BSF FEUD
1,000 stranded
at Benapole

Some 1,000 India-bound Bangladeshis remained stranded here since yesterday morning as they were denied entry into the neighbouring country despite having passports.

The Indian border guards and customs authorities prevented the Bangladeshis from entering India following a feud between the BSF and the customs, according to an information received from across the border.

Outraged by the denial of entry, the India-bound Bangladeshis, came here from different parts of the country by night coaches, blocked the main road in the area, halting export-import between the two countries.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh immigration police also refused to put entry seals on the passports of the Bangladeshis due to the stalemate.

Hundreds of goods-laden truck remained stranded on both sides of the border.

**Under-trial
prisoner dies
at court**

**Father alleges jail
authorities' negligence**

A seriously ill under-trial prisoner died yesterday as the Dhaka Central Jail authorities did not admit him to hospital in time, his father alleged.

Shafiqur Rahman Sumon, 20, fell sick at the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate (CMM) Court, Dhaka where he was brought yesterday morning for hearing of a case.

At around 12.15pm, he was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared him dead, Ramma police said. Sumon's father Abdul Mannan however claimed that he had seen his son dead at the court.

"Sumon was very ill and he should have been sent to hospital much earlier. How could the police bring such a seriously sick patient to court instead of sending him to hospital," said Abdul Mannan talking to reporters at the DMCH.

Sumon had been ill for about a year. "He used to bleed through his nose. Whenever I went to meet him he used to say that executioner Shahjahan routinely beat him up as he [Sumon] refused to pay him a monthly toll of Tk 2,000," Mannan claimed.

Mannan also said he had requested the jail authorities to take his son to hospital but to no avail.

When contacted, a jail official said they were yet to receive detailed report on Sumon's death. They also could not say anything about the allegation against executioner Shahjahan.

The body was sent to DMCH morgue for autopsy.

**Russia lauds
steps in
combating
terrorism**

Envoy meets FM

The Russian Ambassador in Dhaka yesterday congratulated the Bangladesh government for its dynamic measures in combating terrorism.

The appreciation came when Ambassador Oleg S Malginov called on Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan at the latter's office.

During the meeting, they discussed matters relating to bilateral relations especially boosting trade and economic cooperation.

Morshed Khan said there is scope to further strengthen bilateral trade between Bangladesh and Russian Federation. He requested Russia to increase import of Bangladeshi products for mutual benefit.

He mentioned that there were some bottlenecks in banking facilities for direct import and export between the two countries. He emphasised smooth banking arrangements and visits of business delegations from both sides for further strengthening economic cooperation.

The Ambassador said private sectors of the two countries, through interaction, can work together for boosting trade and economic relations.

In this regard, he mentioned that Russian businessmen are willing to work together with Bangladeshi entrepreneurs.

Both the minister and the envoy expressed the hope that bilateral relations between the two countries would deepen in future.

Science, tech-based edn a must for progress

President tells Kuet convocation

President Iajuddin Ahmed yesterday emphasised the need for science and technology-based education and research so that Bangladesh could achieve rapid progress.

"We need to understand that technical education can open up greater opportunities for us," he said while he was addressing the first-ever convocation of Khulna University of Engineering and Technology (Kuet).

The President, also the Kuet chancellor, said backwardness in science and technology and slow pace in research works are among the reasons why the underdeveloped countries lag behind.

Referring to the contributions of science and technology, Iajuddin said the developed countries have

brought about unprecedented changes in their lifestyle by making the best use of science, research and modern technologies.

"We are now living in the 21st century and the policy of this century is the 'Survival of the Fittest'. So, there is no alternative to skill for survival in this competitive world," Iajuddin said.

He said "We have talents and huge human resources. We'll be able to create skilled human resources if flourishing of talents of the country's huge population could be ensured by utilising science and technology."

"We have to move ahead in this competitive world by utilising science and inventing appropriate technologies through researches," said Iajuddin.

He lauded Kuet for taking well thought-out scientific and pragmatic

education programmes since its inception.

The President expressed the hope that Kuet would be able to contribute to our national progress through creating skilled human resources.

Iajuddin also hoped that the graduates of the university would be able to play their due role for the country's development.

Education Minister Dr M Osman Farruk was also present on the occasion.

Some 820 students received degree certificates while 16 post-graduate certificates in the convocation held after Khulna BIT was upgraded to a full fledged university on September 1, 2003.

Of the recipients, 11 students received gold medals.

**Saarc standing
body meets in
Dhaka in April**

The Standing Committee of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (Saarc) is expected to hold its first meet in Dhaka on April 10 and 11 to prepare a programme for the next decade, official sources said.

The standing committee comprising foreign secretaries of all seven member states of the association – Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Maldives, Pakistan and Sri Lanka – will also prepare a draft of the Saarc membership and observer status.

In the 13th Saarc Summit, the South Asian leaders approved new membership for Afghanistan and observer status for China and Japan. But the Saarc still has no criteria for granting new membership or observer status.

The standing committee will prepare the draft of the plan and programmes for next one decade as well as the draft of the membership criteria. The Saarc Council of Ministers comprising foreign ministers will finalise the Saarc programmes, membership and observer status when it will meet in Dhaka likely in June.

Ahead of the foreign secretaries' meeting, the Saarc Programming Committee comprising senior officials of the Saarc states will meet in Dhaka on April 7-9 to work out the agenda of standing committee meet.

The standing committee and the senior officials during their meeting would also explore ways to further reorganise the Saarc and strengthen its secretariat.

Diplomatic sources said foreign secretaries of Pakistan and India would also hold one-on-one meeting to exchange views on the ongoing dialogue process and other issues relating to India and Pakistan.

**WTO fails to
contribute to
LDC dev
Discussion told**

Speakers at a discussion yesterday said WTO conferences held so far could not contribute anything to economic development of the Least Developed Countries (LDC).

Referring to 6th ministerial conference of World Trade Organisation (WTO) held in Hong Kong last year, they said it assured of duty and quota free access for 97 percent of LDC products but the options for selecting the products by the importers favoured the latter.

The discussion titled 'Hong Kong Ministerial Conference: Achievement and Obligation of Bangladesh' was organised by Alliance of Food Sovereignty Campaign (AFSC) in cooperation with ActionAid Bangladesh, Ghasul and Jagrata Jubo Sangstha (JJS) at Chittagong Press Club.

Participants at the discussion alleged that very often the importing countries put the major exportable products of an LDC outside the list of 97 percent goods that they are supposed to import.

They called upon the media to focus this issue and help the LDCs like ours reap the benefit of WTO conference in future.

M Nasirul Hoque, chief reporter of a local daily Suprabhat Bangladesh, moderated the discussion where JJS Manager Abdullah Al Mamun presented the keynote speech.

"Most of the trade unions relating to labourers and their rights are formed with a view to going abroad and getting various benefits," said Shahjahan, also executive president of Bangladesh Sarak Paribahan Sramik Federation.

"After independence, we could not create leadership on which the labourers could keep their trusts. Due to the lack of confidence, the labourers and activists could not join hands with the leaders," said Shahjahan, also member of the parliamentary standing committee on labour and employment ministry.

He said "The standing committee is also not capable of playing its due role as its members are not appropriate one."

Advocate SA Huque said it is quite impossible to solve problems of the deprived labourers under the existing labour law.

He said, "If a deprived worker goes to the court, he can not continue case as he is not capable of contesting in the High Court."

Other speakers said the government did not approve the recommendations of the Commission of Labour Law Reformation, 1994.

They said even if the existing labour laws were implemented, over 80 percent of the problems of the labourers would be solved automatically.

7 more JMB cadres held in 3 districts

Law enforcers arrested seven Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) cadres including an ehsar (fulltime active member) at Nilphamari, Brahmanbaria and Sirajganj during the last two days.

The arrestees of Brahmanbaria are Sohel, 25, Mohammad Alamgir, 28, Mohammad Arafat, 26, and Sheikh Mohammad Suman, 25. The arrestees of Nilphamari are Hafez Shariful Islam, 22, and Aminur Rahman, 22, while Abu Bakkar, 45, was arrested at Sirajganj.

Members of Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) arrested two JMB cadres at Chilhati Bazar in Nilphamari yesterday, our Nilphamari correspondent reports.

DB produced the four arrestees before the court with a 10-day demand prayer. The court however placed them on a five-day remand.

**RU Shibir cadres
drive 3 JCD men
away from hall**

Tension has been running high at the Rajshahi University (RU) as the Islami Chhatra Shibir (ICS) cadres drove away three Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) activists from their dormitory rooms on Wednesday midnight.

Sources said a group of Shibir cadres led by Abdul Hamid and Shahnewaz raided the rooms 419 and 102 of the Bangabandhu Hall and forced the occupant JCD activists to vacate the rooms. The Shibir cadres also threw out their books, beddings and clothes and took control of the rooms. They also allegedly assaulted JCD workers Amirul and Rashed during the raid.

The incident triggered panic among the students, prompting several JCD men and general students to leave the hall in apprehension that clashes might erupt at anytime.

RU JCD Joint Convener Ruhul Kuddus Saran said that they had informed the university authorities and demanded an investigation into the matter.

Hall provost Prof Nurul Islam could not be contacted over phone.

On Wednesday evening, a group of ICS cadres led by general secretary Nur Muhammad assaulted the Acting Proctor Prof Harun-ur-Rashid after the proctors meeting over a show cause notice.

The show cause notice was issued against the ICS as they were holding processions and meetings on the campus daily using loud speakers violating the university rules for holding processions.

The ICS men also misbehaved with RU Vice-Chancellor (VC) Prof Altaf Hossain and said that they would defy the show cause notice and continue to hold meetings.

Acting Proctor Prof Harun-ur-Rashid confirmed the incident. The VC could not be reached over phone.

Contacted, ICS RU General Secretary Nur Mohammad Mondol said the JCD men have been occupying their seats illegally. ICS will hold processions on the campus daily protesting the "conspiracy" against ICS President Mahbub Alam Salehi, he added.

RU units of JCD, Bangladesh Chhatra League, Samajtantrik Chhatra Front and Bangladesh Chhatra Federation protested the ICS activities in the varsity and demanded immediate action against them.

**One killed, 5
SSC
examinees
injured in
Jessore road
accident**

A man was killed and nine others, including five SSC examinees, were injured in a road accident at Muroli crossing near the town yesterday.

The dead was identified as Rabiu, 35, a van-puller.

Police said the mishap took place at about 2:00pm when a pick-up hit a rickshaw van from behind, killing the van-puller Rabiu on the spot and injuring nine others.

The injured were rushed to Jessore General Hospital in critical condition. Of the injured, Ruma and Mina were sent to Dhaka as their condition deteriorated.

On information, Kotwali police rushed to the spot and sent the body to hospital morgue for autopsy.

After appearing at the SSC examination, four girls and a boy along with others were returning to their village homes by the van.

A case was filed with police.

**BOMA ABBAS
BCL leader threatens
to sue police**

Bangladesh Chhatra League leader Abu Abbas Bhuiyan yesterday said he would sue the police, who had arrested and branded him as "Boma Abbas" in connection with the attack on writer Humayun Azad, for tarnishing his image.

"What I can recall now is that the police kept me bled all over in a cell. I was desperately asking for water but they did not give me anything to drink for long."

"Still tears burn my eyes when I remember the torture," Abbas said in a choked voice.

The BCL leader said he passed Higher Secondary School examinations from Dhaka College in 1998 and enrolled at Dhaka University. "There is not even any general diary against me, but the police branded me as Boma Abbas," he said.

Ramma police arrested Abbas on February 28, 2004 near the Central Shaheed Minar immediately after his taking part in a demonstration against the attack on Azad. Unidentified assailants attacked Prof Azad near Bangla Academy the previous day.

"Police blindfolded me, hanged me from the ceiling and started beating up me with sticks and kicking me," said Abbas, who was

released on bail three days ago. He alleged the police brutally tortured him to squeeze a confession that he carried out the attack on orders from Sheikh Hasina and under supervision of BCL President Liakot Shikder and General Secretary Nazrul Islam Babu.
