CEC sticks to his guns

Trashes possibility of resignation, going door to door for updating voter list

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) MA Aziz yesterday brushed aside the question of his resignation on grounds of triggering controversy over the preparation of the voter list and apprehension about holding the next election on time.

"There is no fear in our mind about holding the next election on time as no adverse situation prevails," he told reporters at his office.

He, however, still remained rigid on his controversial decision not to visit door to door for updating the existing voter list.

The CEC has been claiming that it is not possible to visit door to door for preparing the voter list since the Supreme Court did not so ordain, but the Election Commission (EC) Secretariat yesterday denied having made the remark.

"It is not true that the judgment of the Appellate Division barred visiting door to door [for preparing the voter list]," the EC Secretariat said in a press release issued upon consulting with the CEC.

"In accordance with the verdict, the EC has initiated the procedure for amendment and deletion of names in the voter list following sub-sections (3) and (4) of rule 20 of the Electoral Rolls Rules, 1982, taking the existing electoral roll into consideration. Besides, anyone can apply in form-7 for inclusion of his name in the voter list," it said.

The sub-sections ask people to come to the district and upazila election offices for inclusion, correction and amendment of names in the voter list.

Ironically, the EC initiative


would require a dead person to apply for deleting their name.

Besides the opposition political parties and electoral experts, a number of senior leaders of ruling BNP also expressed dissatisfaction over the CEC's step for preparing the voter list.

AL wants JS body to probe problems

The main opposition Awami League (AL) lawmakers yesterday in the Jatiya Sangsad questioned the present state of the presidency and demanded formation of a parliamentary body to look into what problems President Iajuddin Ahmed is facing in taking his office again.

In a quick response to the opposition lawmakers' criticism, Health and Family Welfare Minister Dr Khandakar Mosharraf Hossain said the president is taking rest on physicians' advice and the Speaker is performing as the acting president as per constitutional provi-

sion.

"There is nothing ambiguous and confusing about the status of presidency and there is only one president in the country," said Mosharraf, also ruling BNP's standing committee member. But he did not say anything about the demand for forming the parliamentary body.

Earlier, AL lawmaker Mohammad Nasim on a point of order said Tk 60 lakh was spent from the public exchequer for the president's treatment in Singapore. "He has returned from Singapore after recovering from his illness but he is not taking the

Hasina finally receives Kolkata award

Saber Chy speaks highly of the organisation on return at ZIA

Awami League (AL) chief Sheikh Hasina returned home yesterday after receiving the Mother Teresa Lifetime Achievement Award for 2005 at a simple function at a hotel in Kolkata, setting aside all speculations.

She also met former chief minister of West Bengal Jyoti Basu during her brief stopover at Kolkata, reports our New Delhi correspondent.

The award, instituted by All India Minorities and Weaker

Section, was given to Hasina for her contribution in the field of governance, politics and social work.

Accepting the award, she said she felt honoured receiving the award named after Nobel Laureate Mother Teresa.

"I think human values should be viewed from a greater perspective and I welcome this initiative of the organisers of the function who gave me this honour," Hasina said.

Twin German terrors rule

Germany's youthful attack dogs Lukas Podolski and Miroslav Klose are on the loose with seven goals between them in a young team which has rapidly blossomed in reaching the last eight.

In contrast to Juergen Klinsmann's fresh-faced young guns, who are both Polish-born, quarterfinal rivals Argentina are looking to wily veteran Hernan Crespo, who is determined to take the albiceleste through to a semi-final on the eve of his 31st birthday on July 5.

German assistant coach Oliver Bierhoff says the Germans are firing on all cylinders, with "gold-i-Poldi" Podolski having found the net three times and Klose going one better.

"Miroslav and Podolski have a burning appetite to win. Podolski is a very clever and gifted player. Now he is drawing his reward," said

Bierhoff of the 21-year-old who looked uncomfortable at the start of the tournament before suddenly exploding.

Klose netted twice in the opening match against Costa Rica and

then twice more against Ecuador before Podolski broke his duck with the third goal against the South American minnows.

HSC exams deferred as teachers stop work

Pry teachers continue their agitation

Government college teachers yesterday refrained from work across the country forcing the Dhaka Education Board to defer all scheduled Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) examinations.

Meanwhile, the government primary schools and community primary schools across the country remained closed as primary teachers are observing indefinite strike at their work place and hunger strike until death in the capital.

HSC exams of Accounting second paper, Geography second paper and Handicrafts second paper under Dhaka Education

Board were deferred to July 1.

Dhaka Education Board however in a press release said the exams were deferred due to unavoidable circumstances.

Under the banner BCS General Education Association, teachers of government colleges, teachers' training colleges and Alia madrasas boycotted classes yesterday demanding no amendment to the Absorption Rules 2000, ensuring regular promotions, ensuring earned leave and creating new posts.
