

ACCIDENTS IN FACTORIES

Dife is too weak to ensure safety measures

Lack of safety measures is a constant threat for some 5,000 factories in Chittagong as the Department for Inspection of Factories and Establishments (Dife) lies in a miserable state.

Dife, responsible for ensuring safe working conditions and bringing order in the factories and industrial units in Chittagong division, is designed to man with 12 inspectors.

Of the 12 posts, five have been lying vacant for long. They are supposed to work in three categories - general, safety (engineering) and medical.

The Chittagong divisional office is now left with only two inspectors to deal with the safety standard and compliance issues of 4809 factories and industrial units in the port city. Of them, 667 are garments factories.

The post of Deputy Chief Inspector of Factory is lying vacant since January. MA Samad, one of the two assistant chief inspectors, now takes care of the post in addition to his work.

One of the three posts of factory inspectors (engineering) for taking care of the safety compliances has been vacant for over two years.

An assistant inspector (engineering) is on leave as he is ill, sources said.

Two posts of factory inspector and assistant inspector (medical) have been lying vacant for three years and over a year respectively, sources said.

One of the three posts of factory inspectors (general), responsible for looking into violation of laws relating to factories, workers' wages, and

licences of factories, has also been lying vacant for long, they said.

The poor state of the Dife came to light after the country's worst-ever factory fire left over 50 garments workers burnt alive and injured over 100 at KTS Composite Textile Mills at Kalurghat BSCIC industrial area in the city on February 23.

Dife Deputy Chief Inspector (acting) MA Samad said the

regard and the accident occurred just before expiry of the given time," he said.

"The staircases, however, were sufficiently wide and causalities could have been far more minimised or almost to zero if both the gates were kept open or if they were not narrowed down by the stockpiled products and machineries installed in a most unplanned and congested way," he said.

Samad said the high casualty at KTS could have been averted through keeping the factory under constant monitoring and inspection.

"But, we could not do that with such a poor man power," he added.

Besides, two factory inspectors (engineering) at present are engaged in an UNDP funded project, he said.

The project is being implemented by the government with the technical assistance of International Labour Organisation (ILO) for the development of safety standard and friendly working environment in ship breaking industry, he said.

On the other hand, Fire Service and Civil Defence the authority to provide clearance for workshop warehouse licence after inspecting measures to combat fire in a factory, also lacks manpower.

Rashedul Islam Majumder, Fire Service Deputy Director of Chittagong region, said they have only three inspectors to see measures of a factory for fire fighting.

With this manpower it is impossible to conduct proper inspection in some 5,000 factories and industrial units in Chittagong, he said.

factory developed two staircases up to the first floor and only one of them led to the third floor.

"We issued a letter to the mill authorities on February 10 asking them to develop two staircases up to third floor of the building, which obtained a licence as a two storied one," he said.

"We also asked them to report us within 15 days in this

case," he said.

Int'l Trade Fair attracts huge visitors

The 14th Chittagong International Trade Fair-2006 at the Railway Polo ground in the port city has gained momentum with huge visitors crowding everyday.

Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Industries (CCCI) organised the month long fair with a view to promoting local products and creating new markets abroad.

"Though the fair could not draw visitors up to our expectation for the first few days after the inauguration on February 14, the crowd is now quite satisfactory," said Ershad Ullah, chairman of the fair committee.

"At least seven to eight lakh visitors turned up at the fair until Saturday, 19th day into the fair," he said.

A total of 330 stalls and 29 pavilions are participating in the fair this year.

The pavilions are categorised with different titles such as Premier Gold, Premier, Standard Mini Mega, Premier Mini and Mini Pavilion.

Thailand is participating as the

partner country for the fourth consecutive year and having 53 stalls of arrays of different Thai products in special Thai Zone.

An exclusive 'China Block' with several Chinese stalls and a 'Pakistani Pavilion' with Pakistani stalls have also been built in the fair.

Besides, business farms from the United States of America, India, Iran and New Zealand are also participating in the fair displaying their products.

The business farms from home and abroad showcased wide range of products, including handicrafts, computer and computer accessories, consumer products, food items, home appliances, garments, leather goods, garments made by the tribals, electronic cables, electronics, ceramics, aluminium, jute products, herbal medicine, silk goods, building materials, marble and tiles, transformer, wooden and steel furniture, plastic goods, utensils and cosmetics in the fair.

Mohammed Mohsin, a student, said, "I visited the fair several times and price of the items at the fair is reasonable compared to markets."

"The stalls at the fair offer us goods directly from the foreign producers and sometimes at a discount rate," he added.

Rabi Uddin Mahmud, an employee of the Little Furniture Private Limited, is happy as the number of visitors is increasing everyday.

"We have already received orders for our products of Tk 2 lakh," he said.

The New Zealand Dairy is selling their powdered milk of popular brands Anchor and Red Cow, as well as other products at a retail price at the fair.

"We have sold powdered milk of over Tk 2.50 lakh until Thursday," said Zakir Hossain - an executive of the New Zealand Dairy.

While visiting the fair with his family Mohammed Jamil Uddin, a government official, was disturbed to see the used disposable cans and packets littering the fair premises.

"In an international fair the authorities are expected to take care of everything to bring in a good impression from the participants and the visitors, particularly those from

abroad," he said.

Several stall owners said they are facing problems in bringing their products, as unlike previous occasions, the labourers are not allowed inside the fair premises without tickets.

"I cannot bring even our high officials in my stall without ticket," said an employee of a new telephone operator on condition of anonymity.

Besides, "We are facing power crisis, which causes sufferings to the visitors putting them into embarrassing situation," he said.

Ershad Ullah said negligence of the sweepers might have caused inconvenience for some times immediately after the inauguration of the fair and we have instantly taken measures to address it.

He dismissed the allegation of charging ticket fares from those carrying goods for the stalls saying no complaint is reported to the committee in this regard so far while the initial crisis of power is already solved.
