CG chief urged to perform duty neutrally

Leaders of two rights organisations yesterday urged the president to appoint competent and neutral persons as the advisers to the caretaker government and to create a peaceful environment in the country.

Bangladesh Manobadikar Samonnoy Parishad (BMSP) and Shushashoner Janney Nagorik (Shujan) held a brief rally and took out a peace procession from Shahbagh that ended at Muktagan in the city.

Though the president has been able to give the nation a sense of relief, as he became the chief of caretaker government, he should perform his duty neutrally, the speakers said.

They also demanded that an independent secretariat of the Election Commission (EC) should be established.

The demands also include democracy within the political party, compulsory registration for the political parties, providing detailed information of the candidates to the voters, provision of 'no-vote' and introduction of a system to recall the elected representatives.

President of Shujan and prominent economist Prof Mozaffar Ahmed, Columnist Abdul Moksd, former Chief News Editor of Bangladesh Television Rafikul Islam Sarkar, President of BMSP AHM Noman, Dr Nuruddin of Sheba and Tushar Rehman of Citizens' Rights Movement also spoke at the rally.

Implement 11-pt of 14-party to prove neutrality

South Asian People's Union tells Iajuddin

South Asian People's Union against Fundamentalism and Secular Bangladesh yesterday called on President and Chief Adviser Iajuddin Ahmed to prove himself to be neutral by implementing the 11-point reform proposal of the 14-party combine.

The reform proposal must be implemented without delay in order to hold the 9th parliamentary election in a free, fair and peaceful manner, they said in a statement.

They also urged the President to cancel contractual appointments and remove the officials appointed on political considerations in the Election Commission, civil administration and police department.

At the same time, those who were transferred, suspended or made OSD for their neutrality and out of political vengeance should be brought back to their respective posts, they added.

They said thousands of Islamist militants are still in hiding and the vested quarters would use them during the election.

They called on the chief adviser to arrest godfathers of the militants, extract information about their network and activities from them

and make those public.

They also demanded arrest of and punishment to those responsible for repression of religious minorities that began after the takeover of the caretaker government in 2001.

'Remove officials appointed on political considerations'

Bangladesh Civil Service Samannay Committee and Cadre and Non-Cadre Engineers' Action Committee yesterday urged the President to remove the top officials appointed on political considerations and cancel all contractual appointments in order to ensure neutrality of the administration.

They said the decision to cancel contractual appointments of nine secretaries is a positive step, but transfer of only 18 secretaries will do little to ensure impartiality as they were transferred from an important ministry to another important ministry such as home affairs and local government.

They demanded that these officials be replaced with efficient and qualified persons, thereby ensuring impartiality of the civil administration.

Samannay Committee Secretary General Md Nazrul Islam, Mesbahur Rahman Tutul, Dr Mushtak Hossain, AKMA Hamid and Ashraf Ali Khan attended the meeting.
