Staff unwilling to do voter listing again

Blast EC over due remuneration

Over a hundred field level officials in the capital, who were recruited last year and employed during the preparation of the controversial 'fresh voter list' from January to May this year, yesterday expressed their unwillingness to work for the preparation of the electoral rolls from tomorrow.

Field level officials outside the capital also expressed the same view, several district election officers yesterday said, adding that they cannot express their opinion openly, as they are employees in different government offices.

The field level officials -- assistant registration officers (AROs) -- who are mostly school teachers, at a meeting with an election officer under Dhaka district, also blasted the Election Commission (EC) for not providing them with due remuneration for the voter listing job.

Voter list revision set to bite the dust

EC discourages prospective voters by imposing complicated procedures for enrolment, not going door to door

The Election Commission (EC) starts the month-long task for updating the voter list tomorrow but many have doubted the success of the attempt for preparing a flawless electoral roll by following strict procedures and without door-to-door visits.

With controversy still going on over the EC decision compelling people to apply for getting listed with a raft of documents, the preparation for the voter-listing task remains in disorder due to a lack of proper directives and planning of the EC Secretariat, sources said.

Field level election officials and electoral experts feared the initiative will ultimately turn futile again, like the preparation of the fresh voter list, putting holding of

the next parliamentary elections on time in uncertainty.

In accordance with the EC procedure, intending voters will have to submit a receipt of municipal tax or house rent or payment to local guards, and an affidavit of proof of age or an attested copy of SSC certificate with the application on a prescribed form.

Field level election officials said a large number of eligible voters may remain out of the list while huge fake ones and those who died in the last few years will be in the existing electoral roll prepared in 2000.

According to an EC calculation, over one crore people have become eligible for voting since 2000.

Meanwhile, a number of district election officers said those who had earlier contacted the election

officials for registering their names are now unwilling to get listed because of the strict provisions.

"Many people will not be able to submit such required documents along with the application even if the election officials visit door to door," a district election officer told The Daily Star on condition of anonymity.

On deletion of fake names from the existing list, the election officials said they cannot delete any name from the list unless any application is filed. "But who is going to apply for deleting names of voters who are fake or have died in the last few years?" a district election officer said.

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) MA Aziz on April 25 said an NDI survey in 2005 reported that

Tariffs on 4,271 items to decrease as Safta takes effect tomorrow

Bangladesh will reduce tariffs on 4,271 items by five per cent on average by December 31, 2008 under South Asian Free Trade Area (Safta) agreement taking effect tomorrow.

National Board of Revenue (NBR) yesterday issued a circular stating that the tariff rates will be reduced in three phases.

The first phase begins on July 1 and will end on December this year. The second phase will start on January 1 of the next year and continue till December while the third phase will be the year 2008.

Following discussions with the Saarc countries, Bangladesh will bring the tariff down to zero per cent by 2015 of those 4,271 imports, the circular stated.

UDICHI VERDICT Babar blames AL for weak charge sheet

State Minister for Home Lutfuzzaman Babar yesterday said in parliament that the previous Awami League (AL) government did not properly prepare the charge sheet in the 1999 Uddihi blast case.

"Awami League government tried to influence the investigation and used the case politically that may have led to such a verdict [acquittal of all the 23 accused]," Babar said replying to a question of opposition Jatiya Party lawmaker GM Quader.

GM Quader, on the other hand, criticised the police for failure to investigate the case properly.

Big boys ready to roll

The World Cup returns with a bang on Friday after a two-day break as the hosts kick off the first of the heavyweight quarterfinal battles. Germany are in the last eight for the 15th time in 16 attempts and face Argentina for the fifth time at a finals.

Their last meeting was the 1990 showpiece when Germany coach Juergen Klinsmann was in the team that triumphed 1-0 to take revenge for the 1986 final which the South Americans won 3-2.

Neutrals will hope Friday's game in Berlin resembles the exciting five-goal Mexico City encounter rather than the dull Rome decider, settled by Andreas Brehme's penalty.

Germany have improved with each game in this tournament and have a real belief that they can end their six-year run without a victory over one of the world's leading soccer nations.

Argentina, who sparked in their 6-0 group stage thrashing of Serbia and Montenegro, were made to work hard by Mexico in the second

round and the match looks enticingly close to call.

The opposite is true in Friday's second game where Italy, despite making hard work of Australia, are heavy favourites to get past a Ukraine team who limped into the last eight via a penalty shootout after a dire goalless draw with Switzerland.

Of the last eight, the Ukrainians

-- who are making their debut at a World Cup finals -- are the only team to have lost a game and have also scored fewer goals and conceded at least twice as many as each of the other quarterfinalists.

Saturday begins with England facing Portugal in a repeat of the Eurp 2004 quarterfinal in Lisbon when the host nation triumphed

Budget passed in AL's absence

The Jatiya Sangsad yesterday passed the national budget for the fiscal year 2006-07 in the absence of the main opposition Awami League (AL) as they had walked out of the House.

The FY07 budget that will be implemented from July 1, 2006 outlines Tk 88,732 crore of gross expenditure, including revenue and development, and Tk 69,740 crore of net expenditure.

In the budget for FY07, the education ministry has received a maximum allocation of Tk 6,182 crore in both development and non-development sectors.

Ministers in JS under fire for price hike, crimes

Opposition lawmakers in parliament yesterday fired a broadside against the ministries of commerce, home and primary and mass education for price spiral of essentials, deteriorating law and order and irregularities in recruiting primary school teachers.

The ministers concerned rejected the allegations and said the law and order has improved considerably while prices of necessities are now 'quite reasonable'.

Awami League (AL) and Jatiya

Party (Ershad) lawmakers took a swipe at the government also for undermining the judiciary by appointing inept persons as judges. They said the administration has been grossly politicised in the last four and a half years.

The opposition members were participating in a discussion on budgetary allocation for different ministries.

They said the government has failed to deliver. It has done nothing to address the severe problems besetting the countrymen.

Finance Minister M Saifur

Rahman told the House that a decision regarding the demands of the agitating schoolteachers will be taken by July 25. Replying on behalf of the primary and mass education ministry, he stressed the importance of improving the quality of teachers. Prime Minister Khaleda Zia is in charge of primary and mass education ministry.

Law Minister Moudud Ahmed said there has not been any corruption or nepotism in appointments by the government.

Opposition to snap rail, road, river links

Plans to intensify pressure on govt for electoral reforms

Awami League (AL) led 14-party opposition combine will seek to halt road, rail and river communications across the country on July 2 to press home its demands for electoral reforms and resignation of the chief election commissioner (CEC).

The mainstream opposition parties plan to blockade highways, rail tracks and waterways from

9:00am to 3:00pm in Dhaka and elsewhere in the country. They have already warned the law enforcers that there will be stiff resistance if the latter try to foil the programme.

Leader of the Opposition and AL president Sheikh Hasina announced the programme after a 36-hour countrywide shutdown on June 13-14. Earlier, the opposition camp had observed programmes

Man dies of 'police torture'

A man died yesterday allegedly of police torture in the capital.

Relatives of Abdul Karim, 47, of Anandabazar in Ramna who used to rent out horse-drawn carriages, alleged Ramna police arrested him on Monday and beat him up severely for not paying the toll of Tk 5,000.

Police produced him before a Dhaka court after he fell sick on Tuesday. The court sent him to Dhaka Central Jail on the same day.

He fell sick again around 3:00am yesterday in jail and was rushed to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where he succumbed to his injuries after an hour.
