Azzurri celebrate in style

One million Romans faced a tough morning Tuesday after losing themselves in festive frenzy for their victorious World Cup football team, which wrested the title from France.

Rome's left-wing mayor, Walter Veltroni, estimated that one million people had turned out to welcome home the conquering heroes as the team held a victory parade through the city Monday.

Men, women and children screamed their joy as skipper Fabio Cannavaro proudly held aloft the gold trophy at the front of an open-topped bus. People scrambled atop stationary public transport buses and even Carabinieri Land Rovers to get a better vantage point as the bus turned into Piazza Venezia.

The team, some wrapped in the Italian tricolour, seemed eager to encourage even greater excitement as the bus inched its way through the throng.

The trophy in one hand, Cannavaro cupped a palm to his ear as if to encourage an even louder

response from the crowd, while Alessandro Del Piero stood precariously on a seat and pumped his arms up and down like a rock star.

"They're passing in front of me now, and they're beautiful, very beautiful. Bellissimi! It's stupendal!" screamed a young girl into a cellphone, as the bus toured the historic centre of the city.

Prime Minister Romano Prodi, perhaps indulging in a childhood dream, could not resist holding the cup aloft as he hosted a victory reception for the heroes at his offices earlier.

"We here at home shared with you a tension and suffering without equal," during the month-long competition, Prodi told the 23-member squad, many of whom proudly wore their gold winners' medals over their suits.

"Thanks for reminding the younger generation that achievement is wrought with effort, sweat and commitment," added Prodi. "Grazie. All Italians love you!"

The prime minister, whose beleaguered government is hoping to ride a wave of optimism to revive a near moribund economy after the World Cup triumph, handed each of the players a medal during the reception.

The event began more than 90 minutes behind schedule after the team bus, followed by a cacophonous posse of scooters trailing flags, was repeatedly slowed to a crawl on its way into the city.

The team's plane had touched down at a military airbase outside Rome two hours earlier, and fans who had waited hours to welcome them finally erupted into cheers when Cannavaro emerged onto the gangway with the trophy.

Italy's air force acrobatic team, trailing smoke, painted the sky in the green, white and red colours of the national flag during repeated flypasts.

But the biggest reception was yet to come, as hundreds of thousands of fans waited for hours at the Circus Maximus, the venue for a giant victory party after the parade.

Pride of place at the venue was given to a black hearse wrapped in the French tricolour.

Players and supporters celebrated for about an hour, singing the national anthem and other songs, before the team left shortly before midnight followed immediately into the streets by the noisy crowd to a concert of car horns and shouts of joy.

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Zidane the winner in losing finale

The 2006 World Cup final will be remembered more for a headbutt than the fact Italy won the world's most desirable sporting prize for the fourth time, press reports suggested Tuesday.

Two days after Italy beat France in a penalty shootout in Berlin, few commentators spared a thought for the winners.

Instead they pondered what could have driven the iconic Zinedine Zidane, with the score deadlocked at 1-1, to charge Italian defender Marco Materazzi's and be sent off after 110 minutes of grueling play.

The Italian has denied calling the Frenchman a terrorist, saying he didn't even know what the word meant, while Zidane's agent has said he will wait a few days before commenting.

The media on Tuesday attempted to fill in the blanks, with British newspapers claiming video analysis suggested the French captain retaliated to insults from the notorious Inter Milan hardman.

The Times reported that expert

lip reader Jessica Rees, after exhaustive study of the match video, had deduced Materazzi called Zidane "The son of a terrorist whore", adding: "So just **** off".

Lip readers for The Daily Mail and The Sun came to the same conclusion, pointing out the remarks would have enraged the Marseille-born Zidane, whose parents are Algerian and who has often expressed pride in his Berber origins.

The controversy dominated headlines in Algeria, where people had followed the World Cup exploits of the resurgent French squad with as much excitement as if it were their own national team.

While the consensus there was that whatever Materazzi said, Zidane's reaction was unforgivable, editorialists in neighbouring Tunisia were more sympathetic.

Le Temps suggested the Italian had been racist, concluding: "If one day history has the courage to condemn Materazzi it will find in favour of this magician of the round ball without whom France would never have won the World Cup."

Newspapers in Germany and Spain also turned their attention to the Italian defender while falling short of an outright pardon for his adversary.

"The whole nation wonders why, the whole world speculates over the provocation of Materazzi," said Der

Tagesspiegel.

Popular daily Bild published a huge photograph of the now-famous blow, declaring "Football's God has brought himself to Earth and landed in hell", while Die Welt evoked "the sporting suicide of a genius."

"He insulted his mother and called him a terrorist," ran the headline in Spanish sports daily Marca, adding that Zidane often concluded recent interviews with the words, "I love you, Mum."

Yet the newspaper said neither player could be excused and called on them to bury the hatchet.

El Pais recalled that Zidane had been sent off 14 times in his career, including a five-match ban for headbutting SV Hamburg's Jochen Kientz in October 2000 and as recently as April 2005 for attempting to punch Villarreal defender Quique Alvarez.

"Never has a player wrecked a life's work in such an idiotic way," thundered right-wing Hungarian daily Magyar Nemzet, while Bulgaria's 24 Hours declared that two heads, those of Zidane and Materazzi, who headed home Italy's equalising goal, had decided the 18th World Cup.

The mystery also dominated the front pages of newspapers in football-mad Indonesia, the world's

Tigers likely to start African trip Jul 23

The Bangladesh cricket team are likely to leave Dhaka on July 23 to play a five-match one-day international series against Zimbabwe.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has decided to go five days ahead of the first ODI which is scheduled for July 29 as Kenya Cricket has requested them to put back this month's proposed three-match series.

"We are trying to arrange a warm-up match before the series in Zimbabwe. That is why the Cricket Committee has decided to send the team on July 23. Cricket Kenya rescheduled the matches on August 10, 12, 14 but we are yet to finalise the dates as both president and general secretary are abroad," said BCB joint-secretary Rafique Islam Babu yesterday.

The Tigers were due to leave for Nairobi on July 16 with matches scheduled on July 19, 22 and 23 but the series became uncertain as Cricket Kenya reportedly failed to arrange adequate sponsorship for

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FIFA will probe Zidane send-off

FIFA announced on Tuesday it had opened a disciplinary investigation into the actions of French skipper Zinedine Zidane who was sent off in the World Cup final for head-butting an Italian opponent.

A FIFA press release said that in a dramatic final there were incidents towards the end of the match that they wanted to clarify. "Referee Horacio Elizondo sent off French player Zinedine Zidane for an act of violence against Marco Materazzi in the 110th minute," FIFA said.

"The incident was directly observed (without the use of a monitor) by fourth official Luis Medina Cantalejo from his position

at the pitchside, who informed the referee and his assistants through the communications system.

FIFA will open a disciplinary investigation into Zidan's conduct to enable it to clarify the circumstances surrounding the incident as exactly as possible."

Zidane became just the fourth player to be sent off in a World Cup final when he rammed his head into the chest of Italian defender Marco Materazzi in the second period of extra-time knocking him to the ground.

The referee did not see the off-the-ball incident but pulled out his red card after consulting one of his linesmen.

The game went to penalties which Italy won 5-3.

Any disciplinary action against Zidane will be largely symbolic as he has already announced his retirement as a professional football player.

Materazzi denies 'terrorist' claim

Marco Materazzi has dismissed claims that Zinedine Zidane turned and head-butted him after calling the French ace a "terrorist".

The former Juventus playmaker ended his career in disgrace on Sunday when he reacted violently to something said by the Italian during the World Cup Final.

But Materazzi has distanced himself from claims that he threw the word "terrorist" at the 34-year-old.

"The whole world saw what happened on television," the ex-Perugia man, who scored in the Final, stated.

"Terrorist? It's not true, I did not call him a terrorist," he added. "I'm ignorant, I don't even know what the word means."

Zidane has yet to reveal his version of events, but a host of media organisations all over the world have been employing lip-readers to shed light on what made Zizou lose control.

According to the BBC, Materazzi is alleged to have said: "I wish an ugly death to you and all your family. Go **** yourself."
