

## 432 eminent citizens for Suu Kyi's freedom

Four hundred and thirty two eminent citizens of the country including leaders of political parties and socio-cultural, professional, and rights organisations, civil society leaders and editors of national dailies and weeklies yesterday demanded an end to the incarceration of Aung San Suu Kyi, the leader of Myanmar's democratic struggle.

The call came through a signature campaign on the occasion of the 61st birth anniversary today of Suu Kyi, who has been kept under house arrest by a military junta in Myanmar for over a decade.

## Govt aims to execute militants before tenure's end

Banking on people's expectation of punishment to the militants, the government aims to carry out the execution of top militant leaders before its tenure ends by quickly disposing the cases filed against them in order to achieve political gain.

The government has said it will try to execute the verdict as early as possible "to root out the militants from the land". Many think executing the verdict before the end of the

tenure will "brighten" the image of the alliance government and may have a positive impact on the next parliamentary election.

"It will be a very effective weapon for the ruling four-party alliance during its election campaign," said a ruling party policymaker, noting that the coalition's campaign will bank on its successful fight against the militants.

Besides, execution of the verdicts before handing over power will also enable the government to

counter the local and foreign criticisms that some ruling leaders directly patronised and had links with the militants, he said.

If the death reference bench maintains the serial, the hearing of the Jhalakathi judges killing case is not likely to be held before 2009 as preparation of paper-book and hearing of death reference of different cases of 2003 are going on at present.

## 2,000 AL men get 6-month ad interim bail

The High Court yesterday granted a six-month ad interim anticipatory bail to over 2,000 leaders and activists of Awami League (AL) and its front organisations who were implicated in different cases during the 14-party opposition combine's Dhaka siege programme on June 11 and hartal on June 13-14.

Counsels including Barrister Amir-Ul-Islam, Advocate Abdul Baset Majumder and Barrister Rokonuddin Mahmud moved the bail petition.

The annex building of the High Court where the bail hearing took place became jam-packed as the accused, implicated in different cases filed with Paltan, Ramna,

## Brazil fight their way thru'

AFP, Munich

Five-time champions Brazil advanced to the second round of the World Cup with a hard-earned 2-0 Group F win over Australia here on Sunday.

It took a 49th-minute goal from Adriano to unlock the stout Australian defence but the champions were given a big fright as Australia threw everything at them.

Substitute Fred had a simple tap in for Brazil's second on fulltime to

wrap up the victory after Robinho shot struck the post.

Australia's Dutch coach Guus Hiddink again went for all-out attack to save the match as he did in the last-gasp win over Japan last weekend.

Brazil's win extended their record of successive wins at World Cup finals to nine and has them poised to top the group with next Thursday's final match with Japan.

Brazil broke the deadlock four minutes after halftime when

Ronaldo cleverly held on to the ball from two defenders and laid across goal to Adriano who evaded Scott Chipperfield and fired home for his first goal of the tournament.

But the Australians earned admirers in the way they pushed the Brazilians all the way with German referee Markus Merk not giving them much with his decisions.

Ronaldo was again substituted for the second match of the tournament to whistles from the crowd,

## Cops club agitating workers at DEPZ

### 100 injured, scores of vehicles damaged

More than 100 people were injured as police charged truncheons and lobbed teargas shells on workers' demonstrations at Dhaka Export Processing Zone (DEPZ) yesterday.

Several thousand workers of A-one (BD) Ltd, garments section of Goldtex Ltd and Softex Ltd staged demonstrations after they came to know about indefinite closure of their factories.

The three factories were closed

sine die following a meeting between factory owners and DEPZ General Manager AZM Azizur Rahman on Saturday night.

The workers of A-one (BD) Ltd, which was closed following the workers' unrest as it was severely damaged, became violent around 8:30am after seeing the indefinite closure notice at the main gate of the factory. They had gone to the factory yesterday to know when their demands would be met and

## BB still undecided on Oriental's takeover details

High officials of the Bangladesh Bank (BB) could not come to a decision regarding how to bail Oriental Bank out of the crisis it is in, despite holding several rounds of meetings yesterday.

While the BB decided in principle to takeover the control of the bank, it is still undecided about which section of the Bank Company Act it will apply to get the job done and about who to appoint as the bank's administrator. Sources said a decision might be taken today or tomorrow.

## Only 6,353 to revise voter list of 7.74cr

### UNDP proposes appointment of international consultant

The Election Commission (EC) assigned only 6353 officers at the field level to accomplish the mammoth task of revising the existing voter list, and the commission will hold a meeting today with the cabinet division, and the ministries of establishment and information, seeking assistance from them.

Enumerators and supervisors numbering 2, 72, 406, who had worked for the preparation of the

fresh voter list since January, will not be involved with the task of revising the existing voter list as the EC decided not to go from door to door to get the job done.

A circular issued by the EC Secretariat on June 14 directed field level registration officers and assistant registration officers to start revising the existing voter list, sources said.

These officers were appointed in October last year for preparing

## Primary school teachers continue hunger strike

Teachers of community primary schools wearing shrouds continued their fast-unto-death strike in the capital yesterday keeping their educational institutions across the country under lock and key in support of their demand for nationalisation of jobs.

Two factions of Bangladesh Community Primary Teacher Association started hunger strike in separate places to force the government to realise their five-point demand.

BNP-backed teachers' association have been observing hunger strike at Muktangan from Saturday while Awami League-backed teachers' association started their strike at the Central Shaheed Minar from yesterday.

Both the factions submitted memorandums to the prime minister separately and brought out processions yesterday.

They also vowed to continue



## Costly deal to buy Navy patrol boats

Amid allegations of bid manipulation, Bangladesh Navy is purchasing six high-speed patrol boats for Tk 14.5 crore although it procured the same for only Tk 9 crore last year, competent sources said.

Each of the boats should measure 12 metres in length, have air-conditioned cabins and be equipped with light machine gun (LMG) posts, global positioning system, radar and other sophisticated equipment to help the navy conduct anti-smuggling operations in the deep sea.

Sources said the boats designed by Valiant company of Portugal are yet to be manufactured. But they do not meet the navy's length requirement and also do not show any LMG post.

The comptroller general of audit objected to this procurement last week, asking the Directorate General Defence Purchase (DGDP) why the navy should purchase the six boats at Tk 14.5 crore when it had purchased the same for Tk 9 crore last year.

The DGDP finance department has asked the naval authorities to


## 14-party plans tougher agitation
