## Vengsarkar new chief selector

Former Test captain Dilip Vengsarkar was elected India's chief cricket selector on Wednesday with ex-spinner Venkatapathy Raju also joining the five-man panel, officials said.

Vengsarkar took over from Kiran More, who completed four years in the job and was not eligible for re-nomination under the rules of the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI).

Raju replaced VB Chandrasekhar, while Ranjib Biswal, Sanjay Jagdale and Bhupinder Singh retained their posts at the BCCI's annual general meeting.

The selection committee comprises one elected representative from each of the five zones outlined by the BCCI. The most senior person is made the chairman.

Of the five selectors, only Vengsarkar and Raju have played Test cricket.

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## Abahani group champs

Holders Abahani emerged group champions when they kept their perfect record in the Shah Sports Club Cup hockey tournament with an exciting 4-2 win over title contenders Usha Krira Chakra at the Maulana Bhasani National Hockey Stadium in yesterday.

The scoreline of the Group A finale, however, looks deceptive as group runners-up Usha -- who stuck to six points compared to Abahani's maximum nine -- could have finished on the winning side had they converted a series of second half chances.

Moududur Rahman Shuva, Asife-Noor, Monirul Alam Sumon and Russel Mahmud Jimmy found the net for the sky-blues while Zahidul Islam Rajan, who was at the heart of two-

time champions Usha's spirited second-half display, fired back twice.

Abahani, who will take on the second-placed side from Group B -- Mariners or Mohammedan who meet tomorrow in their group decider -- in the semifinals, got a deserved 2-0 first half lead after dominating the first 35 minutes.

Tabib-e-Noor's fumble in the eighth minute as Shuva snatched possession and calmly pushed the ball past goalkeeper Zahid for his fifth goal in three games.

National number one custodian Bappi kept Abahani in the game when he made a superb save on Dinar's penalty corner in the 20th minute, inspiring Asif-e-Noor to double the lead a couple of minutes later with a back-flick after Musa Mia's hardwork at the right flank.

Usha striker Rafiqul Islam Kamal was denied by woodwork before the break and seconds into the second

half, Abahani's first match hat-trick hero Sumon made it 3-0 with an angular hit after the Musa-Jimmy combination set him with a nice pass.

The 3-0 cushion made Abahani relax and Usha fight back. Rajan's dazzling runs unsettled the compact Abahani backline led by Issa Mia but Krishna and Rimon spoiled sitters. Both the youngsters mislaid their chances with only goalkeeper Bappi to beat and it was Rajan who finally reduced the arrears with a deflected penalty corner in the 48th minute.

Jimmy's brilliance, however, put Abahani beyond Usha's reach as the playmaker weaved his way through four rival players before sounding the board with a neat reverse hit in the 54th minute. Jimmy could have widened the margin but the top stickwielder of the country rattled the post and put

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## Tigers' first practice match today

The ICC Champions Trophy-bound cricketers will play their first practice match at BKSP today after returning from a three-day break.

The two practice matches were originally scheduled for last week but were called off due to inclement weather and as a result the players were given an early break to play the practice matches before their departure on October 1.

Selectors have already named

the two squads for the match with skipper Habibul Bashar leading team A against out-of-favour Tushar Imran's team B.

Two injured new-ball bowlers Mashrafe Bin Mortaza and Syed Rasel were not included in the sides and chief selector Faruque Ahmed ruled out any possibility to see any one of the bowlers in the first game, though they were getting better as the tournament approaches.

"Paceman Shahadat (Hossain) also suffered an ankle injury before the break but he is all right along with Mashrafe. But we are still concerned over the condition of

Rasel. We will discuss everything during the practice match and decide on the issue," said Faruque.

He, however, said that Mashrafe and Rasel have a chance to play the second and final practice match at the same venue on September 30 if they get hundred per cent clearance today.

It would also be a good opportunity for Bashar to be assured about his fractured left fifth metacarpal.

Bangladesh's first game in the second biggest competition of ICC is on October 7 in Mohali against Sri Lanka and then they go on to

## BNS inspection goes in vain

The ground inspection committee of the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) yesterday failed its deadline to give a recommendation about the transfer or the start of the inaugural Professional Football League.

Ten out of the 11-member committee, headed by its convenor and BFF general secretary Anwarul Hoque Helal, inspected the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday morning sans a crucial member, National Sports Council (NSC) director of planning and development Nurul Haque Pradhan.

The NSC is in charge of renovation of the ground and it was learned that the NSC director sent his representative to the ground, who is looking after the construction works. In Pradhan's absence, the club representatives of the committee did not get the necessary documents of the shipment of the athletics turf, which will be laid at the stadium.

The committee has now decided to wait two more weeks to get a clear about the availability of the ground and give its recommendation to the federation by October 10.

The delay would ultimately serve the purpose of a few influential clubs of the city who have been trying to hold up the league until next year due to crisis of fund.

## CCL delayed by two days

The Corporate Cricket League, curtain-raiser of the cricket season, which was scheduled to start on October 1, will now be deferred by two days.

The tournament got delayed due to persistent rain last week, which hampered ground preparation in all the venues as well as participating teams' practice.

The third edition of the twelve-team meet will now begin on October 3.

Meanwhile, the first meeting of the newly formed tournament committee of Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) will be held today at the board's management office at Gulshan.

Tournament Committee Chairman Shah Nurul Kabir Shaheen, MP will preside over the meeting, which is likely to discuss the holding of national championship, national league and corporate cricket league.

## Inzy knows time is up

Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq, facing charges of bringing cricket into disrepute and ball-tampering, said in a newspaper interview on Wednesday that his playing days may be numbered.

"I don't know how much longer I'll be playing cricket," he told the Guardian newspaper. "I'm not going to say if I'll play up to the World Cup (March and April next year) or after the World Cup. It all depends on one's performance."

The 36-year-old, the only active member of the victorious Pakistan World Cup team of 1992, had been advised by former captain Rashid Latif to quit Test cricket to prolong his one-day international career.

"Well, before he said that, many used to say that I should stop playing one-dayers and concentrate on Test matches instead," he said.

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## Euro 2008 mascots revealed

UEFA unveiled twin mascots on Wednesday for the 2008 European Championships set to be co-hosted by Austria and Switzerland.

The broad-shouldered figures are dressed in red and white football uniforms and have bright red, pointy serrated hairstyles to mirror the shape of the mountain peaks symbolically depicted in the official Euro 2008 logo.

"It is not one mascot for Switzerland and one for Austria. We have two common mascots," Austrian federation president Friedrich Stickler said.

Warner Bros Consumer Products' creative team took six months to come up with 100 variations before settling on mascots clad in soccer gear in the national colours of the two hosts.

The pair, wearing numbers 20 and 08, are ascribed magical qualities and different characters, UEFA said. No. 8 is the serious and self-

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## Oval hearing begins

Inzamamul Haq arrived at The Oval here Wednesday for the start of a hearing where the Pakistan captain will answer disciplinary charges arising from his role in the team's unprecedented forfeit of the fourth Test against England at the south London ground last month.

Inzamam has been accused of ball-tampering, as captain, and bringing cricket into disrepute after Pakistan refused to take the field after tea on the fourth day of the fourth Test against England on August 20.

They did so in protest at the decision of umpires Darrell Hair and Billy Doctrove to penalise them five runs for ball-tampering earlier in the day.

The 36-year-old Inzamam, who was accompanied by Pakistan coach Bob Woolmer, drove through a crowd of television crews and reporters as he made his way in at 9am local time 0800 GMT via the Alec Stewart gate.

International Cricket Council (ICC) senior match referee Ranjan Madugalle, who is chairing the

hearing, scheduled for two days, arrived at 0730 GMT.

He was followed 15 minutes later when Doctrove got out of a taxi with match referee Mike Procter and Doug Cowie, the ICC's umpires' manager.

Australian official Hair, blamed by Pakistan for his handling of the situation, arrived shortly after Inzamam when he walked through the gates.

When asked for his views, he replied: "No comment -- good to see you all."

Madugalle has a maximum of 24 hours after the end of the hearing, which is closed to the public, to give his verdict. A decision should, therefore, be announced Friday local time at the latest.

Pakistan's refusal to take the field meant they forfeited the match -- the first time this had happened in 129 years of Test cricket -- and England were awarded a win which gave them the series 3-0.

Inzamam made no comment as he entered The Oval.

But in Wednesday's edition of the Guardian newspaper he spoke of the "respect" his team's stance had earned with cricket followers back home.

"By God's mercy, I received a lot

of public support. It's a very good thing that the Pakistani people appreciated the stand we took. Respect is the main thing -- it's the first thing that matters.

"Definitely, I did feel some pressure. But inside I resolved that I had done nothing wrong and was satisfied with my actions. That's what helped me.

Meanwhile former Pakistan captain Imran Khan added: "There's been a lot of hurt caused by Darrell Hair calling the team cheats.

"If they (the Pakistan team) want to redeem their honour and pursue the ball-tampering issue, they should have gone to a court of law.

"That would make sure that never again can an umpire -- unless he has clear evidence -- declare a team guilty of cheating. I'm afraid they're barking up the wrong tree by going to the ICC. The ICC gives everything to the umpire."

After the match ICC chief executive Malcolm Speed revealed Hair had sent the world governing body an e-mail saying he would stand down from their elite panel of

## Bell undaunted by Ashes

England batsman Ian Bell will head to the Ashes showdown with Australia insisting he has nothing to prove but eyeing a bagful of runs.

The Warwickshire player was part of the side which triumphed 2-1 in 2005 but, despite scoring two centuries in the third Test at Old Trafford, he averaged only 17 in the series.

Bell was then an international rookie, having only played three Tests -- including two against minnows Bangladesh -- before that memorable series with Ricky Ponting's side.

But he is now an established member of the England set-up, scoring centuries in three successive Tests this summer, and will be full of confidence for the tasks ahead.

"I've got 18 Test matches under my belt now compared to three last time I faced Australia. I've played a winter on the sub-continent," said Bell.

"I've got some experience of playing against the top players in the world and can go to Australia with that in the bank and I've also got three hundreds in the last four Tests.

"Have I anything to prove in Australia? I don't feel as if I have to prove anything to myself. I would like to score runs against Australia. But I don't think I need to go and prove too much to anyone.

"They would have seen I've scored three hundreds in the last four Tests. They will know that. A lot of Australians play county cricket as well so I don't think I have to prove too much to anyone.

"But it would be nice to go out there and score some runs. I was chuffed to bits to be a part of the Ashes side but would like to do more with the bat this time."

Bell added: "To be part of England retaining the Ashes would be pretty special, especially in their own backyard. That would be great.

"What happened last summer against Australia will always stay in people's minds and it is up to us to go to Australia and compete like we did last

time.

"I feel I belong more in the Test side now and am mentally stronger. That has come with a bit of experience. I've had some ups and downs. I've been left out a little bit and then got back in."

Before the Ashes, England will be competing in the ICC Trophy in India and he feels England have renewed confidence in the limited overs game after their two victories against Pakistan enabled them to square the series.

He said: "The two wins against Pakistan were a great lift and it is really what we needed.

"A lot of cricket is about momentum and, if we can take what we've done in the Test matches and the one-dayers at the end of the summer, it will stand us in good stead for the ICC.

"If we can win the games well in the ICC, it will also give us some good momentum for going into the World Cup. That's important and every game for the one-day side, which is sort of emerging with young players, is important."

## Ganguly's final shot?

Deposed India captain Sourav Ganguly was on Tuesday given what one selector said was a "last chance" to win back his place in the non-performing national team.

The 34-year-old was handed a berth in the domestic Challenger one-day series, a selection trial for the busy international season that culminates with the World Cup in the Caribbean next March.

Ganguly, who has not been selected for next month's Champions Trophy tournament, will play for the India 'B' team under Mohammad Kaif against Rahul David's India Seniors and India A led by Venugopal Rao.

Ganguly, India's most successful

Test captain and a stylish left-handed batsman, was thrown out of the national team last season and was subsequently involved in a spat with India's Australian coach Greg Chappell.

He has not played a one-day international since September last year and was dropped from the Test squad after the tour of Pakistan in February.

But with the floundering Indian team having won just one of its last nine one-dayers, Ganguly is being regarded as a serious candidate for the tour of South Africa later this year and the World Cup.

He is one of only four batsmen in the world to score more than 10,000 runs in limited-overs cricket and has played in two World Cups, the last as captain in 2003 when India reached the final.

Ganguly's 10,123 runs from 279 one-dayers puts him in fourth place behind teammate Sachin Tendulkar, Pakistan's Inzamamul Haq and Sri Lanka's Sanath

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
