

EC reforms a must for acceptable polls

Nagrik Committee consultation session told

Democracy within the political parties, transparency in their financing and accountability at all stages of their activities need to be ensured to establish a participatory democracy in the country, said speakers at an expert group consultation yesterday.

A free and fair election is not possible under the present chief election commissioner (CEC), they said stressing that reforms in the Election Commission (EC) should be carried out immediately so that the next polls are acceptable to all.

Nagrik Committee 2006 organised the discussion on 'Vision 2021 for Bangladesh: Goal 1: To Become a Participatory Democracy' at Cirdap auditorium in Dhaka.

Professor Rehman Sobhan, convener of the committee and also

chairman of Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), chaired the meeting.

Awami League (AL) lawmaker Abdur Razzak said it is true that there are some weaknesses in practising democracy within the parties and there are scopes to further strengthen it.

"But as far as my party is concerned, it's not entirely true that there is no intra-party democracy at all," he said citing examples of elections at thana and district levels to choose party leadership.

It is not desirable that a person who has money now wants to be a lawmaker no matter if he is qualified for it or not, he observed.

A lawmaker has very little to contribute under the present parliamentary system and parliament will not be effective without strengthening the local governments, added

the opposition lawmaker.

It is very unfortunate that despite being a sitting judge, the present CEC had cheated people by feigning sick to avert meeting the visitors.

Zahiruddin Swapan, a ruling party lawmaker, underscored the need for institutionalising the electoral process with a vision so that elections are free from any influence.

He suggested introducing identity cards for the citizens that, he thinks, will help to bring greater accountability in the election systems.

Saying that science and information technologies have brought about a significant change in everyday life in the last 15 years, he urged the Nagrik Committee to choose party leadership.

Compath fined for using date-expired products

A mobile court yesterday found serious irregularities and an unhygienic environment at Compath Limited, a notable diagnostic centre in the city, and fined the centre Tk 50,000.

The mobile court, led by Magistrate Narayan Chandra Devnath, raided the Compath Limited on Elephant Road and found date-expired reagents, which are used for laboratory tests. The court also found date-expired surgical pipes.

"We found that the lab technicians did not have any diploma on conducting the experiments and the director general of the health office did not certify them either," said a member of the mobile court.

He also said the diagnostics centre did not have permission from the Atomic Energy Commission.

Later the court raided Manin Chinese Restaurant and fined it Tk 10,000 for unhygienic condition.

Shibir men beat up RU exam controller

Islami Chhatra Shibir (ICS) thugs physically assaulted the Rajshahi University (RU) controller of examinations and his associates yesterday as he refused to hand over a certificate to the ICS men in absence of the certificate owner.

Monirul Islam, president of Madar Bux Hall unit of ICS, went to the certificate issuing section of the university administrative building at around 1:00pm along with a group of men to collect the provisional certificate on behalf of organising secretary Delwar Hossain Saidy of RUICS.

The gang of ICS men were enraged and attacked the certificate issuing officer Abdul Matin as he refused to hand over Saidy's certificate to them after explaining the regulation of issuing certificates only to the certificate holder, camp sources said.

The Controller of Examinations Dr Anwar Hossain also came under ICS physical attack as he arrived at the scene with a contingent of police and asked the ICS men to leave the office.

Later, more than one hundred infuriated ICS activists led by its General Secretary Nur Muhammad Mandal threatened Dr Anwar with dire consequences while Proctor Enamul Haque, Sher-e-Bangla Hall Provost Aslam Hossain, three assistant proctors and other officials were present.

BSF kills 1

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) gunned down a Bangladeshi youth in Balaibangla upazila of Thakurgaon district yesterday morning.

The victim was identified as Mohammad Golam Mostafa, 30, son of Mufizul Islam of village Nundulamula under the upazila.

According to BDR and local sources, the Indian border guards of Shonamati camp opened fire on Mostafa while he was working on his cropland near the border pillar no 388/S/1 at around 6:30am. Mostafa died instantly.

Immediately after the killing, the BSF personnel took away the body. When contacted, Lt Colonel Rafique of 20 Rifles Battalion confirmed the incident.

BSF sent a letter to its Indian counterpart demanding return of the body.

Lanka offers talks as battle peaks

21 more killed in violence

Sri Lanka yesterday offered to talk to Tamil Tigers about their bitter water dispute as fighting that has already claimed some 156 lives threatened to spiral into all-out war.

"The window is open," said government spokesman Keheliya Rambukwella. "If the Tigers are ready, we are ready to start talks immediately. All we wanted to do was to ensure that the people get water. We do not want to go back to war."

The conciliatory move came as peace broker Norway tried to salvage what was left of a 2002 truce made virtually irrelevant by air, ground and sea battles that have marked the bloodiest eight days since the ceasefire.

Rambukwella said fighting raged Thursday in the Muslim-majority town of Muttur in northeastern Trincomalee district as Tigers who infiltrated the area during shelling on Wednesday continued to offer resistance.

"There are a few pockets of resistance but we are in total control over Muttur," Rambukwella said. He added that residents in the area had been asked to move to public buildings to allow troops to search for Tigers.

Seventeen civilians and four police were killed in artillery attacks in Sri Lanka's northeastern Muslim town of Muttur on Thursday, military

officials said.

The civilians were killed when shells hit three schools where they were sheltering after security forces asked them to move to public buildings while troops mopped up Tamil Tiger rebel resistance, officials said.

Military spokesman Upali Rajapakse said the bloodiest attack was against Arabic College in Muttur where 10 people were killed and at least 50 were wounded.

He said two other Muslim schools at Thoppur, a suburb of Muttur, were also hit by shells leaving five dead and 10 wounded at Al Noori College and two killed at

Move to catch GSP document forgers

The government has initiated a move to identify people involved in forgery of GSP (generalised system of preference) certificates after several European buyers of readymade garments complained about it.

The commerce ministry has formed a five-member committee headed by its Deputy Secretary Fazlur Rahman to find out the persons or groups involved in such forgery.

The committee comprising representatives from customs, Export Promotion Bureau (EPB) and Tariff Commission has been asked to submit its report to the commerce ministry by August 15, ministry sources said.

The Bangladesh mission in Brussels in the last couple of months repeatedly requested the government to probe the allegation of tampering with the GSP certificates.

Moreover, buyers from several European countries have sent back

some 16 consignments of garments exported from Bangladesh this year using fake GSP certificates.

"A group of people are involved in such anti-state activities," EPB Vice-chairman Mir Sahabuddin Mohammad told The Daily Star yesterday. He said the forgery is damaging Bangladesh's reputation in the buyers' community.

Bangladeshi readymade garment products enjoy duty-free access to European markets under

A Rab press release said Babu admitted his involvement in criminal activities. When a Rab team took him to Devipur area early yesterday to seize hidden firearms, criminals opened fire on the Rab men resulting in a shootout.

Malaysia to take more Bangladeshi workers Badawi tells Khaleda

The prime minister thanked Badawi for successful holding of the summit and said his initiatives are very positive and necessary in resolving the crisis in Lebanon and Middle East.

Lebanese Foreign Minister Fawzi Sallouk made a courtesy call on Prime Minister Khaleda Zia at Putrajaya Marriot Hotel.
