## Asia Energy staff houses in Phulbari torched

Coalmine protesters demonstrate throughout the day, snap rail links, demand ouster of the company

Thousands of demonstrators took control of Phulbari on the second day of an indefinite strike yesterday, and set fire to houses of some Asia Energy employees, clamouring for ouster of the London-based company.

The agitators also vandalised the Asia Energy office and cut off road and rail links between Dinajpur and the other districts in protest at Saturday's police actions that left at least five people dead

and over 300 injured.

According to unconfirmed reports, seven people died that day when police and Bangladesh Rifles men fired on the locals demonstrating against open-pit coalmine project at Phulbari.

Meanwhile, leaders of the National Committee for Protection of Oil-Gas-Port district unit yesterday held a daylong meeting with the deputy commissioner (DC) of Dinajpur. They placed a five-point demand at the meeting that ended with no results.

The demands include the closure of the Asia Energy office, a government declaration banning coalmining in Phulbari, compensation for the victims' families and medical expenses for the injured, withdrawal of the cases filed so far against the protesters, and punishment to the persons responsible for Saturday's incident.

The district administration asked the agitators to withdraw the ongoing strike and sought from them three days' time to meet their demands. But the protesters did

not agree, Dinajpur DC Tahasinur Rahman told The Daily Star last night.

Throughout the day yesterday demonstrators kept control over different strategic points across Phulbari. They took to the roads since early in the morning but no clash was reported. Hundreds of paramilitary, police and Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) men were deployed in the town.

Locals dumped logs in every several yards along a 10-km stretch

Rehabilitation issue makes it a tough task

Implementation of Phulbari coalmine project requires dismantling of at least 20 thousand public and private structures, including residential and commercial ones, at Phulbari in five years, Phulbari Pourasabha chairman says.

Asia Energy officials at Phulbari however claimed that the number of such structures would not be more than 4,000.

"Twenty thousand buildings, mostly of which are residential and commercial ones, will disappear if the open-pit mining project is implemented," said Shahjahan Ali Sarker Putu, chairman of Phulbari Municipality.

But Field Manager of Asia Energy that is implementing the project Ahsan Habib Deepu said

## Islamic parties boom after 1976 ban lifting

Record shows about 100 organisations exist

Islamic political parties and organisations have mushroomed in the country since the constitutional ban on them was repealed in 1976, allowing formation and functioning of organisations based on religion.

No one knows the number of such parties and other organisations floated since withdrawal of the ban as neither the government nor the Election Commission (EC) has any accurate figures on them.

Government intelligence agencies' records however showed

existence and activities of about 100 Islamic political parties and organisations since repeal of the ban while around 11 were active in between 1964 and 1971, sources said.

Of the existing parties and organisations apparently based on Islam, some have been identified as militant outfits. And the government has banned four of them -- Shahadat-e-Al-Hiqma, Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh, Jagrata Muslim Janata Bangladesh and Harkat-ul-Jihad -- during 2003 to 2005. Some organisations were accused of patronising the militant

groups. Thirty Islamic political parties and their different factions have contested parliamentary elections since 1979 with manifestos for establishing Islamic rule, EC statistics show.

In the 1979 parliamentary polls, the first one after withdrawal of the ban, two Islamic parties -- Muslim O Democratic League that also included Jamaat-e-Islami and Bangladesh Nezame Islam -- were among the contestants. The number of such parties remained the same in the 1986 election with

## Why case against CPD trustees not be quashed

HC asks govt, Mahmudur

The High Court (HC) yesterday issued a rule ordering the government and Energy Adviser Mahmudur Rahman to show cause within four weeks why the case pending before the CMM's Court, Dhaka against five eminent citizens should not be quashed.

An HC division bench also stayed all proceedings of the case filed by Mahmudur Rahman until disposal of the rule.

The rule came in response to a petition filed by the five citizens, who are also members of the board of trustees of independent think-tank Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD).

## Saudi prince's bid to buy Rupali Bank gets a nod

Deal awaits PM's final approval

The Privatisation Commission yesterday approved the bid of US \$330 million offered by Saudi Prince Bandar Bin Mohammad Bin Abdul Rahman Al Saudi for buying 67.26 percent share of state-run Rupali Bank.

"We will send the approved financial offer to the prime minister by tomorrow for the final approval for the bidding," said Privatisation Commission Chairman Enam Ahmed

Chaudhury yesterday.

On getting the nod from the prime minister, the commission can wrap up the process within the next month, Chaudhury hoped. "As soon as we receive the final approval of the prime minister we will start negotiations and sign the sell and purchase agreement," he said adding, "The payment will be in full, and after the payment the process of handing over the bank will start."

Replying to a query, the commission chairman said all the

## JANATA TOWER FINE Certificate case against Ershad dismissed

A Dhaka court yesterday dismissed the certificate case filed against former president HM Ershad for realisation of the fine imposed on him in the Janata Tower case.

First Class Magistrate Delwara Begum, also the General Certificate Officer (GCO), passed the order. In her order, the GCO mentioned that Ershad had earlier served three months and eight days and paid Tk 2,74,35,400. So, the case filed for realisation of the fine from him was dismissed, she added.

On November 23 in 2000, the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court (SC) in a verdict fined Ershad Tk 5,48,70,800, in default he would have to suffer six months in jail.

On September 4, 2001, Judge

## ADP IMPLEMENTATION

## Saifur's ministries among lowest performing ones

Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday found himself in an embarrassing position when a meeting to review Annual Development Programme (ADP) disclosed that the performance of the two ministries under him was among the lowest in expending allocations.

Four departments under the ministries of finance and planning were listed among the 10 low performing ministries and departments in implementing the ADP in last fiscal year, a Planning Commission report revealed at the meeting chaired by Saifur Rahman.

As the disappointed minister asked the officials concerned to explain the reasons, they said the delay in releasing funds against the projects was due to 'strict conditions' and most of the projects were for technical assistance, sources said.

Ministries of law, post and telecommunications, information, and land, Election Commission Secretariat and Cabinet Division were other low performing ministries and departments.

The report showed that the overall implementation of the revised ADP in the last fiscal year was 91 per cent despite a huge cut of the original budget and the

implementation of foreign aid was 88 per cent.

The Planning Division spent only 28 per cent of its allocation. The situation is worst in spending project aid and the figure is only two per cent.

The report revealed that Internal Resource Division has failed to spend a single penny against the allocation of Tk 4.30 crore.

Finance Division spent 57 per cent of its overall allocation and 46 per cent of the project aid, the report added. It also showed the Economic Relations Department spent 52 per cent of the overall

## JMB militant Jewel jailed for 64 years

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced Enayetullah Jewel, Gazipur regional commander of banned Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), to 64 years' rigorous imprisonment (RI) in two cases filed with Joydevpur Police Station in January this year.

Jewel is accused in 33 other cases now pending and under investigation with different police stations in five districts.

Judge Shahed Noor Uddin of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-1 gave the verdict in presence of the lone accused for possessing illegal firearms, explosives and ammunition.

In its order, the judge said the accused was given 44 years' RI for

## Over 100 hurt as cops clash with workers

50 buses vandalised

Over 100 people including 17 policemen and four journalists were injured in a series of clashes between transport workers and police in Rajshahi Bus Terminal area yesterday.

The policemen fired 100 shots and lobbed 71 teargas shells to disperse the transport workers after they torched a police motorcycle and damaged three other vehicles.

The angry cops also damaged some 50 buses and 25 shops and

beat up the transport workers, pedestrians and journalists during the three-hour rampage, witnesses said.

Rajshahi Motor Sramik Union and Rajshahi Bus-Minibus Owners' Association called an indefinite transport strike in Rajshahi from today protesting the police atrocities.

The clashes erupted after a bus driver assaulted a policeman while checking a bus at Kasiadanga on the outskirts of the city.

The police at around 3:00pm

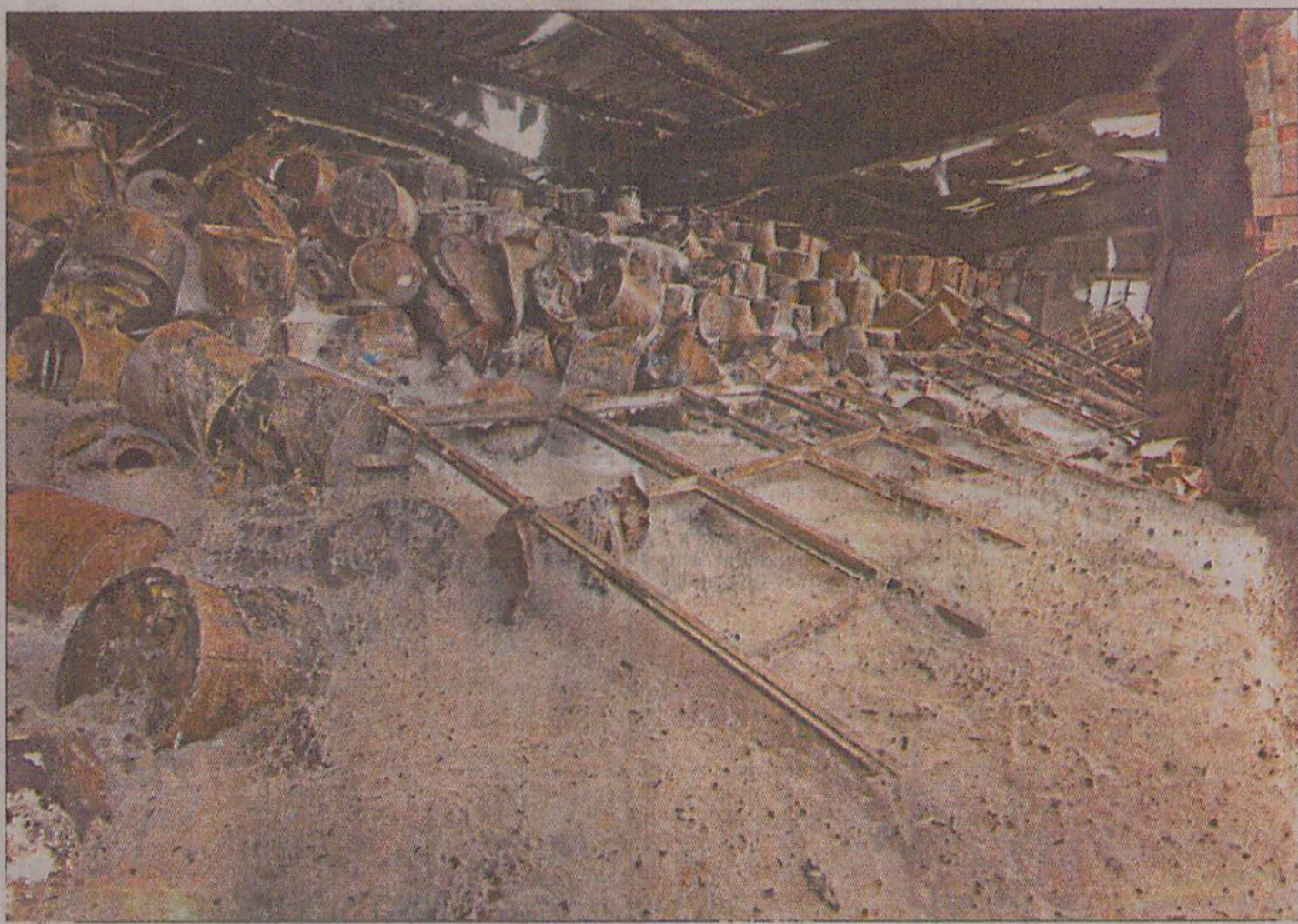
