

Alliance ticket likely to prove elusive for Amini

BNP men vow to resist IOJ, demand nomination for state minister Abdus Sattar from B'baria-2

The rift between BNP and IOJ has widened in Brahmanbaria-2 constituency as both Abdus Sattar Bhuiyan and Mufti Fazlul Haque Amini MP are contenders for alliance ticket in the coming election.

The rivalry turned into mudslinging after State Minister for Land Abdus Sattar Bhuiyan held a rally at Sarail on September 2, followed by a IOJ meeting in Brahmanbaria.


BNP leaders and workers are now working against IOJ (Islamia Oikya Jote) president Amini, who was elected from Brahmanbaria-2 constituency in 2001 election with alliance ticket.

BNP leaders are campaigning for their respective party candidate Abdus Sattar, saying they will not support Amini as alliance nominee this time.

The simmering discontent in local BNP surfaced on September 2 when Sarail upazila BNP held a public meeting at Sarail where party leaders said they will no more support Amini as alliance nominee from Brahmanbaria - 2 (Sarail, Ashuganj and part of Brahmanbaria Sadar).

BSF yet to return three abducted from border

The Indian Border Security Force (BSF) is yet to return the three Bangladeshis including an indigenous man allegedly abducted by its personnel from Samaschura and Nakshi border areas in Nalitabari upazila in Sherpur district on Monday and Thursday.

The abducted people were identified as Zahur Islam, 35, of Poragaon village, Shahid Mian, 45, of Dhopakura and Ganon Marak, 44, of Nakshi village.

The Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and other sources said BSF personnel of Krishna Para camp in Meghalay state in India abducted Zahur and Shahid from inside Bangladesh territory when they were collecting firewood near

border pillar no. 1110 on Samaschura border under Monday afternoon.

The Indian Border Security Force (BSF) yet to response to a letter sent by BDR (45 Rifles Battalion) on Tuesday urging for a flag meeting and return of the two abducted Bangladeshis, BDR sources said.

On Thursday, BSF personnel abducted an indigenous man - Ganon Marak - from when he was collecting firewood near border pillar no. 1104 on Nakshi border.

BDR sources said that BSF abducted at least 10 Bangladeshis from different border points in Sherpur since July. Three of them were returned, they said.

Do not nominate corrupt people

Satkhiria TIB seminar urges political parties

Speakers at a discussion meeting yesterday stressed the need for building a social movement to curb corruption, which is hindering development of the country.

Rampant corruption is leading the country towards an economic disaster, they said during the discussion on "Role of Civil Society in Curbing Corruption", jointly organised by Satkhira chapter of Transparency International, Bangladesh (TIB) and Satkhira Sachetan Nagrik Samaj (conscious citizens). It was held at Satkhira Lawyers Association office with its president AKM Shahidullah in the chair.

They alleged that at least 75 per cent of foreign assistance for

development is looted by a section of corrupt government and non-government officials.

They urged political parties not to nominate corrupt people, black money holders and musclemen in the coming parliamentary election.

Transparency and accountability in politics can not be ensured unless honest people come in politics, they said. They also called upon people and civil society members to mobilise voters in this regard.



Sust stalemate set to drag on

Month-long vacation begins Sept 29: Rival teachers continue agitation

The deadlock at Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (Sust) seems set to continue for a month or more barring any dramatic development in a day or two as Ramadan and Durga Puja vacations begin from September 29.

Campus sources said they are worried whether normalcy would return on the campus even after the vacations as rival groups of teachers continued their agitation on the campus.

However, University Grants Commission Chairman (UGC) Prof Asaduzzaman assured a group of students that he would take immediate steps to end the stalemate. The students called on him at his office in Dhaka on Sunday.

Talking to this correspondent yesterday, some sources hinted that Sust Vice-chancellor Prof. Mosleh Uddin Ahmed might be replaced soon. But details could be known in this regard.

Yesterday, the Sust Teachers Association took out a procession on the campus opposing the left leaning and Awami League-backed teachers' agitation.

At a brief rally after the procession, speakers said the strike and sit-in by the opposition-aligned teachers was 'unjust' and called upon them to stop agitation and resume academic activities.

On the other hand, the striking opposition-backed teachers staged a day-long sit-in and held a rally in front of the registrar's building to press immediate withdrawal of the 'corrupt' vice-chancellor to ensure

'congenial atmosphere' on the campus. Dr. Akhtarul Islam, former president of Sust Teachers Association, chaired the rally. Speakers at the rally said they will continue the agitation till the VC is withdrawn.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh Chhatra League and Sarbadal Chhatra Sangram Parishad, a combine of opposition-backed student organisations, took out a procession from the city's Madina Market towards the campus demanding resignation of the VC.

The processionists were stopped near the BDR gate-III by police before they reached the main gate of the Sust.

Academic life of about 65,000 students became uncertain as the authorities failed to end the stalemate created after a student died in

police firing on the campus on May 14. The university was closed sine die and the VC left the campus after the incident.

After three months, the university was reopened on August 9 amid indefinite strike by opposition-backed student organisations.

The opposition backed teachers refrained from taking classes as they extended support to the students' strike.

However, the VC managed to return to the campus on July 5 under protection of police and cadres of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal and Shibir, student fronts of ruling BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami.

Since then, the opposition backed teachers and student organisations are demanding his withdrawal.

BNP men vow to resist party MP in Bajitpur

Committee styled 'Save Bajitpur BNP' formed after clashes between rivals

A tense situation is prevailing at Bajitpur upazila headquarters following a series of clashes between rival BNP factions in last six days, damaging each other's party offices and vandalising meeting venues.

BNP is divided into two factions in Bajitpur, one led by lawmaker Majibur Rahman Monju and the other by party nomination seeker Prof Tofazzol Hossain Badal,

Salehuzzaman Khan Runu and Sheikh Mujibur Rahman Iqbal.

The simmering discord and rivalry came in the open when a pandal erected by Monju's supporters at Hilchia Government Primary School on September 20 was damaged by their rivals, sources in the party and locals said.

They said Monju's three rivals have mustered support of party men and formed a committee styled "Save Bajitpur BNP from Monju."

On September 18, some party men led by Monju allegedly vandalised Prof

Tofazzol's party office, torched his motorcycle and damaged a TV set and chairs inside, said Tofazzol.

Protesting this, Prof Tofazzol along with Salehuzzaman and Sheikh Mujibur Rahman panned a public meeting at the upazila headquarters on September 23.

Manju also called another public meeting at the same venue a the same time.

The administration imposed Section 144 there to avert any clash.

The two rival factions held their separate meetings in other areas.
