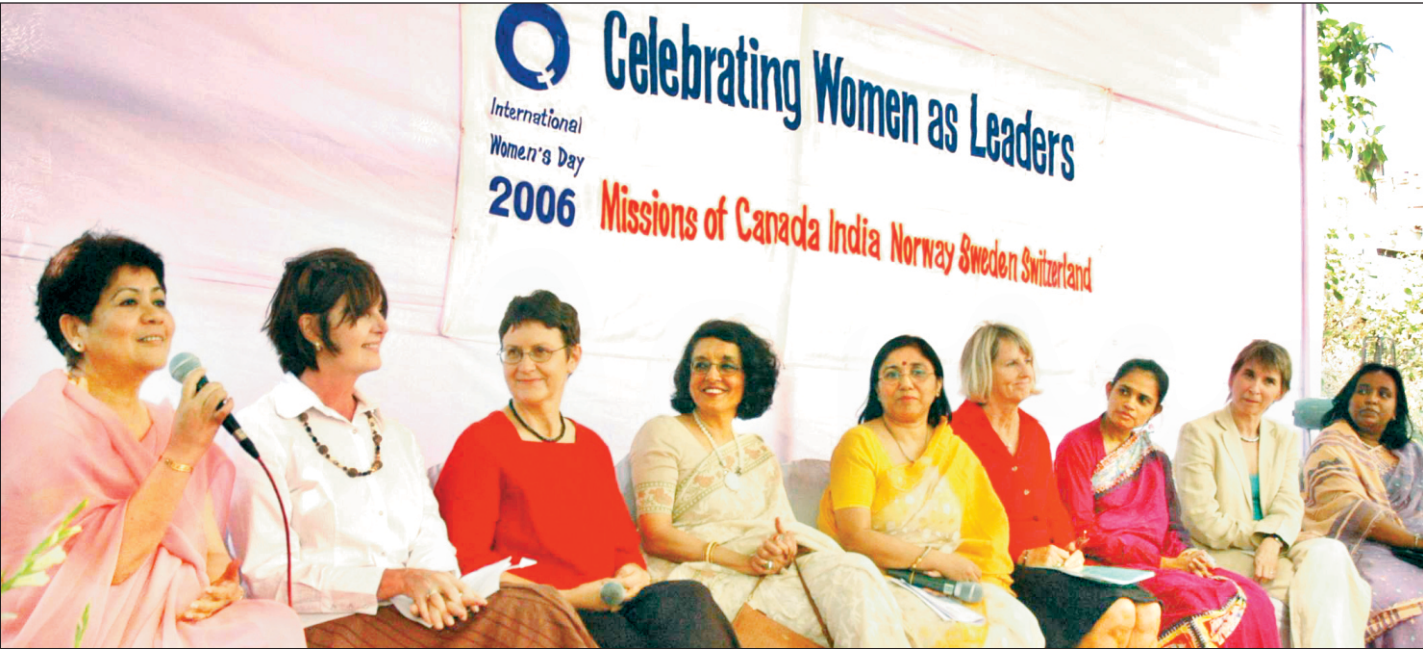

Diabetes need not hamper normal life

Says ex-Pak cricket captain Wasim Akram

In a message of encouragement to diabetes patients, former captain of Pakistan cricket team Wasim Akram asserted that the ailment could be kept in check and need not come in the way of leading a normal life. "If I can live life the way I want to, why can't you do it," said Akram, a diabetic himself, at a function organised by sanofi-aventis Bangladesh and the Diabetic Association of

Bangladesh at a city hotel yesterday. Akram is the brand ambassador of Accu-chek meter produced by Roche and marketed by sanofi-aventis Bangladesh in this country. Accu-chek, the most reliable home monitoring blood glucose meter, is known for its quick result which is reliable and same as laboratory. Diabetes is recognised as an emerging silent global epidemic. Worldwide, there are 171 million

BLDG COLLAPSE Phoenix Centre MD seeks bail without Vokatlatnama

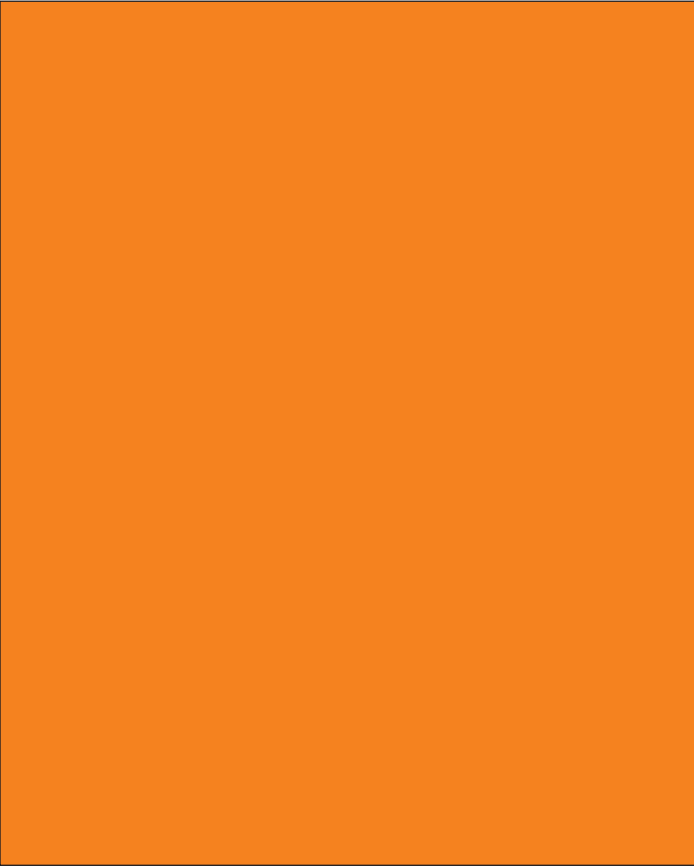

Managing Director (MD) of the Phoenix Medical Centre, an accused in connection with its recent tragedy, did not surrender to the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court, Dhaka yesterday even though he submitted a petition for bail. Dr. Jahangir Alam, MD of the collapsed medical centre, through his lawyer Rashid Ahmed Ganguhee, submitted a surrender petition for bail without Vokatlatnama to the court. But he was not present when the petition was placed before the court for hearing. The petitioner also submitted another petition on Sunday but did not turn up. As per law, if any person accused in any case surrenders to a court for bail, he or she has to submit a bail petition with Vokatlatnama and mention his or her full address in the petition. But Dr Jahangir violated the law not submitting any Vokatlatnama and mentioning his address. Earlier on February 25, the Phoenix Medical Centre was collapsed and 21 people were killed while 50 injured. Meantime, Deen Mohammad, owner of the Phoenix Building through his lawyer submitted a bail petition to the High Court on Sunday in his absence. But the court did not hear it.

Australian minister due today

Australian Federal Minister for Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs, Senator Amanda Vanstone, arrives in Dhaka today on a two-day visit. Ministry of Foreign Affairs officials yesterday said this would be her first visit to Bangladesh since the senator was appointed to the ministry. She is expected to hold talks with top government leaders. The officials said the visit of the minister would contribute greatly towards further strengthening ties between the two countries. Sources said Vanstone would discuss trade and commerce, Australian development assistance in Bangladesh as well as sports. Australian Cricket team is expected to visit Bangladesh in April. Official sources said Australia has been funding large-scale programs for food security, primary education, governance, micro-finance, HIV/AIDS and arsenic mitigation, as well as Australian Development Scholarships (ADS) in Bangladesh.



diabetics and by 2030 the figure is expected to be 366 million. At present the number of diabetic patients in this country is 4.1 million which is expected to be 11.2 million by 2030. In his inaugural speech Iftekharul Islam, managing director of sanofi-aventis Bangladesh, said the company is now producing several medicines to treat diabetes including the top selling insulin Lantus. Prof Dr AK Azad Khan, secretary general of Diabetic Association of Bangladesh, presided over the function. He said Type 2 diabetes or non-insulin dependent diabetes is preventable. He laid emphasis on home monitoring of blood glucose level since it is more patient-compliant and helps them more to keep their diabetes in control. Prof Dr Hajera Mahtab made a presentation on 'Importance of self-monitoring and good glycaemic control.' S Johar, regional director of Asia Pacific, Roche India was also present. In an open discussion with doctors, patients and media, Akram described diabetes as a "touchy subject" in this part of the world where people are even reluctant to disclose that they have diabetes. "People who are not aware of the disease and hesitant about diabetes often seek for alternative medicine. They have to know that there is no alternative of medicine to treat diabetes and awareness is the key to cope with the concern," he added. Akram suggested launch of a strong information campaign about symptoms of diabetes and steps needed to keep it in check, particularly among the illiterate and low socio-economic group of population. He also disclosed his plan to go a long way to inspire people with diabetes and conquer the disease. He advised medical fraternity to "be positive and tell patients to check blood sugar levels regularly." Akram, who was diagnosed as a diabetic at the peak of his career but did not allow the condition to affect his performance, said he has "proved that diabetes did not really make people tired." He also noted that family support is vital to live a normal life for diabetic patients. Five patients with diabetes, who had accomplished significant achievements despite their physical and metabolic restrictions, were facilitated with free Accu-chek home monitoring glucose meters and strips at the function.
