

## 31 women held at ZIA on way to Libya with fake papers

Immigration police yesterday morning held 31 women at Zia International Airport (ZIA) when they were preparing to board a Libya-bound plane with fake work permits and detained four officials of expatriates welfare and overseas employment ministry for their alleged involvement in the matter.

Rescued from the trafficking attempt, the women and their families are now eyeing uncertain future as most of them had to sell their properties and last belongings in a desperate bid to go abroad for a 'better future'.

They had paid Tk 45,000 to 1 lakh to the brokers to go to Libya and were scheduled to fly by a Gulf Air flight at 7:45am yesterday, they said.

Following the instructions of their brokers, they gathered at a

## No solution to crisis as deadline nears

CA to meet advisory council Monday after 4-day gap

The country is veering towards a deep uncertainty again as President Iajuddin Ahmed has yet to find a solution to the current political crisis while the third deadline for meeting the 11-point demand of 14-party coalition is set to expire tomorrow.

The penchant of the president-cum-chief adviser to the caretaker government (CG) for keeping the council of advisers in the dark on crucial issues is making the present political crisis more complex, which might push the country towards confrontations, many former advisers to caretaker governments fear.

The chief adviser (CA) will possibly sit with other advisers of the council on Monday, but so far

he did not show any interest for discussing possible reconstitution of the EC with them even after they had held dialogues on the issue with political parties, sources said.

The delegation of advisers, tasked with holding the dialogues, however tried to have meetings with the CA several times, the sources added.

Meanwhile, BNP-led four-party alliance is taking preparations for participating in the next election without 14-party coalition, BNP sources said.

The EC is also preparing to announce the election schedule, Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) MA Aziz said on Thursday.

"The activities of the president are highly questionable and ill-intentioned. He is working under

the direction of some quarters as there is a huge gap in communication between him and his advisers," Hafiz Uddin Khan, former adviser to a caretaker government, told The Daily Star yesterday.

"The crisis will deepen if the election schedule is declared before solving the present political impasse," he said adding that everyone except four-party alliance want to see a reconstituted EC.

"The caretaker government shouldn't do anything which could create misunderstandings. Electoral reforms should be its highest priority. It will also have to accomplish a lot of other tasks like illegal arms recovery and preparing

## European parliament members for recasting EC

UNB, Dhaka

Members of European Parliament (MEPs) have called for recasting the Election Commission in Bangladesh so that it (EC) could work in a truly neutral manner.

The MEPs wish to see "a strong and decisive caretaker government". They also urged President Iajuddin Ahmed's interim administration to reconstitute the Election Commission so as "to ensure that the latter can perform its work in a truly neutral manner".

The appeal to the caretaker government was made in a resolution adopted at the plenary session in Strasbourg on November 16 on the situation in Bangladesh ahead of the elections scheduled for early 2007, according to a release of EU parliament.

The MEPs said the government should "create a climate in which

## 150-yr-old building goes down for high-rise

Jagannath University authorities have arbitrarily started demolishing a monumental building along with an ancient garden to make room for a high-rise building.

The two-storied stately building is nearly 150-year-old and once housed an Indian bank during British era. In July 1884, the building started being used as the library of the erstwhile Jagannath College.

Leading architects and environmentalists of the country expressed grave concern over what they called 'thoughtless act' of the authorities.

"The building must not be demolished in this manner because it is old, historic and of immense architectural value," said

## Press owners won't print faulty voters' list

Printing press owners have decided not to print the faulty voter list, which the Election Commission (EC) has prepared, alleging that the controversial Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) MA Aziz has hatched a plot to embezzle the taxpayers' money.

The decision was made at a joint meeting of more than a hundred members of Bangladesh Printing Industry Samity and Bangladesh Printing and Marketing Samity held at the latter's office on Thursday, says a press release.

The speakers in the meeting claimed that the CEC awarded the work order to print the voter roll to a number of printing presses of which only five to seven are genuine printing presses and the rest are suppliers and institutions only on paper without any printing machines.

They said the printing of the

## BSF kills 1 in Satkhira

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) gunned down a Bangladeshi cattle trader at Tarali under Swarupnagar Police Station of 24 Parganas district on Thursday night.

The victim was identified as Altaf Hossain, 22, son of Anisuddin of Faizullahpur village in Kolaroa upazila.

According to Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) sources, the Indian border guards of Tarali camp opened fire on Altaf while he was returning home after buying cows from a bazar in 24 Parganas district.

Altaf received bullets in the head and chest and died instantly, according to a report received from across the border.

Immediately after the killing, BDR sent a letter to the BSF authorities protesting the killing and asked its Indian counterpart to return the body.

When contacted, Major Kamrul Hasan of 41 Rifles Battalion, confirmed the incident.

The BSF did not hand over the body of the cattle trader as of 6:00pm yesterday.

## Renegade Barrister Zia says BNP loyalists tried to kidnap him

Former lawmaker Barrister Ziaur Rahman Khan has alleged that BNP loyalists led by former state minister for education Ehsanul Haq Milon attempted to kidnap him from his Dhanmondi residence in the capital on Thursday.

"It was an attempt by BNP men to kidnap me as part of a Hawa Bhaban (BNP's Banani office) plan to put pressure on me to return to the party from LDP," he told a press conference yesterday.

Zia made it clear that he now belongs to the LDP and will remain with it.

The former legislator from Dhamrai in Manikganj quit BNP recently and joined the newly formed Liberal Democratic Party (LDP).

The press conference held at LDP presidium office at Baridhara was also addressed by party President AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury, Executive President Col (Retd) Oli Ahmed and party leader Maj (Retd) Abdul Mannan.

"They (BNP men) forcibly tried to take me to Hawa Bhaban to blackmail me. They also gathered some newsmen there by giving them false information about my return to BNP," Zia said.

Referring to laying of siege to renegade Zia's residence by BNP men from Dhamrai on Thursday, the LDP leaders said it was a 'sign of nervousness' within BNP.

Badruddoza said, "If we reveal the names of BNP leaders who are now waiting to join LDP, they (BNP) would be much more nervous."

## One dies in 'robbery' in capital

One person died and three of a family were critically injured in a robbery incident in the capital's Badda area in the early hours of yesterday.

Police however brushed away the allegation of robbery and said there must be some other reasons behind the incident.

Manik Sarkar, 20, died after being rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) while his father Sunil Sarkar, 45, along with their neighbours Akhter Hussain, 50, his wife Rahima Begum, 42, and their son, Sujon, 8, were admitted to the hospital with severe injuries.

The incident occurred at Amdiarlek Hindupara near Baloor Math area in Bashundhara around 1:00am when a group of more than 20 robbers wearing masks robbed around ten houses in the neighbourhood.

## Chief Adviser's inexplicable behaviour

*Four days' delay is difficult to accept*

When the country is facing such an uncertain future, when every citizen is worried about the political conflict that more and more threatens to disrupt everyone's personal and professional life, when every businessman is frustrated with what is happening, when every parent is worried about whether or not to send their wards to school the next morning, the pace at which the caretaker government, especially the President/Chief Advisor (CA) is working appears totally unacceptable. The nonchalance and laidback approach gives the impression that the President/CA seems to have all

the time in the world.

Take the latest instance. The President/CA himself set up a four-member committee of advisors to work out a solution to the political problem acceptable to all parties. The committee worked as fast as was possible, met all the political parties and has finalised its report. Throughout Thursday the committee members frantically tried to meet Prof. Iajuddin to give him their final report and seek his decision for future action. The President did not have time for them. Instead the issue is now to be discussed in the regular cabinet meeting scheduled for Monday – a good four days later. Why? Is the political impasse such a

low priority that the President/CA can take four days just to look at it? Meanwhile, he had time, on Thursday (the day when the Committee was desperately trying to squeeze in a moment to meet him) to meet Jamaat, a group of Ulema, and hold a nearly two-hour unscheduled meeting with the Election Commission.

The President/CA's delay becomes all the more inexplicable in view of the four-day deadline, finishing Sunday night, that the 14-party has given before it resumes its political programme. We agree

## Family toils to bring hog-deer from brink

The hog-deer has probably been saved from extinction from the country's wildlife as an animal-loving family in the district has increased its number from just a pair to six over the last eight years.

Officials from Dulahajara Safari Park went to Khagrachhari last Friday and convinced the owner of the six rare deer to handover the animals to them.

Anwar Hossain, a businessman whose family grew up the herd, handed over all the six hog-deer to the Dulahajara Safari Park authorities that noon.

The hog-deer, popularly known as "Para Horeen" in Bangla, is a species thought to have been extinct from the wildlife of the country for more than

50 years.

But one male hog-deer was found from the jungle near Alutla of Khagrachhari a couple of years ago, said wildlife specialist and Dulahajara Safari Park Project Director Dr Tapan Kumar Dey.

Since then officials of the safari park had been looking for at least one female so that the species could multiply, he said.

The hog-deer is, however, available in Tripura and Kaziranga forests of Assam, wildlife experts told The Daily Star.

And Anwar's family has had one pair for the last eight years.

Anwar said he brought the pair of hog-deer from a Tipra indigenous family eight years ago. His family members have taken care of the pair and the
