

Hasina declares tougher actions

Indefinite Bangabhaban siege from Jan 14; blockade on Jan 14, 15, 17, 18; hartal threatened on Jan 21, 22

Vowing to resist the 'one-sided' January 22 polls at any cost, Awami League (AL)-led grand alliance leader Sheikh Hasina yesterday announced fresh agitation programmes that include non-stop siege of the Bangabhaban, four-day blockade and two-day hartal.

"The Bangabhaban will be besieged for an indefinite period from January 14 and countrywide blockade will be enforced on January 14-15 and 17-18. If the processes of holding the one-sided election on January 22 is not



stopped despite these programmes, hartal will be enforced on January 21 and 22," Hasina said at a grand rally at Paltan Maidan in the capital.

The AL chief, flanked by former presidents HM Ershad and AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury and key leaders of the grand alliance, also warned of continuing the hartal if the 'one-sided' election is held.

Ershad, Badruddoza, Rashed Khan Menon, Hasanul Haque Inu, Mostafa Amir Faisal and other top leaders of the alliance also spoke at the rally, asking their party workers

Khaleda has not submitted tax papers

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia and 25 other contestants of the upcoming election from seven Barisal constituencies did not submit the statements of their wealth, income and expenditure, and income tax returns yesterday although it was the last date for it.

According to election office sources, only four out of 30 contestants from the Barisal constituencies submitted their documents.

In accordance with the Representation of People Order 1972, the returning officer sent a letter to all the contestants on January 4, asking them to submit several documents within seven days from the last date for withdrawal of candidature (January 3).

The documents include statements for the sources of income for election expenditures, wealth and loans, details of yearly income and

10 RMG units ransacked over rumour of worker's death

Employees of around 20 garment factories in Tejgaon vandalised 10 factories and set fire to several vehicles yesterday following sudden shutdown of a factory and rumours of an employee being killed.

The vandals also took valuables including computers, garment items, furniture and even construction materials from the factories during their rampage.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) formed a 12-member committee to investigate the vandalism.

Sources said the incident took place a day after goons, led by one Mobarak, beat up workers of Padma Poly Cotton Knit Fabrics Ltd and confined five injured workers inside the factory, allegedly on the owner's directive.

The agitators—numbering about 2,500—set fire to over 20 tyres kept in front of the nearby Hamim Garments factory.

"When we were asking the workers to come out and join us, the security guards swooped on us," claimed an agitating employee of Padma factory. However, Nassa officials said, "The demonstrators started throwing brickbats as our employees took some time to join them."

The demonstrators set fire to nine vehicles parked in front of

Nassa Group office and its security guards' room. They stormed into the building and ransacked the offices. They were also seen taking away garments, furniture, computers and other valuables from the office.

Officials of the Nassa Group head office claimed 35 of its employees were injured as they tried to stop the agitating workers from ransacking the offices.

Police arrived in the area and the workers left the spot an hour later. Witnesses claimed police did not take any actions against the dem-

onstrators.

They demonstrators later went to an under-construction building of Padma factory and took construction materials and parts of four covered vans and three cars. They later set fire to a machine in the Padma factory.

Police fired teargas canisters to disperse the agitators during the vandalism.

Meanwhile, the demonstrators tried to resist fire fighters from doing their jobs at Nassa, Padma and Hamim.

SEPARATION OF JUDICIARY SC gives govt 7 days to publish rules

The full bench of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court yesterday ordered the government to publish various rules on separation of the judiciary through gazette notification within a week and remove major hurdles for the separation.

This order came when the attorney general (AG) said it will take more time to make effective various amendments of the rules for separation of the judiciary as the amended rules would be made effective through promulgation of an ordinance.

Visibly angered by the AG's submission, the court asked why the government would amend them anew when the court had already amended all the necessary rules.

The government has already

been given as many as 22 deadlines to implement the 12-point directives of the Supreme Court on the matter, beginning from 1999.

The time extensions were given mostly during the tenure of the BNP-led four-party alliance government.

On November 27 last year, the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, aggrieved at the government's repeated delays, asked the latter to implement the 12 directives within six weeks and submit progress reports on it to the court.

The hearing of this matter took place yesterday when Attorney General AJ Mohammad Ali's submission irked the court once again. The court asked the government not to play 'cat and mouse' with the court.

CA seeks time on poll deferment proposal

President and Chief Adviser (CA) Iajuddin Ahmed sought time to give his decision on election deferment proposal when two advisers yesterday apprised him about the views of two rival political alliances on the January 22 election.

Sources said Advisers Mahbubul Alam and Yasmeen Murshed met the CA at Bangabhaban and discussed the outcomes of the advisers' latest

meetings with BNP Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan and Awami League (AL) General Secretary Abdul Jalil.

After getting a 'go-ahead' signal from BNP, three advisers met Jalil on Tuesday and proposed to defer the election for over a month. But the AL side rejected the idea unless all their demands are met that included resignation of Iajuddin from the post of CA and correction of the voter roll.

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Khaleda asks people to resist bid to foil election
