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Bureaucrats' rat race for 4-party tickets

Violation of service rules angers coalition leaders

In flagrant violation of service rules, a good number of top bureaucrats including the cabinet secretary have joined a rat race to consolidate their position for getting BNP-led four-party coalition ticket to contest the next general election.

These officials are involved in political activities under cover of official visits to their areas and attended public meetings and rallies in the last few months.

Most of these officials are already facing protest from the ruling alliance leaders and lawmakers from their constituencies. In some cases, such protests led to violent clashes.

The lawmakers and other leaders have also complained to alliance top brass and government high-ups about these officials' meddling in political activities.

The Government Services (Conduct) Rules, 1979, bars any government employee from taking

part in any political activities. Those who do so also violate the Government Employees (Appeal and Discipline) Rules, 1985, which is a punishable offence.

"According to rules, they (bureaucrats) cannot resort to such practice (involvement in politics). It is not only illegal but also unethical," former adviser to caretaker government Hafiz Uddin Khan told The Daily Star yesterday.

Bureaucrats may have liking for different political parties but they

cannot do politics as long as they are in service, added Hafiz, also former comptroller and auditor general.

The then Dhaka Division special judge Rezaul Karim Khan Chunni (he resigned later) had announced at public meetings in his locality (Kishoreganj) that he would contest the next election as BNP nominee. This drew flak from various sections of the society.

"The physicians expressed satisfaction over the operation. There was no complication during the surgery," M Mokhlesur Rahman Chowdhury, press secretary to the president, said quoting the physicians.

Anti-crime leader gunned down for not paying toll

7 open fire on Torab in front of mosque in Tejgaon

Criminals gunned down the vice-president of a crime resistance committee and also a leader of local BNP reportedly for refusing to pay toll at Tejgaon in the capital yesterday while another person was bullet-hit during the incident.

The deceased, Torab Ali alias Taru, 65, was vice-president of BNP's ward no 39 unit, while the injured was identified as Abdul Halim, 70, owner of a rickshaw garage in the area.

Torab, a trader, was also the vice-president of Nurani Jam-e-Masjid committee on Tejgaon Railway Station Road.

As Torab came out of the mosque after saying his Jum'a prayers at about 2:00pm, seven

assailants, who were seen waiting on three motorbikes near the mosque, sprayed him with bullets, witnesses said.

"I saw Taru bhai [Torab Ali] falling on the ground while the bikers raced towards Tejgaon Railway colony," said a witness, adding that he had heard around eight to ten gunshots.

Halim, who was walking with Torab, received a bullet in his back.

Bullet-riddled Torab was rushed to a local hospital and later transferred to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared him dead.

Halim is undergoing treatment at the DMCH.

Torab's family suspect that Ashiq, a top goon in the city,

masterminded the killing.

In last Ramadan, extortionists demanded Tk 5 lakh and Torab held Dipak, an associate of Ashiq who came to collect the money, and handed him over to police after a beating.

Ashiq's associates, who recently came out of jail and demanded tolls from several other residents in the area, might have committed the revenge murder, said his family.

Another source said feud over formation of the mosque committee might have led to the killing.

Halim from Tulaloti in Raipura upazila in Narsingdi district, Torab Ali was a resident of Tejgaon Station Road.

He left behind seven sons and a daughter.
