25 NRBs to get CIP status

The government has decided to declare 25 non-resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) commercially important persons (CIPs) for their outstanding record of sending remittance, investing money and bringing Bangladeshi goods.

The Ministry of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment prepared a list of the NRBs and sent it to the cabinet committee. The proposal is likely to be placed before the next cabinet meeting for final approval, sources said.

A draft on manpower export policy of the government is also likely to be placed before the next cabinet meeting.

The draft, also awaiting cabinet approval, has been prepared on the basis of discussions with various

Israel bombs Palestinian prime minister's office

An Israeli helicopter fired a missile into the empty office of Palestinian Prime Minister Ismail Haniyeh yesterday in an apparent signal the Hamas leader could be targeted unless militants released an abducted soldier.

The air strike was part of a military offensive in the Gaza Strip that has been coupled with statements from Israeli leaders that no one in the Hamas-led government should believe he was immune from attack.

"We will strike anyone who harms the citizens of Israel. No one will go unpunished," Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert told his cabinet in broadcast remarks, without mentioning Haniyeh by name.

Haniyeh was not in the office at

the time of the strike, witnesses said. He arrived quickly to survey the damage.

"This is the policy of the jungle and arrogance," Haniyeh told Reuters. "Nothing will affect our spirit and nothing will affect our steadfastness."

One Hamas member was killed in a second attack on an office used by forces loyal to the Islamic militant group, whose charter calls for Israel's destruction. A third strike hit a Hamas school, but there were no casualties.

Israel, which pulled out of the Gaza Strip last year, sent troops and tanks into the south of the territory on Wednesday after Palestinian gunmen, some from the armed wing of Hamas, seized Corporal Gilad Shalit in a cross-border raid a week

ago.

"I have ordered the military and defence officials to use their power and wisdom to pursue these terrorists, and those who dispatch them, provide their ideology and sponsor them," Olmert said. "I reiterate -- no one will be exempt."

Israel last assassinated top Hamas leaders in 2004, killing Sheikh Ahmed Yassin and Abdel-Aziz al-Rantissi.

With a Palestinian humanitarian crisis looming, Israel reopened Karni, the main commercial crossing into the Gaza Strip, and witnesses said fuel shipments began rolling across the frontier.

33 trawlers missing in Bay

At least 33 fishing trawlers with 426 crewmembers and fishermen are missing on the Bay of Bengal after they were caught in a sudden storm on Saturday.

Most of the missing trawlers sailed from Patharghata and Kalapara coasts of Barguna and Patuakhali on Thursday.

The local administration or the owners of the trawlers made no attempts to send a search and rescue team out to sea as turbulent weather prevails over the bay.

Local weather office declared Cautionary Signal No-3 and advised vessels to take shelter close to the shore. They asked fishermen not to go out to sea until the weather improved.

Meanwhile, pirates allegedly kept 180 fishermen and crewmembers of 15 trawlers hostage after the boats took shelter in the narrow canals of Sundarbans during the Saturday's storm.

Zaman Majhi, a crewmember of a trawler after escaping the clutches of the pirates, said the pirates wanted Tk 2 lakhs as ransom for each trawler and its crewmembers.

The police and the local administration are yet to launch a rescue operation due to adverse weather.

Patients suffer as RMCH interns continue strike

The patients admitted to the Rangpur Medical College Hospital (RMCH) have been facing untold sufferings, as the intern doctors' strike continued for second consecutive day yesterday.

The Intern Doctors Association at RMCH called the indefinite strike on Thursday to press their two point demands.

These include taking immediate actions against the people responsible for attack on the association president Ali Reza and demolition of the unauthorised structures on the college campus.

RMCH Director Shahjahan Biswas yesterday met the association leaders and requested them to withdraw their strike, but they refused to do it until their demands are met.

"A case was lodged against some locals who allegedly beat up an intern doctor and a college student," Shahjahan Biswas told the journalists expressing hope that the police will take action against them soon.

Regarding demolition of the shops inside RMCH campus, the director said that he conveyed the subject to the committee concerned.

US may cut millions in aid to Nepal

The United States has warned it could cut off millions of dollars in annual aid to Nepal if communist rebels join the proposed interim government without disarming.

The Maoist rebels, who have waged a decade-long war to seize control of the Himalayan nation, declared a cease-fire and began peace talks earlier this year after weeks of street protests and a general strike forced King Gyanendra to relinquish absolute power.

They also announced they would join an interim government that will be formed with the seven main political parties that organised the protests against the king in April.

It remains unclear whether the Maoists will give up the weapons

they used to seize much of rural Nepal. The issue wasn't mentioned when the governing deal was announced, but government officials say the rebels agreed to resolve it before the interim administration is formed.

"If the Maoists continue to use violence after they enter the government our law says that we can't supply assistance to those who support a terrorist group. We have to consider them a consider a terrorist group until they give up arms," US Ambassador to Nepal James F. Moriarty said.

Moriarty's remarks came after he met with Prime Minister Girija Prasad Koirala on Saturday.

The US gives Nepal \$45 million in annual aid for development, education and health services. It

2 Britons, 21 others die in Afghan clash

Coalition air strikes have killed eight Taliban in southern Afghanistan after two soldiers, an interpreter and 12 other rebels died in a major battle.

The latest deaths came as Operation Mountain Thrust, the biggest anti-Taliban operation since the extremists were removed from government in 2001, pushed on in the south.

Warplanes dropped bombs on a group of rebels in Sangin district of Helmand province early Sunday, the provincial police chief said.

"The movement and the group of

Taliban were detected first in the area and then the planes bombed them," police chief Mohammad Nabi Mullah Khail said. Among the dead was a local commander, he said.

The coalition did not immediately confirm the strikes.

The bombing followed an attack on a British base in Sangin late Saturday with small arms and rocket-propelled grenade fire in which two British soldiers and an Afghan interpreter were killed, the British military said.

Four coalition soldiers were also wounded in the battle, in which

Khulna Jubo League leader brutally killed

Police recovered body of Awami Jubo League leader Abu Zafar Shaikh, 40, at noon yesterday from bank of the river Atai under Terokheda upazila in Khulna.

His eyes were gouged out and his abdomen was severely stabbed.

Police said Abu Zafar was kidnapped by masked criminals from Lashkarpur bazar on way to his house at Nishipur village under the same upazila after watching world cup football match on Friday night.

The slain Jubo league leader, son of Alek Shaikh, was a teacher of Parhejigram Govt Primary School of Terokheda upazila.

Members of his family suspect extremists' involvement in the murder while police said the murder might have been the result of a land dispute.

Paban denied bail again

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected the bail petition of Aktar Hamid Paban, son of Chief Whip Khandakar Delwar Hossain, for the fourth time after he was arrested on charge of carjacking on June 7.

Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Shafique Anwar passed the order following the hearing.

Earlier, separate courts rejected Paban's bail petitions thrice saying that the charges brought against him were primarily proved. Moreover, Paban's accomplice Zahirul Islam Robin confessed to a magistrate that he and Paban were involved with an organised carjacking ring.

Archaeological sites pillaged

A large number of ornamental terracotta pieces and other ancient antiques have been stolen from different archaeological sites, including declared world heritage Paharpur Monument in Naogaon district.

According to an Archaeology Department survey report, at least 5,000 archaeological sites in Rajshahi Division have lost their glory and original structures due to a lack of proper supervision and negligence of the government.

A senior police officer in Bogra said a group of raiders has been stealing terracotta plaques, statues, ancient coins and antiques—as old as more than 1,200 years—from different monuments and temples at the protected and unprotected archaeological sites.

These sites include Paharpur in Naogaon, Annik Temple at Putia in Rajshahi, Mahasthangarh and Jogirbhaban in Bogra.

The deputy commissioners concerned and the law enforcement agencies were informed about the treasure hunting groups.

A senior official of the Archaeology Department told The Daily Star that these stolen terracotta and other antique objects are openly sold at a market in the capital's Gulshan-2. He said the tags on these antiques even bear the historic sites' names they were collected from.

The existing Antiquities Act of 1968, however, strictly

Rich, powerful flout ban on tinted glass on autos

Use of tinted glass on luxurious private automobiles has become very common lately despite a ban on such usage.

Considering the growing demand, unscrupulous traders are importing automobiles fitted with tinted glasses and selling them at showrooms openly. Glasses are being tinted with special papers in

some cases to meet the demand, sources said.

Customs officials at ports and officials of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA), who are supposed to prevent such practices, are issuing clearances and registrations for automobiles fitted with tinted glasses in exchange of bribes.

According to traffic police, tinted glass is generally used on vehicles

carrying the president and the prime minister of the country, and ambassadors and high commissioners of diplomatic missions in Dhaka for security reasons.

The ministry of home affairs sometimes gives permission to very important persons (VIPs) in exceptional cases considering the necessity.

"Import of vehicles fitted with
