

Tigers doing well

After a break for the Eidul Azha and New Year, the national cricketers returned to business with an extensive fitness session at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday.

Due to the Premier Cricket League, scheduled to start tomorrow, there will be no residential camp for the coming Zimbabwe tour where the Tigers will play four one-day internationals against their southern African opponents.

The Tigers will participate in fitness sessions in between the Premiership matches before their departure for Harare on January 31 but the recent political turmoil has made everything uncertain, a fact

that has upset the cricketers.

"Nothing could have been better than playing more league matches before going to Zimbabwe but everything looks uncertain due to the political crisis. I don't think fatigue would be an issue in the World Cup because it's always a better option to play matches," said captain Habibul Bashar yesterday.

Coach Dav Whatmore led the proceedings along with his coaching staff where 17 players out of 24 took part in different indoor and outdoor tests.

Left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, pacemen Mashrafee-bin-Mortza, Shahadat Hossain and Tapash Baisya and wicketkeeper Mushfiqur Rahim were absent due to flu while dashing batsman Aftab Ahmed failed to reach in the capital from Chittagong because of the nationwide blockade. Another

Chittagonian Nafis Iqbal was the other player not joining training as he has a recurrent knee injury.

Injured Sakib Al Hasan joined the camp but his conditions will only be cleared after the physio Paul Close's discussion with the local doctors. The young national all-rounder received an injury in his right hand while fielding for Mohammedan during their Premiership Twenty20 match against Brothers Union.

Sakib, however, was confident to get into action the Premier League although he has yet to take the bat in hand since the injury.

First ODI on Feb 4

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday revealed the official tour itinerary of the Tigers' tour of Zimbabwe.

Habibul Bashar's men are expected to leave Dhaka for the southern African nation on January 31 to play all four one-day internationals at the Harare Sports Club ground.

Bangladesh will get just two days' preparation after reaching the Zimbabwean capital on February 1 for the first one-dayer on February 4. The following matches are scheduled for February 6, 9 and 10 respectively.

The BCB also disclosed the schedule of England A team's tour of Bangladesh in February.

The second string English side will arrive in Dhaka on February 14 to play two Tests (four-day) and three limited-overs matches against their Bangladeshi counterparts.

England A will launch their campaign with a 3-day warm-up match at BKS starting from February 17 and then the first four-day game will start from February 22 at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

They travel to Bogra for the second four-dayer from March 1. The first one-dayer of the three-match series is scheduled for March 7.

The last two one-day matches will be played at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium on March 10 and 12.

Australia-England Twenty20 today

Australian all-rounder Andrew Symonds says Tuesday's Twenty20 International against crushed Ashes rivals England will not have any bearing on the following one-day tri-series.

Fans have embraced Twenty20 cricket and there are Twenty20 World Championships next September, but Symonds says the sold-out Sydney Cricket Ground game is "a bit of fun".

"You still do have that element of pride at the end of the day but it doesn't have that complete sense of seriousness about it," Symonds told reporters Monday.

"If you win, you win, but we won't be taking it into the first one-day international saying - 'We rolled England in a Twenty20 game'."

Symonds, while conceding England would be desperate for a win after the historic 5-0 Ashes whitewash last Friday, said he did not think the side, now captained again by Michael Vaughan, should get carried away by the match.

"They're probably in a different place to us at the moment -- we're pretty high on life and they're very disappointed in what they've achieved I'd say," he said.

"But a game like this is a bit of fun and you don't want to be stringing yourself up with your bootlaces if they were to get flogged again Sunday night."

"That's not what the idea of the exercise is."

Symonds said he expected plenty of banter between the two sides and said the light-hearted match would be a perfect return after the Ashes celebrations.

"It should be a bit of fun and both teams will probably have a bit of fun with each other and the crowd and all that sort of thing," he said.

Oldham coming in May

After months of speculation, Oldham Athletic's tour of Bangladesh has been confirmed.

The English Second Division (Coca-Cola League 1) side, currently second in the table, will tour Bangladesh in May to play three matches in Dhaka and Sylhet.

Nicknamed Latics, the century-old club from Greater Manchester, Lancashire will face the Bangladeshi national team in one of their friendlies during the May 7-13 trip as official guests of the Bangladesh Football Federation.

The players and coaches of Latics will also be involved in promotional work with local players. It is likely that a number of Bangladeshi youngsters would be selected to visit the UK for further intensive training at a future date.

Club officials consider the tour as a groundbreaking one which will build multicultural relationships between youth in Bangladesh and the Bangladeshi expatriates living in Oldham.

"This is a fabulous opportunity for us to spearhead a football

campaign in Bangladesh. This year will see the formation of the first professional Football League in the country and I am pleased that the BFF has chosen Oldham Athletic to help build relations between our two countries. We are looking forward to the trip and building long term relationships," club chief executive Alan Hardy at a press conference while officially announcing the tour.

The BFF has appointed ABA, a marketing promotions and sports consultants based in the UK, to organise all travel and accommodation requirements and they have already been approached by companies in UK and abroad.

"Already, the interest shown by business wanting to be involved in this unique tour has been encouraging. A number of companies have approached us regarding sponsorship and I am sure that more companies based in both Bangladesh and UK will be interested in having some involvement," told Brian O'Hearn, development consultant with ABA Marketing.

Despite surrounded by top clubs like Manchester United, Manchester City, Rochdale, Bury, Stockport County, Bolton Wanderers and Huddersfield Town, the Latics have no clear rivals.

Dislike for United is common amongst fans, partly related to their FA Cup losses in the 90s.
