

## US has no info on Qaeda network in Bangladesh

UNB, Dhaka

The United States has said it does not have any specific information about the presence of al-Qaeda network in Bangladesh.

Responding to a Washington Post report that al-Qaeda may have found its way into Bangladesh, US State Department spokesman Sean McCormack on Thursday said: "I don't have any particular information about the presence of al-Qaeda individuals in Bangladesh. We do know that they have -- that they have had in the past a worldwide network."

He, however, said Washington was as concerned as Dhaka about the issue of terrorism in the South Asian nation.

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## 5 cops hurt in shootout with gunrunners

Five policemen and a suspected gunrunner were wounded in a shootout when police interdicted an arms-smuggling bid at Sadar upazila yesterday.

But intercepted, they opened fire on the police team. Police returned fire, leading to a gunfight.

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## Tk 90 lakh Bogra forest trees sold at Tk 9.8 lakh

BNP men cut over 20,000 costly trees in 3 years through secret tenders, local MP denies link

HASIBUR RAHMAN BILU, Back From Dharaborosa Char, Bogra

The forest department in Bogra sold over 7,000 trees at a throwaway price of about Tk 135 each through a secret tender and allowed local BNP men to have nearly the same number of timbers for free allegedly under pressure of a ruling party lawmaker.

In the last three years, the same BNP lawmaker-- Kazi Rafique-- also reportedly influenced the forest department to let BNP leaders and activists plunder 14,000-15,000 more trees on a Bogra sandbank-- Dharaborosa Char in Shariakandi, according sources at the district administration.

The latest controversial tender was put to the fridge after a probe

committee of the district administration detected three months back instances of staggering corruption.

The inquiry committee, headed by Additional Deputy Commissioner (Revenue) Sayed Mizanur Rahman following a complaint by Shariakandi Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) Firdous Alam, found over 7,000 shishu.

## 40 buried under rubble as Israeli jets pound Lebanon

UN struggles to set truce terms, road links with Syria snapped after 4 key bridges bombed

Israeli air strikes killed at least 40 civilians in Lebanon and a Hezbollah rocket barrage into Israel killed three people yesterday as world powers tried to agree on a resolution to halt the fighting.

One air strike hit a farm near

Qaa, close to the Syrian border in the Bekaa Valley where workers, mostly Syrian Kurds, were loading plums and peaches on to trucks, local officials said. They said 33 people were killed and 20 wounded.

An Israeli army spokesman said air strikes in the area had targeted

two buildings that military intelligence had showed were used by Hezbollah to store weapons.

But television footage showed bodies of what appeared to be farm workers lined up near the ruins of a small structure in fruit groves. Scattered nearby were fruit baskets.

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## Baby dies of 'wrong' treatment

Relatives fail to get prescription, ransack hospital

Following a three-year old child's death due to alleged wrong treatment at a private hospital at Dhanmondi in the capital, the girl's relatives manhandled the hospital staff yesterday.

Fever-affected Farzana Faiza Chowdhury alias Rowshi, daughter of Shafiqul Alam Chowdhury in Tajmohal Road in Mohammadpur, was admitted to the Pancare Hospital and Diagnostics at 10:30am on Thursday with fever.

After Rowshi died at the hospital at 10:00am yesterday, relatives wanted to see treatment papers and prescription. As the doctors failed to provide those, the aggrieved relatives vandalised furniture and flower tubs and got locked into a scuffle with the hospital staff.

Police rushed to the hospital, brought the situation under control and sent the body to Dhaka Medical College Hospital morgue for autopsy.

It was explained to Asma Jahangir that there was enhanced security enforced in Delhi as the Indian Independence Day nears.

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## RU moves to recruit 546 staff again thru' fresh test

Ignores over 50,000 applications, lawsuit pending with SC

Rajshahi University (RU) authorities have started issuing letters to the 546 employees for attending written tests and interviews scheduled to begin from August 11 while a legal suit against the controversial recruitment is still pending with the Supreme Court.

The class III and IV employees, who were 'illegally' recruited in April 2004, have been allowed to apply against 350 newly advertised posts.

There are recommendations from officials for the 546 employees whereas none of over 50,000 general applicants for the posts has

been called for written test or interview, informed sources said.

Rajshahi University, already facing a huge deficit budget, will have to spend over Tk 3 crore annually due to the fresh recruitment while the total allocation for 'education purposes' of the university in this fiscal year is Tk 5.80 crore, sources said.

The RU authorities have already spent Tk 2.5 crore from development and stipend funds for daily basis salaries of the 546 employees and Tk 15 lakh on cases filed over their 'illegal' recruitment in April 2004.

"Rajshahi University is heading

towards a serious crisis simply due to political reasons," Workers Party politbureau member Fazle Hossain Badsha said pointing to incidents of violence and chaos on the campus following the recruitment.

Badsha, also a former vice president of RU Central Students Union, hinted that the RU move would be legally challenged soon.

## Inmates not served with fish, meat for 2 months

Contractors hike rates as prices of the items soar in market, authorities yet to budge

In an unprecedented instance, the Dhaka Central Jail (DCJ) authorities failed to provide fish or meat to inmates almost throughout the entire months of June and July even though it is obligated to provide the items every other day.

It has been learnt that the contractors had stopped supplying fish

and meat to the DCJ as the authorities did not approve the contractors' bid, which quoted higher rates for the items, on time. The DCJ is now accommodating around 9,000 prisoners and detainees.

According to sources concerned, the bidders' rates for different items were quite in line with existing market prices and the tender evaluation committee also recom-

mended to accept the proposal.

In the wake of growing resentment among the prisoners and detainees, the authorities resumed providing fish and meat from the last week of July. Suppliers to a number of other jails have also expressed their inability to supply some items anymore due to the rise in prices.

## Country dates with acute power crisis

Technical glitch halts Ashuganj plant

Technical faults are increasingly plaguing different power plants and regional grids, adding to the already acute power crisis across the country.

Ashuganj power plant, the second biggest of the country, yesterday morning suffered the latest in a series of breakdowns in power generation. The plant has tripped thrice in two and a half months.

Besides, different regional grids have experienced major technical

setbacks four times in last five months.

Two current transformers (CTs) of the Ashuganj plant yesterday stopped functioning after flashing an overload signal on the monitor at 8:05am.

Power generation at two 300-megawatt units--number 3 and 4--came to a halt immediately after the shutdown of the CTs, which are used to carry power to the distribution lines.

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## Tigers outclassed Zimbabwe clinch series

Bangladesh went down without fighting in the fourth one-day international as hosts Zimbabwe took an unassailable 3-1 lead in the five-match series with a seven-wicket win at the Harare Sports Club ground yesterday.

Having headed into the series tagged as favourites and relishing on a prospect to win their first-ever away series, the Tigers completely failed to come into grips with their own errors as the Zimbabweans took sweet revenge after being defeated in both the Test and the one-day series back in January 2005.

Middle-order batsman Brendan Taylor again ended the match with a massive six, this time off leg-spinner Alok Kapali, to end the match with 8.2 overs still in the bag.

Bangladesh succumbed once again to some poor shot selections and a couple of unnecessary run-outs to score 206 for nine in 50 overs.

Opener Shahriar Nafees struck 45 off 93 balls before throwing away his wicket to part-time bowler Hamilton Masakadza. He shared a 52-run stand with in form Aftab Ahmed, who scored 27.

All-rounder Forhad Reza struck a four and a six to score 30 runs. His
