Ballack pays the penalty

German international captain Michael Ballack has been ordered to pay a 70,000-euro (90,000 dollars) fine for failing to declare goods he bought in Dubai, Landsberg district court said Wednesday.

Ballack bought an Italian handbag worth 2,000 euros (2,600 dollars) for his partner Simone in January on returning from a Dubai training camp with former club Bayern Munich, but did not declare the purchase on his arrival at Munich airport.

The 29-year-old Ballack earns a reported 190,000 euros (243,000 dollars) a week at English Premiership champions Chelsea.

Basile plans big

Argentina's new coach Alfio Basile said he would settle for a 4-0 win over Brazil in his first match in charge on Sunday.

"I would like us to score four goals and them to score none," the gravel-voiced coach told reporters on Wednesday after being asked what he expected from the friendly in London.

Basile, who coached Argentina from 1991 to 1994, officially begins his second stint on Sept. 15 and is still in charge of club side Boca Juniors.

He agreed to lead Argentina against Brazil after the game was arranged at short notice.

"It's always special against Brazil," said Basile at Buenos Aires airport before catching his flight.

"It's not a personal landmark because I've got 800,000 matches behind me, but it's important for the national team."

Basile said he could not comment on whether he would field Corinthian pair Javier Mascherano and Carlos Tevez.

Tevez walked out on the Brazilian club after playing against Botafogo on Aug. 20 while Mascherano, sent off against Gremio on Sunday, skipped training on Tuesday.

"Until I see them and talk to them and watch them practice, I can't say anything," said Basile.

He also shrugged off claims that his forward line lacked height after he picked Sergio Aguero, Tevez, Javier Saviola and Lionel Messi amongst the strikers.

"I like short players," he said.

Italy's opening Euro 2008 qualifier against Lithuania in Naples on Saturday promises to be as much a welcome back party for the World Cup winners as a competitive football match.

The Italian team that lost 2-0 to Croatia in Livorno earlier this month was a second-string side, barely recognisable from the one that beat France in the final in Germany on July 9.

This weekend's Group B game at the San Paolo stadium will be different, marking the return of the likes of Fabio Cannavaro, Gianluigi Buffon and Gennaro Gattuso.

Despite the absences, few fans expect Lithuania to offer much resistance. The last time the two

sides met on Italian soil, in a 2002 World Cup qualifier, Italy were 4-0 winners.

Donadoni, however, wants his team to avoid thinking of the match as merely a warm-up for their second qualifier against France in a World Cup final re-match in Paris on Wednesday.

"We have to be careful against Lithuania. We have to think that they are the world champions, not us, otherwise we will have problems," Donadoni said.

Hammers pull off Tevez, Mascherano stunner

 In one of the most surprising transfer deals ever sealed in English football,

West Ham have signed coveted Argentina stars Carlos Tevez and Javier Mascherano - beating off competition from Manchester United, Arsenal, Bayern Munich, AC Milan and Portsmouth.

The pair will join the Hammers from Brazilian club Corinthians on a season-long loan but it could become permanent if all parties are happy, though whether West Ham could afford them is unclear, since both carry price tags in excess of 15 million pounds.

Tevez broke the news of the

transfer on his official website. "Carlitos Tevez - along with his former Corinthians teammate, Javier Mascherano, has signed a contract to play with West Ham United of England," read the statement.

On the surface, the move is nothing short of sensational: never before have two world class players yet to reach their prime - both are only 22 - rejected a host of elite clubs in order to join a middling one. While it is true that West Ham are on the up with Alan Pardew at the helm and exciting talents such as Anton Ferdinand, Yossi Benayoun and Nigel Reo-Coker in their ranks, it seems likely that the Argentinian duo's decision was, at least in part, influenced by behind-the-scenes interests.

Corinthians have a 10-year "co-management" deal with the Media Sports Investments company, in which Roman Abramovich is said to have a significant holding. It has also been reported that MSI owns the contracts of both players and could therefore block moves to, say, clubs likely to rival Chelsea for domestic or European glory. Another reported shareholder in MSI is Kia Joorabchian, the Iranian, London-based businessman who last year expressed an interest in taking over West Ham.

Whatever the reasons behind the move, it is unquestionably a major coup for Alan Pardew and gives last season's FA Cup runners-up one of the most impressive-looking squads in the Premiership.

Steven Gerrard believes England will benefit from the light-hearted atmosphere encouraged by coach Steve McClaren.

Liverpool midfielder Gerrard revealed the England squad enjoyed a trip to a comedy club this week as part of McClaren's attempt to foster an improved team-spirit among his players.

McClaren's men start their bid to reach the Euro 2008 finals when they take on Andorra at Old Trafford on Saturday before a trip to Macedonia next Wednesday.

And Gerrard admitted the club-style camaraderie being built by

McClaren and his assistant Terry Venables should stand England in good stead as they try to bounce back from the disappointment of their World Cup quarterfinal exit against Portugal.

Gerrard said: "We went to a comedy place and had a few comedians who were fantastic. They got us giggling and that helps to bring the boys together.

"The manager wants to have a club feel around the squad and hopefully we will see the benefit of that.

"It's nice to relax and then we can concentrate on the fixtures we've got coming up.

"First impressions of the new set-up is that everything is fresh and everyone is enjoying it, but we will be always be judged by results."

Real Madrid have agreed in principle a swap deal with Inter Milan with Ronaldo going back to his former Italian club and fellow striker Adriano going in the other direction, according to Cadena Ser on Wednesday.

Also according to Radio Marca this could be facilitated by another swap deal involving the "meringues" - whose opening 0-0 draw with Villarreal earned them a resounding booing from their fans.

It would see them securing the services of Arsenal's Spanish international winger Jose Antonio Reyes, who stunned the


Premiership side by saying he is homesick and never wants to play for England again, in exchange for out of favour Brazilian attacking midfielder Julio Baptista.

It would also see Real pay three million euros on top of that for Reyes, who has in truth never really settled at the club.

According to Cadena Ser the deal for Ronaldo and Adriano - who failed to gel during the World Cup finals with the former arguably the more potent threat despite being criticised for being overweight - will be sealed on Thursday.

"Real Madrid and Inter have already agreed terms," the internet site of the radio station reported.

Madrid coach Fabio Capello is known to be a big fan of Brazilian striker Adriano.

Egyptian int'l dies

Egyptian international defender Mohammed Abdel Wahab died of a heart attack while training with his club, champions Al-Ahly, on Thursday.

The 22-year-old collapsed on the pitch and was immediately transferred to a nearby hospital but resuscitation efforts failed.

The young defender won all national and continental awards with his Cairo club and was also part of the squad that won the African Cup of Nations in February.

Wahab's death comes three years after Cameroonian international midfielder Marc Vivien Foé collapsed and died during a 2003 Confederations Cup semi-final in France.

The 28-year-old Foé's death resulted in FIFA introducing new health measures at the 2006 World Cup where for the first time all the players from the 32 participating nations underwent medical checks for potential heart defects.

Brazil set Swiss date

World Cup finals flops Brazil have lined up another friendly which will see them play Switzerland in a friendly on November 15 in Basel it was announced by the Brazilian Football Confederation on Wednesday.

Brazil's new coach Dunga has already seen his side minus several of their established stars draw 1-1 with Norway earlier this month and has lined up two friendlies in England.

He first sees them play bitter rivals and fellow World Cup disappointments Argentina at Arsenal's Emirates Stadium on Saturday and then on Monday they stay in North London to play Wales at Spurs' White Hart Lane ground.

The Swiss friendly is the second one between the two teams this year, they having played one prior to the World Cup finals.

Inter-Viola on day one

The Italian football league on Wednesday announced the fixture lists for the forthcoming Serie A and Serie B seasons.

Serie A, which will be missing Juventus following their relegation for match-fixing, begins with two games on Saturday, September 9: Fiorentina at home to champions Inter Milan and Roma entertaining Livorno.

The remaining eight Serie A matches will be played the following day.

Inter finished third last season

but were awarded the championship after Juve and AC Milan were found guilty of rigging matches.

Fiorentina, Lazio and Reggina were also found guilty of match-fixing, but along with AC Milan they retained their status in the top division due to their lesser involvement in the scandal.

However, the quartet were all deducted points with Milan starting on minus eight, Fiorentina on minus 19, Lazio on minus 11 and Reggina on minus 15.

Juventus, who were handed a 17-point penalty for the start of the season and face an uphill battle to bounce swiftly back into Serie A, begin life in the second division away to Rimini on the Adriatic coast.

All the Serie B fixtures will take place on Saturday, September 9.

There will be four midweek rounds in Serie A: September 20, October
