

BIRTH REGISTRATION PROGRAMME LAUNCHED

# 100pc registration by 2 years

Ensuring citizens' rights and protecting children from early marriage, child labour, child prostitution and youth detention, the government is going to implement the Birth and Death Registration Act 2004.

With this end in view, universal birth registration programme was launched yesterday to bring cent

percent population under the birth registration within the next two years.

LGRD and Co-operatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan launched the programme at Osmani Memorial Auditorium in the city.

"Birth and death registration act was first introduced in Bangladesh in 1873 but it was not implemented due to lack of awareness of people.

But it is very important to count the age-based population and for this reason we have enacted the law adjusting the present need," said the minister.

He said birth registration will be needed in school admission, getting jobs, incorporating the name in voter list and collecting passport.

The programme will also be very helpful with regard to early mar-

riage, child labour, child prostitution and youth detention, he added.

"Steps have been taken to prepare electronic birth registration database in city corporations, municipalities and union parishads. A software named BRIS has already been developed for making data based information," said the minister.

Bhuiyan said linking the electronic birth registrar to a child immunisation database would ensure vaccination of all registered children on time.

Speaking as special guest Health and Family Welfare Minister Khandaker Mosarrat Hossain said the birth registration will also be very helpful in medical services.

"Birth registration will ensure a healthy life as it helps determine patients' age which is essential in health services especially when doctors give prescription," he added.

Rosella Morelli, officer-in-charge of Unicef Bangladesh, said birth registration prevents early marriage, ensures that all children are enrolled in school at the right age, protects underage children from working and ensures special treatment for children in juvenile justice system.

State Minister for LGRD Ziaul Huq Zia said the Convention on the Rights of the Child states that a child shall be registered immediately after birth and shall have the right to a name, the right to acquire a nationality and the right to be cared by parents.

Secretary to Local Government Division SM Zahrul Islam presided over the function where Country Director of Plan Bangladesh Espy Ned also spoke.

## HC stays fresh surcharge collection by feeder operators

The High Court yesterday stayed for two months the collection of congestion surcharge imposed by Chittagong feeder vessel operators on Chittagong Portbound containers.

A High Court bench passed the interim order following a writ petition filed by Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) challenging the legality of imposition of the surcharge.

The Chittagong feeder vessel operators imposed the congestion surcharges on Chittagong-bound containers on June 5, which would cost the country over Tk 60 crore a month in foreign exchange.

## Victory at UN CEDAW body reflects int'l recognition: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday said Bangladesh's win in election as member of the UN CEDAW Committee is an international recognition of the country's achievement in women's welfare and rights.

She made the remarks when newly elected member of the Convention on Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) Committee Ferdous Ara Begum made a courtesy call on her at the PMO.

The Bangladesh candidate, Ferdous Ara, grabbed the first position bagging the ever-highest 140 votes. Twelve countries were elected members of the CEDAW committee out of 23 countries in the race for election held in the UN

Headquarters in New York on June 23. A total of 183 member countries cast their vote.

Other elected members are Japan (131) Mauritius (128), Slovenia (116) the Netherlands (116), Croatia (112), Algeria (110), Egypt (105), Thailand (100) Ghana (97), Israel (96) and South Africa (94).

Congratulating Ferdous Ara on her election, Khaleda said the country would have to do more for the welfare and improving the lot of the womenfolk.

"Those women personalities who remain in various good positions here can play an important role in improving the fate of those women lagging behind," the UN CEDAW member said.

She said Bangladesh has been elected following multifaceted progress and action of the government under the leadership of Khaleda in women's affairs, including women's education, empowerment and employment, as well as bold steps and measures against women repression, including dowry, acid throwing and women trafficking.

"These steps and achievement have created a positive impression in external world about Bangladesh," the UN CEDAW member said.
