




Did U Know?

After two convincing victories, Bangladesh captain Habibul Bashar got out of the shell as he said that they were ready to be ruthless against Zimbabwe in the third match to confirm the series victory with two matches in hand at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium today.

The 33-year old skipper had been reserve before the second game because of their bitter experience of losing the away series 3-2 but the sides' performance in the last two games has given him the confidence that it is just matter of time to decide the series.

"I want to confirm the series win tomorrow. I am happy the way we played the last two games. We have so far played excellent cricket and we are ready to continue this form till the last game," said Bashar during yesterday's practice session.

His main worry was Mashrafee Bin Mortza, who looks a doubtful starter for the crucial match following a shoulder injury.

Although team physio Paul Close

had assured in the morning that he would get better before the match, the leading paceman continued to complain and the team management is reluctant to take risk on him.

The Tigers had achieved their first ever one-day series victory against the same opponents in 2005 at home, bouncing back from a 2-0 deficit but this time they are in upper hand.

"Yes, we struggled in the last home battle against them and you all know we lost the away series earlier this year for some very small mistakes. But we are more matured now and the team performed as per my desire," the captain said.

Although the limelight was on strong batting displays, especially the amazing Shahriar Nafees's unbeaten 105 and 67, Bashar heaped praises on the bowlers.

"Our batsmen, especially Nafees, are among runs but I am really impressed by the way my bowlers have bowled. The wicket was totally flat in the second game but they did an excellent job to restrict the opponents for 217."

The premier Bangladeshi batsman was dismissive of the notion that they are on top against a weak opponent.

"I'd rather say they looked weak because of our excellent performance. But it's true that Zimbabwe are missing some good players.

"I don't like to change the squad for only for the sake of change

because my main objective is to win all the matches and quite convincingly," he said.

But chief selector Faruque Ahmed hinted at changes for the last two matches in Dhaka if Bangladesh can seal the series here.

"The selection committee will meet tomorrow during the match to decide about the squad for the last two games. It is not unlikely to see one or two new guys in the team," said Faruque.

When asked to comment on the new opening pair, Faruque said: "It is too early to comment but I am really impressed by the attitude of young Mehrab (Hossain). We can see a ray of hope with the new pair."

Soccer, cricket transfers delayed

Transfers of both domestic football and cricket, scheduled to begin from today, have been delayed due to the ongoing political unrest.

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF), despite having all preparations, deferred the transfer of the inaugural Professional Football League responding to fresh appeals by the participating clubs and footballers yesterday.

The clubs came out with a new proposal to start the transfer from December 15 and even managed to convince the protesting booters, who have been staging sit-ins for the past few days at the BFF Bhaban.

After a big showdown yesterday, the booters decided to postpone their sit-in programmes.

The revised date for transfer is December 14-February 14, 2007 and the Pro League will begin from February 15, 2007.

The participants' deadline for registration, however, remains December 13.

Meanwhile, the Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM) -- also set to begin the 3-day transfer from today with a plan to extend the period -- in a late night decision postponed the procedures due to the countrywide blockade.

CCDM chairman Khondoker Jamiluddin told last night that after announcing the schedule, he received calls from the concerned cricketers who are spread across the country for national duty and for the National Cricket League.

"It would be difficult for the players to reach the capital in this situation and we cannot ignore the players' safety or concern," Jamil said.

"If the situation gets better, we will sit with the clubs to announce a fresh date within 48 hours. Otherwise, we will consider announcing new date after December 10," he added.

In reply to Sylhet's 365, Dhaka slumped to 193 for eight at close of play as new ball bowler Nazmul grabbed 3-41 and left-arm spinner Nabil 4-42.

Apart from opener Uttam Sarkar (61 off 94 balls) and Marshall Ayub (38 off 96 balls), the Dhaka big guns completely lost their way when they were reduced to 20-3 after nine overs. The tail, however, kept their hopes alive to cross the 200-mark.

Earlier, Alok Kapali added 45 runs to his overnight 128 to single-handedly lead Sylhet's way to an imposing first innings total. The out-of-favour Tiger, who faced 254 balls in nearly six hours, sent the ball 21 times into the fence and whacked one six. He was the last man dismissed in the innings by Mohammed Sharif, the paceman who claimed 5-13.

CHITTAGONG v KHULNA
Overnight 94-2, Rajshahi built on their lead with opener Jahurul making a patient 139 and Nayeem Islam a faster 126 to take their total to 370-7 at stumps at the Rajshahi Divisional Stadium.

The two added 215 runs for the third wicket before Abul Bashar dismissed Jahurul, who hit 18 fours and two sixes in his 305-ball vigil. Nayeem's 235-ball essay featured 17 fours and two sixes before he was scalped by Ahsanullah Hasan.

With two days to go, Rajshahi enjoy a massive 277-run lead.

Zim cricket on a sticky wicket

Zimbabwe's cricket body was on Monday convicted by a Harare magistrate's court for breaching the country's stiff foreign exchange laws.

Zimbabwe Cricket (ZC), represented by the association's accountant Anesu Kafesu, pleaded guilty to making unauthorised payments to a foreign television company without the go-ahead from the central bank.

The southern African country, reeling under record inflation and a serious shortage of essential goods, fuel and foreign currency, has introduced strict laws on foreign payments which need central bank approval.

State prosecutor Obi Mabawana said between November 2004 and September last year the body had paid Britain-based television production company Octagon CSI 1.3 million US dollars for advertising and marketing services.

Mabawana said in the second charge ZC sold advertising space at Harare sports club to 7Cs, a South Africa-based company, in May 2005.

Captain Dilip Tirkey converted three penalty corners as India crushed Bangladesh 6-0 in their Pool B match in the 15th Asian Games hockey competition at the Al Rayyan hockey ground in Doha yesterday.

Shivendra Singh, Ragunath Vokkaligara and Adam Sinclair scored one goal each for India, who led 4-0 at the break.

In another Group B match yesterday, China handed Oman a 6-1 defeat with Yi Song slamming four goals including a hattrick.

Bangladesh will take on South Korea today.

In football, Bangladesh will end

their campaign today against Vietnam after losses to South Korea (3-0) and Bahrain (5-1).

The kabaddi team crashed to their third consecutive defeat when Bangladesh suffered a shocking 56-39 loss to unfancied Iran. The winners led the first half 31-20 and finished the game with eight bonus points compared to Bangladesh's two.

International Master Enamul Hossain Rajib and Grandmaster Reefat Bin Sattar both ended on 4.5 points in the men's rapid chess 9-round Swiss League, clinching 18th and 20th places respectively. Kazakhstan's Murat Kazhgaleyev, unbeaten in nine games, finished atop with 7.5 points. Total of 42 players competed.
