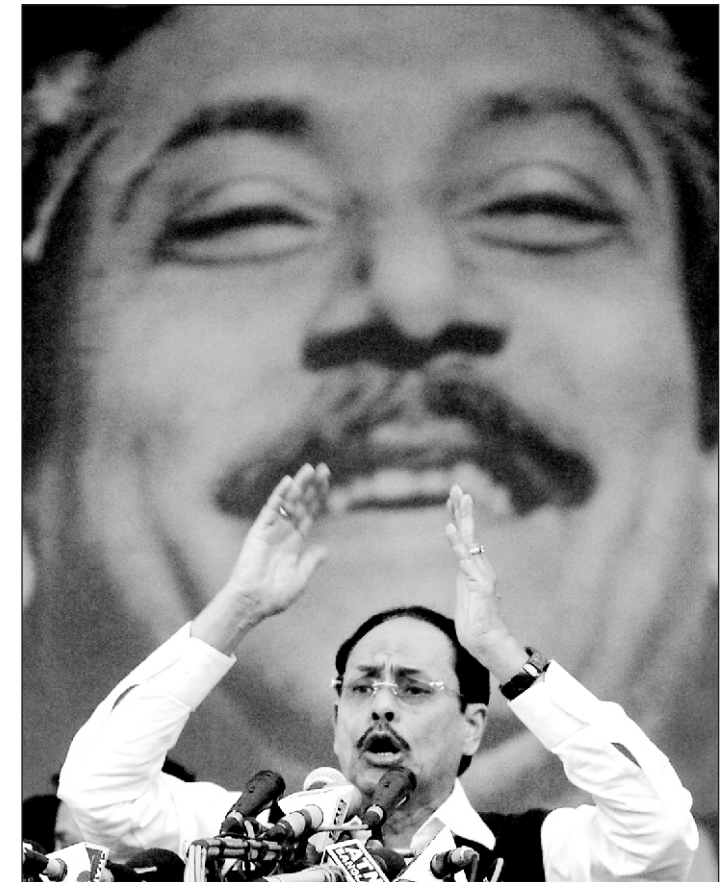
population of India.
