DOOR-TO-DOOR VOTER LIST UPDATING EC makes a bad start

The Election Commission (EC) yesterday began the much-talked about voter list update by visiting door to door amid disruption as most of the field-level election officers did not work on the weekend.

The EC Secretariat began the updating task without enough publicity and preparation across the country. In many areas, there was no activity at all, as necessary papers were yet to arrive there, sources said.

A few election officers yesterday engaged themselves in voter listing and the same could happen today, also a holiday. However, the officials at EC Secretariat are hopeful that the work will switch to a full mode tomorrow.

DHAKA Field level election workers in the capital said they are facing serious problems, as 80 per cent of the people could not be traced to the addresses in the previous voter list. On the other hand, the teachers who have been appointed for the voter listing now do not want to get involved in the job.

After visiting more than 100 houses in the capital, it has been clear that the election officers did not visit 10 per cent of those. However, Deputy Election Commissioner Abul Kashem for Dhaka told reporters that he has information that election officers have begun their work in many parts of the city. He, however, admitted that there was little progress on the first day.

Talking to The Daily Star, many ward commissioners in the city said they have not seen any voter listing work in their areas. Shahida Morshed, commissioner of ward no 63 said there were no activities of the election officers in her ward.

Many people of the old town said no election officers came to their houses for voter listing. "I have waited for the entire day in my house to be on the voter list, but no one came," Latifa Rahman, a housewife at KM Das lane in old town, told The Daily Star.

The same was the scenario in almost all parts of the capital yesterday.

The finance ministry on Thursday informed the Election Commission (EC) Secretariat that Tk 39 crore has been allocated for the job. The ministry earlier instructed the EC Secretariat to

submit accounts of its previous expenditure of Tk 43 crore for preparing the controversial fresh voter list declared illegal by the Supreme Court.

The EC Secretariat also informed that the recruitment of assistant officials has been completed. A total of 1,35487 staff will visit from door to door across the country to revise the voter list by August 10.

DIFFERENT DISTRICTS Dinajpur District Election official's sources confirmed that the necessary papers for the voter list revision have yet to arrive there. During field visits, our Dinajpur correspondent found that most of the election officers of the district know nothing about the door to door visits.

Similarly, 131 AROs and 3,261 staff did not operate on the first day. Similar reports came from all 13 upazilas of Dinajpur.

According to our correspondent in Kushtia, no enumerator was seen visiting door to door in the town yesterday. Some AROs of the district said the enumerators might be staying at home as it was weekend yesterday.

The Jagannath University authorities have decided at a meeting Thursday to extend the university's closure till July 24 fearing further clashes among the feuding student organisations.

The decision came after Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) and Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) informed the authorities that Islami Chhatra Shibir (ICS) has been planning to carry out attacks on them soon after the reopening of the university on July 20.

Earlier, the university authorities declared a 3-day closure after July 17 when at least 100 students and several policemen were injured as ICS clashed with the

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Japanese FM to hold talks with president, PM and FM

Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Aso will arrive in Dhaka on Monday on a two-day official visit to exchange views on enhancing Japan-Bangladesh relations and other topics.

During his three-nation tour, the Japanese foreign minister will visit the Philippines, Bangladesh and Malaysia, a release of Japanese embassy in Dhaka said yesterday.

In Bangladesh, Taro Aso will have talks with President Iajuddin Ahmed, Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan.

During his meeting with the Bangladesh leaders, the Japanese foreign minister will exchange views on enhancing Japan-Bangladesh relations, and regional and international issues of common concern.

"The Bangladeshi side is looking forward to welcoming the Japanese foreign minister in Dhaka as his visit is considered to be very important," said a senior foreign ministry official.

Dhaka will reiterate its request for duty free access of Bangladeshi products to reduce trade deficit, more Japanese investment, and financial support for the proposed Padma bridge during the talks with the Japanese foreign minister, sources said.

Israel mobilises troops for ground invasion

Tel Aviv asks civilians to quit south Lebanon; 5 civilians, 4 Israeli soldiers killed; Beirut ready to go into war

Israel waged deadly strikes against Lebanon for the 10th day yesterday and mobilised more troops after warning it could launch a full-scale ground invasion -- despite mounting international calls for a ceasefire.

"The army called up several thousand reserves in order to strengthen our forces against Hezbollah," a military source said after the army again warned residents of bomb-hit southern Lebanon to flee.

Beirut said its army was ready to go into battle if Israel invaded, an action that would sharply raise the stakes in a conflict that has killed close to 340 people in Lebanon and raised fears of a humanitarian catastrophe.

Waving white scarves, residents of the south streamed to safer havens in the north as buses and boats continued to ferry thousands of foreigners out of Lebanon in one of the biggest mass evacuations since World War II.

Israeli combat jets and artillery were back in action in raids that killed four people in the eastern town of Baalbek -- a Hezbollah

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Criminal killed in Raozan 'shootout'

A listed criminal was killed reportedly in a shootout between police and his cohorts at Raozan upazila in the district in the early hours yesterday.

Nilu Barua, 35, was an accused in six cases filed for various crimes including murder, sources said.

Police also recovered a locally made gun, a revolver, a booster and some cartridges from the spot.

According to sources, police arrested Nilu at South Kadabpur under Raozan upazila Thursday evening.

Acting on information obtained from him during interrogation, a team of Raozan Police taking Nilu with them went to Pahartoli at around 3:15am yesterday to nab his accomplices and recover firearms.

As they reached the area, Nilu's cohorts opened fire on them. Police returned fire that resulted in a gunfight.

At one stage of the shootout, Nilu trying to escape was hit by bullets.

He was rushed to Raozan Health Complex where the doctors on duty declared him dead on arrival, sources said.

Three policemen were also injured in the gunfight and were undergoing treatment at Chittagong Metropolitan Police Hospital, they added.

Malaysia to hire workers thru' private sector

With the withdrawal of ban on Bangladesh manpower export to Kuala Lumpur would be limited to overseeing the process on the basis of information from the Malaysian government and Baira.

Recruiting agencies in Bangladesh have lauded the Malaysian decision saying this will reduce corruption in manpower business. Introduction of computerised system will make this sector hassle-free and transparent and create scope for reducing migration cost.

Malaysia will maintain a computerised system for selection of workers in Dhaka and processing approval letters, visa, work permit and other formalities in Malaysia, sources in the expatriates' welfare ministry said.

Fifty 50 percent of foreign workers of any company in Malaysia can now be recruited from Bangladesh.

Under the first ever government-private sector joint management in

manpower export, the role of Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur would be limited to overseeing the process on the basis of information from the Malaysian government and Baira.

According to a high official, the Bangladesh mission in Malaysia has sent a letter to the government saying that on Bangladesh side, Baira will be responsible for selecting workers through various recruiting agencies and completion of other formalities including medical examination and a short training course for them.

The Malaysian home ministry will have a foreign workers cell called Division-N in the Foreign Workers Management Wing to process and approve all demand

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
