

## 100-member squad for Asiad

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh will send a 100-member contingent to the 15th Asian Games to be held in Doha from December 1-15.

The contingent consists of 77 athletes including nine females and 23 officials.

Bangladesh will compete in 12 disciplines in the biggest sporting event in the continent – athletics, swimming, shooting, football, hockey, kabaddi, weightlifting, chess, cue sports (billiard and snooker), judo, taekwondo and golf.

The first batch -- the football team -- will fly for the Qatar capital on November 25 as the soccer competition begins on November 28, two days ahead of the formal opening of the Games. The rest of the contingent will fly gradually.

Chef de mission of Bangladesh contingent Kutubuddin Aksir will leave for Doha on November 23 to make necessary arrangements for the team.

## Dav at odds with Ashraful?

There is hardly any doubt that Mohammad Ashraful has yet to justify his rare breed of talent though he had glinted the cricket world quite sometimes but his exclusion from the team for the upcoming home series against Zimbabwe left a thousand questions unanswered chief of which was whether the young man was alone to be blamed.

The inconsistency seemed to be a chronic syndrome in his batting that's why anybody can justify the selection panel's decision of bringing back his form by keeping him away from the team but the question was raised whether it was the only reason

behind the 'chopping'.

Nobody could mind if only cricketing affairs played a role behind the important decision but it was now already published in different newspapers that the stubborn stance of coach Dav Whatmore forced other selectors to take the tough decision. The events revolving the latest selection drama also led the cynics to believe that the Sri Lankan-born Australian has taken the 'Ashraful' case as a personal mission.

There were allegations that Whatmore was not even on talking terms with the country's most talented batsman for eight months after Bangladesh's last tour of Sri Lanka.

Although the high-profile coach kept everyone guessing by not appearing at Sunday's press conference citing illness, the

tendency of both chief selector Faruque Ahmed and captain Habibul Bashar to bypass the 'Ashraful' issue was quite evident during the hostile briefing.

It was learnt that both the chief selector and the Bangladesh captain had to give up the fight after Whatmore even proposed to take a rookie (Nafid Chowdhury) in place of Ashraful during the selection committee meeting.

It seems that Whatmore himself has confused Ashraful most by promoting him to the opening slot now and again, especially his decision to send Ashraful to open batting against Kenya in the last game surprised many in the team as he had played an unbeaten 67 against the same opponents in the first match batting at number five.

Although there was much talk about his recent form the fact

however portrays that it was not as bad if compared to his last year's performance (he scored one historic hundred against Australia and made two fifties in 14 ODI innings in 2005).

Ashraful had a great start in the year when he smashed one Test hundred and two back-to-back ODI half centuries against Sri Lanka during a home series in February but he suddenly lost his way although he got starts sometimes in both versions of the game. The team think-tank even saw his 18-run knock against Sri Lanka in the ICC Champions Trophy as an indication of a return to form.

So it was mysterious why the selection panel suddenly came so hard on the batsman with the next World Cup around the corner.

## Taylor turns it around

Chris Gayle and Daren Ganga made a confident start after Jerome Taylor's five-wicket haul in the second Test against Pakistan Monday, boosting the West Indies' hopes of levelling the series.

Gayle was unbeaten on a punishing 87 and Ganga was 59 not out at stumps, taking the tourists to 151-0 in reply to Pakistan's first-innings total of 357 on the second day at the Multan Stadium on Monday.

The West Indies, 1-0 down in the three-match series after losing by nine wickets in the first Test in Lahore, now trail by 206 runs with all their wickets in hand.

Gayle -- the player of the

Champions Trophy in India earlier this month with 414 runs including three hundreds -- hit ten boundaries and a six during his 233-minutes at the crease and put the home bowlers into submission.

The 27-year-old Jamaican, who managed 34 and 11 in the first Test, cut loose after tea by hitting leg-spinner Danish Kaneria for two successive boundaries to reach his half-century.

He treated Mohammad Hafeez with the same disdain, pulling the off-spinner for a huge six over mid-wicket and then driving two successive boundaries to stamp his authority.

Ganga, who played second fiddle to Gayle, reached his eighth Test fifty when he drove paceman Umar Gul for his ninth boundary to add to the home team's problems.

Earlier fast bowler Jerome

Taylor took 5-91 -- his second five-wicket haul in nine Tests -- and Corey Collymore posted (2-67) to stop Pakistan from hitting a big score after they resumed at 263-4.

The 22-year-old Jamaican Taylor bowled his heart out on a lifeless pitch and was rewarded by the West Indies took the last six Pakistan wickets for 88 runs.

Taylor said the pitch had been no help.

"The wicket is conducive for bowling but we bowled in the right areas and knew how dangerous Inzamamul Haq could be," he said. "His wicket was the prized one and once we got him we knew we were there."

"There is a lot of work to be done in this Test and we need to build on the good start and press for a win," added Taylor, whose previous five-wicket haul was the

5-50 he took against India at Kingston earlier this year.

The tourists started with the second new ball and got an early result in the third over, when Taylor produced a sharp outswinger to find an edge off Inzamam's bat to wicketkeeper Denesh Ramdin.

Inzamam failed to add to his overnight score of 31.

The West Indies could have snared Malik in the next over, but Brian Lara grinded a low catch when the batsman was on 14.

Dwayne Bravo at third slip let Malik off again four runs later, with Collymore the unlucky bowler on both occasions.

Collymore, who bowled unchanged for 15 overs, finally forced an edge off Malik to third slip, where Bravo held a superb left-handed catch. Malik hit seven

But the top cricketer of the country, ignored for the first three one-day internationals for the coming home series against Zimbabwe, remains the apple of people's eye as he became the DEKKO-bangladeshherkela Sportsman of the Year-2005" award at a colourful function at the Shawkat Osman Memorial auditorium in Public Library yesterday.

Ashraful has won the award for the second consecutive year now, beating former national football captain Arif Khan Joy by a wide margin of 50 votes.

The national cricketer received highest 171 points and was followed by Joy (121) and dashing batsman Aftab Ahmed (89).

Apart from Ashraful, the nominees for Sportsman of the Year were Habibul Bashar Sumon, Javed Omar Balim, Aftab Ahmed, Enamul
