

IT expert falls to death from six-storey bldg

Zahid Parvez Babu, an IT expert and businessman, died after he fell from a sunshade of a six-storey building in Rampura Mahanagar Residential Project area in the city on Tuesday evening.

Babu, 32, was fixing cables of his Information Technology establishment at the top of the building close to his house, but he slipped and fell to the ground at around 4:15 pm, his family members said.

He was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared him dead. The right part of his body sustained the impact.

Son of businessman Haji Shafiuddin Ahmed, Babu left behind his mother, a sister, his wife Nishat and son Ahfar, and a host of relatives, friends and well-wishers.

His body was brought back to his Rampura home at D-60, Road 3, Mahanagar Residential Project at 1:30am yesterday and then taken to his Faridpur village home in the morning for burial. He was buried in the family graveyard after Zohr prayers.

Babu completed his honours and master's in management under Dhaka University and obtained diploma in computer science. He started a small IT venture three years ago while looking after his father's business.

A talented amateur musician of the early nineties, Babu was involved with a band called 'Icarus' as its keyboard player, and contributed to an album with the band in 1994.


