



Carry out 11 tasks within Nov 3 to prove neutrality

Hasina meets Iajuddin to spell out demands, She will declare next course of action from rally if he fails test

Awami League-led 14-party alliance leaders met President and Chief Adviser to the caretaker government Iajuddin Ahmed yesterday and demanded that he should perform 11 urgent tasks, including reconstitution of Election Commission (EC) and neutralisation of civil and police administrations, within November 3 to prove his neutrality.

The chief of the non-party interim government assured the eight-member delegation of the 14-party alliance led by Awami

Retaliate in similar way, if attacked

Khaleda tells rally

Former prime minister and BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday asked people to remain alert against any move to foil the next general election and create constitutional crisis.

She also urged her party men to retaliate in similar way if attacked by their political opponents.

Urging all other political parties to help caretaker government hold a free and fair election, she said, "President has taken up the charge of chief advisor constitutionally".

She was addressing a huge rally in front of the BNP central office at Naya Paltan to declare a three-day programme against anarchy and vandalism of 'the 14-party com-



workers.

The BNP chairperson asked them to take serious preparation for a vote revolution in the upcoming polls. "We must go ahead with our roadmap for development," she said amid applauses and slogans from the audience.

She accused the Awami League for killing 24 people in the last few days. "The caretaker government must have to take action against persons involved with these killings."

"We showed enough of our patience and won't tolerate anymore. We know how to tackle someone trying to create anarchy."

"From now on, if anyone tries to attack on our workers, we will hit back."

CHIEF ADVISER SWINGS INTO ACTION

9 secys lose jobs, 18 others transferred

In his first move after swearing in as the chief of the caretaker government, President Iajuddin Ahmed last night cancelled contractual appointments of nine secretaries and transferred 18 other high ranking bureaucrats, according to a government announcement. Dr Kamal Uddin Siddiqui, principal secretary to the immediate past prime minister (PM), is the most

prominent among the secretaries whose jobs were terminated. He is the most benefited bureaucrat of the immediate past BNP-led four-party alliance government. His job tenure was extended five times breaking all previous records in the civil administration.

The rest of the secretaries who received pink slips are Secretary to the President's Office Akhter Hossain Khan, secretary to the immediate past prime minister

Khandakar Shahidul Islam, Communications Secretary M Shafiqul Islam, Shipping Secretary M Rafiqul Islam, Agriculture Secretary Kazi Abul Kashem, Housing and Public Works Secretary Iqbaluddin Chowdhury, Information Secretary Abdul Quaiyum, and Labour and Employment Secretary Capt (retd) Sujauddin Ahmed.

4 killed, 300 hurt as violence continues

Ex-JCD president beaten up in Faridpur

Four people died and around 300 people were injured following violence between activists of Awami League (AL)-led 14-party alliance and the BNP-led four-party combine at different districts of the country yesterday.

Dishonesty the power sector policy

As the alliance government is set to hand over power to the caretaker government this week, the country is reeling under a load-shedding of 2,200 MW. Had the AL not pursued private power, this load-shedding would have hit more than 3,000 MW. The country presently consumes 5,200 MW.

That the 4-party government has failed in the power sector is well reflected in the incidents of the Kansat killings in January and countrywide anger and protests in August-September this year. People want uninterrupted power supply, but the level of load-shedding exceeded all limits of tolerance.

The discontent over power supply forced the otherwise indifferent government to change its power minister twice.
