# Security forces recover 51 more bodies in Baghdad

More than 100 bullet-riddled corpses have been recovered from the streets of Baghdad over the past three days, officials said yesterday, amid a sharp spike in sectarian violence in Iraq.

Pointing the finger at Shia death squads, Iraq's top Sunni leader Adnan al-Dulaimi said that "well-known militias" were behind the communal bloodletting that he warned was propelling the country towards "disaster."

The United Nations has also warned that Iraq could slide into civil war as the daily bloodshed shows no signs of abating despite political efforts for national reconciliation.

In the past three days, security forces have collected bodies of more than 100 people killed in Shia-Sunni violence, the epicentre of which is Baghdad.

US and Iraqi security officials say most were shot dead execution-style with bullet to their heads and many showed signs of torture.

Interior ministry spokesman Brigadier General Abdel Karim Khalaf told AFP that 51 bodies had been recovered in Baghdad in the past 24 hours. He said some of them had been killed in "criminal activities."

On Thursday, police reported finding 20 corpses and on Wednesday 64 bodies were registered by the capital's morgues.

"A large portion of those are murder, execution-style type activity. It is associated with sectarian violence," US military spokesman Major General William Caldwell told reporters on Thursday.

The violence in Baghdad has surged despite a massive security crackdown -- Operation Together Forward -- by US and Iraqi forces since mid-June.

Sunni Arab leaders have regularly charged that the sectarian killings are carried out by militias linked to Shia political parties who dominate the parliament.

Dulaimi alleged on Thursday that "well known militias" were carrying out the killings, referring to

armed groups close to radical cleric Moqtada al-Sadr and the Supreme Council for Islamic Revolution in Iraq.

"If strong measures are not taken soon, the country is going towards disaster and no one would be saved," said Dulaimi, a lawmaker and head of the National Concord Front, Iraq's largest Sunni parliamentary bloc.

"These well-known militias are pushing the country to the edge of catastrophe," he said.

Iraq's Deputy Prime Minister Barham Saleh also said in Washington on Thursday that militias such as those linked with

## Bridge unused for lack of approach roads

The footbridge on river Karotoa at Malatinagar in Bogra town has been lying virtually useless for nearly three years as no approach roads were built on either sides of the bridge.

Failing to get the primary benefit of the bridge built at a cost of Tk 15 lakh, locals now use it for drying laundries and other purposes.

The Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) built the 60-metre long and two-metre wide footbridge in 2003.

Anisur Rahman Rana, in-charge executive engineer of Bogra LGED, said the department has decided to build approach roads and other infrastructures on both sides of the bridge soon at a cost of Tk 10 lakh. He, however, admitted that the bridge was built three years ago

# Musharraf-Manmohan set for terror talks today

The leaders of India and Pakistan will hold talks in Cuba today, hoping to ease tensions after a year of recriminations over terror attacks and Kashmir, Indian and Pakistani officials said.

Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf, who last met a year ago at the United Nations, will meet today at the sideline of the Non-Aligned Movement summit that began in

Havana yesterday. With both under political pressure at home, expectations are modest, the officials said.

The talks between the nuclear-armed neighbours in Havana, follow a summer of accusations and cancelled meetings following the July 11 train bombings that killed 186 people in Mumbai.

Singh this week lamented "a problem of trust deficit between our two countries" and US and Indian analysts predict few breakthroughs.

"Neither in India nor in Pakistan

is there real pressure to achieve the kind of results that might be achievable or to make the kind of dramatic policy changes that would be needed," said Teresita Schaffer, a South Asia expert at Washington's Centre for Strategic and International Studies.

The India-Pakistan peace process, launched in 2004 after the rivals came to the brink of a fourth war, will not revive "unless it gets a personal infusion of energy from

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## Rival groups clash ahead of PM's Moulvibazar visit

She will also address another public meeting, organised by local A.L., on Baliazuri High School ground in Madarganj upazila of the same district at 4:00pm.

Hasina will return to the capital today.

## Journo stabbed to death

Criminals stabbed a journalist to death at Pichhlapole in Kolaroa upazila of the district on Thursday night.

The deceased, Bellal Hossain Dafadar, 38, son of Mosabbir Dafadar of Digong village in the upazila, was Kolaroa correspondent of Khulna-based daily Janabani.

As Bellal was returning home on a bicycle from a local bazar at about 7:00pm, some four to five assailants stopped him at Pichhlapole and stabbed him indiscriminately, leaving him critically injured, police said.

He was rushed to the Khulna 250-bed hospital where he succumbed to injuries late at night.

## Tk 46 lakh looted at Pubali Bank in Moulvibazar

Robbers looted around Tk 45,73,000 at Pubali Bank Wapda Gate branch in Moulvibazar yesterday leaving three security guards unconscious at the scene.

Pubali Bank officials said they closed the bank on Thursday around 7:00pm and they found the money looted from its vault yesterday morning.

Sources said employees of a tobacco company, which has an office underneath the bank on the first floor, discovered their three security guards unconscious next to a barbed wire fence behind the building. They also noticed that the fence had been cut through.

Later, police discovered that the collapsible gate of the bank on the first floor was cut by a blowtorch and the front door was wide open. They recovered two gas cylinders and a blowtorch from the scene. They arrested the three security guards of the tobacco office -- Habibur Rahman, Abdun Nur and Nur Miah.

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## Yemen foils suicide attacks on oil plants

### Four bombers among five killed

Yemen foiled two suicide attacks on its oil and gas facilities yesterday, days after al-Qaeda urged Muslims to target Western interests, especially oil installations.

The Interior Ministry said four bombers were killed when security forces blew up four rigged cars at dawn before they reached their targets. A guard was also killed.

There was no damage to the state-owned facilities, the ministry added. Yemen, a minor oil producer, is the ancestral home of al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden and has been battling militants for years.

"The Interior Ministry foiled early this morning two terrorist attacks involving four cars that targeted an oil exporting terminal in Hadramout and an oil refinery and gas production unit in Marib," a statement carried on state media said.

The attempted attacks occurred east of the capital Sanaa.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility. Yemen said it had launched an investigation.

Militants from al-Qaeda and other groups regard Western allied governments such as Yemen's as traitors and therefore legitimate targets.

The statement said that in the first attack, one of the bombers was disguised as a military officer while the second attacker was wearing the uniform of workers at the terminal.

It said a small fire broke out at one of the storage tanks in Hadramout, and it was quickly brought under control.

In the Marib attack, two cars tried to storm the refinery and gas production unit, the ministry said.

"The suicide terrorist attack did not result in any loss of life or damage to the refinery or gas

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## Road accidents kill 6, injure 30 in Faridpur

Six people were killed and 30 others injured in three separate road accidents in the district yesterday.

Four persons were killed and 30 injured when a Tekerhat bound passenger bus from Faridpur fell into a roadside ditch at Bhabukdia point on the Faridpur-Barisal highway under Nagarkanda upazila at around 12noon, police said.

The dead were identified as Kamrul 6, Parvez 4, Moina, 12, and Alam, 20. The injured passengers, many of them with serious injuries, were admitted to Faridpur Medical College Hospital.
