

# Develop village info centres to improve rural lives

Moudud tells seminar

Law Minister Moudud Ahmed yesterday underscored the need for developing financially viable village information centres across the country so that rural people can become aware of their constitutional rights and improve their lives.

"Ensuring access to information can help bring about a significant change in the lives of rural people. We need to develop self-sustained information centres in rural areas to build a prosperous Bangladesh," he said at a seminar as the chief guest.

Development Research Network (D.Net) organised the seminar on 'ICT and access to information: How to make it work for promoting human rights' in collaboration with Manusher Jonno at the Brac Centre Inn in the city, with Shaheen Anam, executive director of Manusher Jonno, in the chair.

The people are not aware of their rights in most cases as there is a lack of access to information, the minister said, adding that the use of information and communication technology (ICT) can help reduce the gap between the information-haves and the information have-nots.

The more people become aware of their rights, the less incidents of human rights violations will

take place, he observed.

Giving a presentation on different aspects of village information centre, Dr Ananya Raihan, executive director of D.Net, said his organisation has been implementing a project styled 'Abolobomon - Empowering people through improved access to information on governance and human rights' since March 2005.

Information intermediaries are a vital component of the process of disseminating information about livelihoods through using ICT, he

said, adding that providing the information in local language can have a positive impact on the livelihood of the community.

Terming the lack of access to information an obstacle to the empowerment of the rural people, he said it makes them vulnerable to exploitation by middlemen, leaves them exposed to preventable diseases and accidents and deprives them of justice.

Participating in the panel discussion, economist Dr Atiur

Stressing the need for reducing poverty in the country, AMM Yahya, director of GrameenPhone, said the community information centres can be financially viable if local people are involved in the process.

Salma Khatun, a mobile phone operator of a village information centre of D.Net, said the villagers, who did not have any idea what a computer is, are now reaping the benefit of ICT after the centre was set up at her village in Nilphamari.

"The use of ICT can bring about a revolutionary change in rural areas," she said.

## Five new police stations open in city tomorrow

The newly built police stations are Shahbagh, Jatrabari, Tejgaon Shilpachal, Uttar Khan and Dakkhin Khan.

Shahbagh Police Station (PS) has been formed splitting Ramna PS, Jatrabari PS splitting Demra PS, Tejgaon Shilpachal PS splitting Tejgaon PS and Uttar Khan PS and Dakkhin Khan PS splitting Uttara Police Station.

Shahbagh PS will be set up at Shahbagh police control room building, Jatrabari PS at former Demra Police Station while Demra PS at Ahmed Bawani Textile Mill building at Sarulia, Tejgaon Shilpachal PS at Tejgaon Police Post, Uttar Khan PS at 195 Uttar Khan Madarbari and Dakkhin Khan PS at 193 Dakkhin Khan market road, adjacent to Ayesha shopping complex.

These new police stations have been set up with a view to curbing the increasing crime and corruption of the city, added the press release.

## Prolonged use of skin lightening products poses health hazards

### Experts tell seminar

Prolonged use of skin lightening products poses health hazards such as damage to skin, nerves and kidneys, experts at a seminar said yesterday.

Such products with composition of hydroquinone, mercury and steroid cause hyper pigmentation, extreme darkening of skins and other severe health hazards, said dermatologist Dr Ataur Rahman.

Gender in Media Forum in association with the ActionAid Bangladesh organised the seminar on 'Skin whitening cream: Advertising and effects' at Cirdap auditorium in the city.

Advocate Faustina Pereira, director of Advocacy and research, Ain O Salish Kendro, said the advertisements for skin whitening creams

are violating the article 10 and 11 of the Constitution that guarantees equal rights for women.

"With the advent of satellite TV, we are flooded with images of a 'fairer' culture, thus creating dissatisfaction with the 'self' and inciting the racial conflict," said Ferdous Azim, a professor of BRAC University.

## DEMAND FOR REINVESTIGATION INTO UDICHI BLAST CASE Fresh programmes announced

National Committee for Reinvestigation and Trial of Udichi Blast Case yesterday announced fresh agitation programmes to press home its demands.

Members of the committee announced the programmes from a

rally at Muktangan in the city, says a press release.

Under the programmes, the committee will begin a three-month-long signature campaign in favour of its demands from the Central Shaheed Minar on August 25.

Later, similar programme will be held in all districts.

Besides, a gathering of family members and relatives of Udichi killing victims will be held in Dhaka on August 31 where they will share their grievances and press their demands.

There will be a roundtable in Dhaka in the first week of September with the participation of leaders of different political parties, social organisations, cultural groups and professional bodies.

The central leaders of the committee will attend demonstrations in divisional headquarters in September.

In October, the committee will bring out processions across the country carrying dummies of the victims and form a human wall.

Presided over by Nasir Uddin Yusuf, convenor of the national committee, the rally was addressed by Gono Forum President Dr Kamal Hossain, Prof Jatin Sarker, Communist Party of Bangladesh President Manjurul Ahsan Khan, Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal President Hasanul Haq Inu, Gono Forum leader Pankaj Bhattacharya and cultural activist Golam Quddus.

## Dengue spreads in Khulna alarmingly

Dengue fever, a viral disease transmitted by Aedes mosquitoes, has been spreading in Khulna city at an alarming rate.

According to Dengue Control Room of the Khulna Civil Surgeon, a total of 16 dengue patients were admitted to Khulna Medical College Hospital, Khulna General Hospital, Dakop Upazila Health Complex and other private clinics of the city and district in the last one month.

Meanwhile, there has been no effective move at the government level to contain outbreak of the disease.

However, acting Civil Surgeon of Khulna Dr Maksuda Begum claimed that a programme has been taken to create mass awareness against the dengue.

Khulna City Corporation is yet to launch the anti-dengue drive as announced last week.
