

BIPAA calls for modernisation of trademark registry office

Leaders of Bangladesh Intellectual Property Attorneys Association (BIPAA) has called for appointing more experienced staff in trademark registry office (TRO) and renovate it with modern technologies for smooth functioning.

At a press conference in the city yesterday, they also urged the government to modernise copyright office (CO) with latest technologies for proper functioning.

BIPAA organised the press conference to mark the World Intellectual Property Day today.

In a written statement, Advocate Gazi Md Niamat Hossain, former general secretary of BIPAA, said the Patent and Design Act 1911 and Trademark Act 1940, which were reformed in 2003, are not up-to-date for the present time.

After the reforms one official is operating the two offices which clearly shows that these are not functioning properly, he added.

Niamat said the government has made reforms in land survey and land registration procedures and modernised all sub-registry offices, but so far no initiative has been taken to make reforms in the TRO since independence.

He said local and foreign companies submitted around 1,25,000 applications for trademark registration to TRO since independence. Of them, only 35 thousand applications have been approved.

Niamat said it is very regretting that after finishing all registration process these applicants are not getting registration certificates.

Advocate Zahirul Islam said there is no sufficient staffs in TRO and most of the staffs lack enough experience to handle the office smoothly.

Call for reforms in police law

Legal experts and human rights activists yesterday expressed deep concern over the repression during police detention and impunity of the criminals saying that this is creating tolerance to injustice.

Speaking at a seminar yesterday, they blamed politicisation of the police administration and the use of police for partisan purposes and called for necessary reforms in police laws and political systems that do not conform with the constitution of the country.

The seminar titled 'Repression: State versus Human Rights' was organised jointly by the Centre for Rehabilitation of Torture Survivors (CRTS), Bangladesh and Ngorik Uddyog at the Women's Voluntary Association auditorium in the city.

"The most dangerous thing that the countrymen are afraid of today is appointment of political cadres in the law enforcement agencies," said Dr Kamrul Hasan Khan, general secretary of CRTS, in his keynote speech.

He noted that some 707 people were killed under the custody of different law enforcement agencies as of October 2005, but families of

none got justice.

"Thus the deaths in crossfire with Rab and police are being given legal basis," he said.

Dr Kamrul said apparently the law enforcers seem to be responsible for the killings, but the real culprits are the successive political governments who have been continuously torturing their oppositions in their confrontational politics keeping them behind the curtain.

ASM Shahjahan, former inspector general of police, said repression in the name of law is the worst form of tortures which is why police should be responsible to the state and not to the government.

"If police work for the state, the question of repression would not be raised," he said suggesting speedy political reforms and separation of judiciary.

Advocate Sultana Kamal, executive director of Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), said people are becoming tolerant to injustices and corruption due to growing level of impunity in the society.

"Having no place for justice we have become the most helpless people in the world," she said, adding people even do not have the sense of

security and take laws in hand which is more dangerous.

Advocate Zi Khan Panna, chairman of Human Rights Legal Aid Committee of Bangladesh Bar Council, said civil and political rights of people are violated due to police fire.

The right to live is also violated, he said while criticising the deaths in the crossfire.

The last shelter of people is the courts which have also been politicised, said Mamunur Rashid, a cultural personality, suggesting a massive movement for a positive change in the judiciary.

Zakir Hossain, chief executive of Ngorik Uddyog, demanded formation of an independent human rights commission, separation of judiciary and activation of an independent anti-corruption commission to curb corruption and establish justice in the society.

Nawazesh Ali Khan, a TV personality, also took part in the discussion presided over by CRTS Chairman Dr Abdus Sobhan.

Six killed in road crashes in Comilla

Bride, motorcyclists among victims

Six people, including a newly married bride and three motorcyclists, were killed and 11 others were injured in two separate accidents in the last two days in Comilla.

Three motorcycle riders were killed and another injured in a road accident at Binglaboria under Debaidwar upazila on Comilla-Sylhet road yesterday noon.

Sources said, a Sylhet bound passenger bus collided head-on with a Debaidwar bound motorcycle on Comilla-Sylhet road killing three on the spot and injuring one.

The victims were identified as Nur Alam, 30, son of Suro Mollah of

village Jhahanagar; Iman Uddin Titu, 26, son of Dr Rafiqul Islam, of village Jhahanagar and Abidur Rahman, 25, son of Jahangir of village Metlangar under Muradnagar upazila in Comilla.

The seriously injured Ratan, 24, son of Sattar member of village Moklespur under Muradnagar is now undergoing treatment at Comilla Medical College Hospital.

Police seized the two vehicles.

A case was filed with Debidwar Police Station in this connection.

Meanwhile, three people including a bride were killed and ten others injured in another road accident at Nabogram under Choudhagram upazila on Dhaka-Chittagong

Highway on Monday afternoon.

A Mireswarai bound microbus was knocked by another Dhaka bound BRTC container killing three passengers of the microbus on the spot and injuring another 10.

The victims were identified as bride Joya Rani Paul, 18, wife of Liton Paul, her grandmother Anima Paul, 60, and Apu Paul, 8, nephew of Liton Paul.

The seriously injured groom Liton Paul, 30, his sister-in-law Soma Paul, 22, Mukta Paul, 10, Shukla Paul, 12, Shamir Paul, 30, and micro driver Maja Sahi were admitted to Comilla Medical College Hospital.

Muggers stab NGO official to death

Muggers stabbed an NGO official to death in Mohammadpur in the city yesterday while a youth was found dead at Badda.

Md Hafizur Rahman, 34, an area manager of Resource Integration Centre (RIC), was coming to RIC Head Office at Lalmaia from Naogaon along with one of his colleagues Abdul Jalil.

As he got off the rickshaw near the office at around 7:00am, a group of muggers, who were waiting in a private car nearby, stopped him.

They asked Hafizur to give them whatever valuables he has with him but as he did not readily comply with their demand they stabbed him on his abdomen and snatched Tk 7,000 and a cell phone from him.

Colleague Jalil rushed him to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital where doctors declared him dead.

A case was filed with Mohammadpur Police Station in this connection.

Meanwhile, police recovered a body of an unidentified youth yesterday from a paddy field at Beraid at Badda. The body bears marks of injuries in the throat.

AL alleges harassment of workers by BNP cadres

Leaders of main opposition Awami League (AL) yesterday said thousands of party workers have been forced to leave the districts of Dhonbari, Madhupur and Gopalpur areas fearing harassment by cadres of ruling BNP in connivance with police and Rapid Action Battalion (Rab).

During the last four and a half years, police raided almost all the houses of AL activists and damaged their goods, and the situation has worsened since the AL rally at Pankata High School field on April 22, they said at a press conference at the AL central office in the city yesterday.

BNP's youth front Jubo Dal called a rally at the same place to foil the prescheduled AL rally on April 22, they said.

"Understanding the conspiracy of Jubo Dal, thousands of people gathered in the Pankata High School field defying illegally imposed Section 144 and held the rally peacefully," AL leader Obaidul Kader said at the press conference.

After filing two cases, police and Rab raided almost all the houses of the AL activists on April 22 night when they reached home after the rally, he said, adding that many party supporters were arrested and the rest of them left the Dhonbari, Madhupur and Gopalpur areas to avoid harassment by law enforcers.

Mofazzal Hossain Chowdhury Maya demanded immediate withdrawal of the two 'false cases' and stopping the repression through conducting raids in different areas of Tangail district.

BCL beat up 4 Shibir men at DU

Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL), student wing of main opposition Awami League, beat up four activists of Islami Chhatra Shibir (ICS) on Dhaka University (DU) campus yesterday, as they launched a movement to cancel freedom fighters' quota in Bangladesh Civil Service (BCS) examination.

The injured were Mohammad Shamim, fourth year student of Chemistry, Abdul Malek, fourth year student of Geography, Majedul Islam, third year student of Bangla Literature and Rifaqul Islam, second year student of Economics.

Shamim was sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Witnesses said a group of students, known as activists of ICS, student wing of ruling coalition partner Jamaat-e-Islami, came to Modhu's canteen at around 3:45pm yesterday for their scheduled press conference on their demand.

As they approached Modhu, BCL men chased them and beat up Shibir men, witnesses added.

BCL men also gathered in front of the Central Library and rounded the campus in groups in search of Shibir men after foiling their bid to hold press conference.

Meanwhile, as Shibir men have been demonstrating on the campus against quota system for the last few days, Mukti Juddho Prajanna, an organisation of freedom fighters' children, yesterday alleged that ICS has been conspiring to get the freedom fighters' quota in the BCS examinations.

Abdullah Al Mamun, president of the organisation, addressing a rally on campus, said the activists of ICS in the guise of general students are taking a bid to intensify a movement against the quota for freedom fighters' families in BCS examinations.

ships for young Bangladeshi doctors in collaboration with the governments of Australia and Bangladesh.

Under the scholarship programme, which is likely to be introduced in 12 to 18 months, doctors would be provided special training for three to six months at hospitals in Australia.

Besides, Interplast takes critical Bangladeshi patients to Australia for treatment. Last year, it took 13-year-old Joyanta from Chittagong who was badly mauled by a female bear. The horrific injuries to his face were treated for 12 months and he was brought to Dhaka on April 22 with one of the Interplast doctors who performed the one of the most complex operations.

"But taking patients for treatment in Australia is very expensive as medical cost there is very high. It is logical to bring specialist surgeons in Bangladesh to treat more patients," he said.

In reply to a question, Australian High Commissioner Douglas Foskett said the Australian government would consider providing modern medical equipment to Bangladesh for treatment of complicated patients.

He said Bangladesh is the biggest recipient of Australian aid, with 32 million dollars a year, in South Asia. "Priorities here are many, but it is something we can consider," he said.
