

# Outsider JP bigwigs eye alliance ticket in greater Rangpur

As Jatiya Party's joining the ruling alliance is becoming a reality, some central JP leaders having little chance to win election in their constituencies in other districts are trying to get alliance tickets in greater Rangpur, known as a stronghold of the party.

But local leaders in greater Rangpur have strong objection to nomination to 'outsider candidates'.

Taking to this correspondent, central JP vice-president Ahsan Ahmed said the JP chairman 'must select local leaders for alliance nomination because voters in greater Rangpur would not accept the outsider candidates'. HE is a JP leader from Nilphamari sadar upazila (Nilphamari-2 constituency).

Seeking anonymity, some front ranking JP leaders in Nilphamari Sadar said some party heavy-

weights from outside greater Rangpur are now contacting them and taking about nomination and election. They declined to be identified while taking about party seniors but said the party should select local candidates for the coming polls.

Alongside lobbying for nomination, some central JP leaders have started pre-polls campaign in greater Rangpur.

Central JP secretary general Ruhul Amin Hawladar visited some remote areas in Lalmonirhat district and met party activists and the elite, keeping in mind the coming parliamentary election, party sources said. He made the visit on his own although there was no party programme there.

During the visits he addressed public rallies in remote Patgram and Hatibandha upazilas (Lalmonirha-1), urging people to vote for JP in the coming election,

whoever might be the candidate 'to honour Ershad, a man from Rangpur'.

His visit gave rise to speculations and confusion about his hidden intention. Questions were raised why he came to the remote area without addressing rallies or holding party programmes at Rangpur, Lalmonirhat, Nilphamari and other district headquarters.

Asked about this, JP central vice-president NK Alam could not give any satisfactory reply. But he did not rule out the possibility of Hawladar running from the area (Patgram and Hatibandha).

Hawladar lost parliament elections in 1991, 1996 and 2001. In 2001 election, he fought from Bakherganj-6 constituency and lost to BNP candidate with a big margin. He also lost his security money.

In 1996 election, he got only 5,332 votes against 66,000 score by Awami League's Shahjahan Mia in

Patuakhali-1 constituency. He lost his security money there also.

Like Hawladar, JP top leaders Mostofa Jamal Haider, Kazi Zafar Ahmed and Firoj Rashid Chowdhury also could not win any of the last three parliament elections from their respective areas.

Former JP chairman Mizanur Rahman Chowdhury and former secretary general Shah Moazzem Hossen however won by-elections in Rangpur in 1991. They ran in two seats out of four seats vacated by Ershad, who won in five seats there.

But local people were not happy with them (Mizan Chowdhury and Shah Moazzem) because after winning the by-election, they never visited the areas, party sources said.

JP chairman HM Ershad was also unhappy with them as they did not press for his release from jail.

RIVALRY OVER NOMINATION  
BNP MP declared  
'unwanted'  
in Matlab

Ruling BNP lawmaker and former state minister for establishment Nurul Huda (MP from Chandpur-II constituency) has been declared unwanted in Matlab North upazila municipal area.

The declaration was made at an opinion exchange meeting held at Chhengarchar College auditorium Thursday evening.

Chhengarchar Paurba Chairman Amena Begum presided over the meeting, attended by industrialist and nomination seeker from Chandpur-II constituency (Matlab North) Feroze Ahmed as chief guest.

BNP leaders ABM Moinuddin (Tunu Hajji), Nurul Hoque, Jahangir Alam Prodhan, Nannu Mia Prodhan, Ehsin Molla, Rehan Mahmud and Motlab JCD president Nazmul Huda Dollar spoke at the meeting, among others.

They brought allegations of corruption against Nurul Huda.

They termed Huda as 'a seasonal bird'. Representatives from about 40 villages attended the meeting, the organisers claimed.

The speakers said they would not allow Nurul Huda to hold any meeting in the area, they claimed.

When contacted Nurul Huda MP said people of all walks of life in Matlab North upazila will reject those who declared me unwanted in the area.

Some people want to create trouble before the election as they did in the past.

**Truckers' strike for withdrawal of check post**

Truckers in Cox's Bazar yesterday called an indefinite transport strike from today on Teknaf route, demanding withdrawal of Balo Khal check post.

## Practising political nicety

7 BNP leaders in Patuakhali sign 6-pt 'code of conduct'

Seven leaders of ruling BNP in Patuakhali have started showing nicety in politics, at least within the party.

They have signed a six-point 'code of conduct' on political activities before and during the coming election in their area.

The seven leaders in a joint statement said all of them would seek nomination for contesting in Patuakhali-3 (Galachipa upazila unit, central assistant finance secretary of Krishak Dal industrialist Golam Mostafa, Jatiyatabadi Ayinjibi Forum central joint secretary Shah Alom Bhuyan, central law affairs secretary of Jatiyatabadi Tanti Dal Md Afzal Hossain, central joint secretary of Jatiyatabadi Muktijoddha Dal Harun-or-Rashid

would be invited and attend any programme of the party and its front organisation, any local or central leader could sponsor any political programme under the party banner, once the nomination is announced, all would work together for the party nominee and finally, any body violating the agreement could be recommended for expulsion from the party.

The seven leaders are Shahjahan Khan, vice-president of Patuakhali district BNP and president of party's Galachipa upazila unit, central assistant finance secretary of Krishak Dal industrialist Golam Mostafa, Jatiyatabadi Ayinjibi Forum central joint secretary Shah Alom Bhuyan, central law affairs secretary of Jatiyatabadi Tanti Dal Md Afzal Hossain, central joint secretary of Jatiyatabadi Muktijoddha Dal Harun-or-Rashid

and businessman Golam Mostafa. Shahjahan Khan was defeated by Awami League candidate AKM Jahangir Hossain in 2001 election with 12,758 votes. Jahangir Hossain, a former state minister, had also won from the constituency in 1991 and 1996 elections. AL also bagged the seat in 1973 election.

BNP won the polls from the constituency in 1979 and in the February 15 election in 1996, which was rejected by all other political parties.

The agreement was signed at a meeting in Dhaka recently, a copy of which was made available to local journalists.

Some of the leaders later talked to journalists. They said they would abide by the agreement and work together for the party nominee.

## Tk 25 cr allocated for hospital in Khulna

The government has allocated Tk 25 crore for construction of a 100-bed diabetic hospital here.

The hospital will be constructed on one and a half acres of land on Jabbar Sarani while its work will begin from next month, said Khulna City Mayor Shaikh Tayebur Rahman in a press release issued here on Thursday. 'At least two years will be required to complete the work', he said.

## Mudslinging by Netrakona BNP leaders over ticket

The intra-party rift in Netrakona BNP has widened over nomination in Netrakona-3 constituency (Atpara and Barhatta) in the coming parliamentary election.

The party is divided into two factions, one led by lawmaker Begum Khadija Amin and another by central Juba Dal leader Rafiqul Islam Hilali. Both are seeking nomination and are now engaged in mudslinging on each other.

They are holding workers meetings and public rallies to show their strength and are lobbying with party high-ups, sources said.

At several public meetings recently, Rafiqul Islam Hilali bitterly criticised Khadija Amin saying, "The four-party alliance will lose the seat to the 14 party opposition if Khadija Amin is nominated because she has become unpopular for her inefficiency and ill treatment with people and party men". He also claimed that she could not do any development work in Atpara and Kendua

upazilas during her tenure.

"I believe the party high command will not nominate Khadija Amin as alliance candidate in the coming election", he said while talking to this correspondent.

"I got hint from our party chairman about getting nomination", he said. "If Khadija gets nomination, I and my followers will not support

ing Awami League candidate M Jubed Ali. She got 95,251 votes against 69,966 of Jubed Ali. The by-election was held following the death of her husband BNP lawmaker Nurul Amin Talukder.

BNP sources said Khadija and Rafiqul Islam are political foes for long. The feud intensified after Kendua upazila BNP committee was dissolved on June 27, by Netrakona district BNP president MA Karim Abbasi MP, in which she was allegedly involved, party sources said.

Rafiqul Islam Hilali, Netrakona district BNP secretary Mahfuzul Haque and organizing secretary Nazrul Islam Khan did not attend the party council in which the Kendua committee was dissolved.

Soon after dissolution of the Kendua committee, Khadija's rivals brought out a procession in Kendua town protesting it. On the next day (June 28), several thousand party activists from Kendua and Atpara upazila brought out a procession in Netrakona under the leadership of Hilali.
