Akhtar, Asif in WC squad

Pakistan on Wednesday included the fast bowlers Shoaib Akhtar and Mohammad Asif in their 30-man World Cup initial squad, an official said, despite uncertainty over their doping cases.

Akhtar and Asif launched successful appeals last month after a tribunal banned them for two years and one year respectively for testing positive for the banned steroid nandrolone.

A Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) appellate committee absolved them of the charges on the grounds they did not take the banned substances knowingly, but the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has challenged the lifting of the ban.

Nonetheless, the PCB was adamant the players were free to play. Asif is with the Pakistan team in South Africa, while Akhtar is expected to fly out on Thursday after he was named as a replacement.

"As far as we are concerned both Asif and Akhtar are free to play. We will cross the bridge when it comes," chief selector Wasim Bari told AFP.

Another paceman, Shabir Ahmed, who was last month cleared after serving a one year ban over illegal bowling action, is also among the probables.

Pakistan face the West Indies in the opening match of the World Cup on March 13 at Jamaica. Inzamam-ul-Haq was already named to lead the side while a final 15-man squad will be announced next month.

Pakistan won the World Cup in Australia in 1992.

HASANUZZAMAN HITS FIRST CENTURY

Big guns cruise

The Kai-Altech Premier Cricket League began under brilliant sunshine with Hasanuzzaman glittering most in a blazing hundred but all three opening day's matches proved to be mismatches at different venues yesterday.

Despite the threat of bad weather, only one match was curtailed due to dense fog where last year runners-up Sonargaon Cricketers shot out newcomers Partex Sporting Club for a paltry 44 to secure an eight wicket-victory at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium.

Chasing their hat-trick title, Old DOHS made a flying start with a comfortable seven-wicket victory over other newcomers Young Pegasus at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

Victoria Sporting Club rode on Hasanuzzaman's unbeaten 129 to register an emphatic nine-wicket win against Indira Road Krira Chakra at BKSP.

DOHS-PEGASUS

New ball bowlers Shahadat Hossain and Dollar Mahmud capitalised on the conditions to wrap up the Pegasus innings for 126 after

DOHS skipper Akram Khan made no mistake to send his opponents to bat first.

National paceman Shahadat claimed three wickets for 36 while man-of-the-match Dollar, called for Bangladesh's World Cup initial squad, initiated an early collapse with 3-13 to rattle the Pegasus players, most of whom only came in the morning from Rajshahi to play the match.

Tigers opener Mehrab Hossain returned early on four but Tamim Iqbal (54) and Ehsanul Haque (44 not out) associated in a 74-run stand for the second wicket as DOHS posted 128 for three in 36.3 overs.

Like the Twenty20 League there was also a delayed start due to the formal opening ceremony.

SONARGAON-PARTEX

It was a disastrous Premiership debut for Partex when Sonargaon's young paceman Mahbulul Alam returned with figures of five for 24 after Mohammad Ashraf invited the promotees to bat.

Man-of-the-match Mahbulul received perfect support from new ball partner Ashiqur Rahman who claimed 3-15. Pakistani Rashed Hanif was the only batsman to score in double figures with a 37-ball 10.

Sonargaon, however, lost their openers -- Ejaz Ahmed and Al Shahriar -- quickly before cantering to 45 in 10.4 overs.

VICTORIA-INDIRA

A mammoth 186-run opening partnership between Hasanuzzaman and Nasiruddin Faruque shaped Victoria's win after Indira Road managed 190-8 in 50 overs.

Victoria stumbled in the very first over when pacer Sumon Shah removed Golam Mabud, caught by wicketkeeper Mukter Siddique, in the third ball but that was the lone success for Indira as Rosel and Nasiruddin launched a counter-attack.

Hasanuzzaman was in aggressive mood as the right-hander smote 19 boundaries and a six during his 108-ball 129 while Nasiruddin contributed an unbeaten 52 off 93 balls with four hits to the fence as Victoria raced to 191-1 in 33.5 overs.

Earlier, Golam Mowla scored 52 from 73 balls and Arifur Rahman

Four new faces in WC probables

As expected, the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday named its 30-member probables for the World Cup in the West Indies.

There are a few fresh calls and the only big name missing is Nafis Iqbal, the opening batsman under contract with the board who has no chance of recovery from injury.

The new faces, although they hardly look to contest for the final 15-member squad that will make the Caribbean trip, are hard-hitting opener Junaed Siddiquee who sparked in the recently concluded Twenty20 League, Nafis' younger brother Tamim Iqbal who is also a big-hitter, seamer Dollar Mahmud and all-rounder Marshall Ayub.

Significantly, Mohammad Sharif has returned to the national fold after over three years, showing improved performance with both bat and ball following recovery from injury.

Among the 30, wicketkeeper Sahagur Hossain Pavel and top-order batsman Nazmus Sadat were in the probables list for the ICC Champions Trophy but never managed to make it to a national camp.

The squad will be halved in mid-February.

Pace worry for teams

PAK-SA 1st Test today

South Africa and Pakistan both have concerns over their fast bowlers ahead of the first Test of a three-match series starting at Centurion Park Thursday.

Pakistan, already with five fast bowlers in their squad, added a sixth in the controversial Shoaib Akhtar as cover for Umar Gul, who suffered with an ankle injury during the team's warm-up match against the Rest of South Africa at the weekend.

Shoaib, cleared by a Pakistan tribunal after being found guilty of using illegal substances -- together with teammate Mohammad Asif -- was due to leave Pakistan Tuesday and it will be a surprise if he plays in the first Test barely 24 hours after

his arrival. Gul, meanwhile, may still be considered.

While Pakistan contemplate their options, Shahid Nazir advanced a strong claim for inclusion by taking five wickets against the Rest of South Africa on a batsman-friendly pitch in Kimberley.

South Africa are expected to be without Dale Steyn, their fastest bowler, who is likely to be rested after playing a significant role in the host nation's come-from-behind win over India in Cape Town last Saturday.

Steyn missed the second Test against India because of a thigh strain and coach Mickey Arthur said he would probably sit out the Centurion match to give him time to make a full recovery.

Andre Nel is likely to be back in action after recovering from a heel injury.

Former South African fast bowl-

ing great Allan Donald said he was concerned that South Africa's fast bowlers were suffering from a work overload in the run-up to the World Cup.

After three back-to-back Tests against India, South Africa play another three in as many weeks against Pakistan.

"The World Cup should have been our focus," Donald told The Star newspaper. "Ideally a month of preparation should have started now. Instead we are going to put in a lot of miles in the next three Tests and unless we give guys some rest we could be in trouble."

Donald complained that South Africa and Pakistan were the only teams playing Test cricket so close to the World Cup in March and

Onus on racial quotas

South Africa have announced their provisional 30-man squad for the World Cup in the West Indies in March. Their convenor of selectors, Haroon Lorgat, has said that the selectors are very close to finalising the 15 names who will travel to the Caribbean, but denied that colour would be an influence on selection.

Lorgat said that although CSA had set the selectors a target of at least seven players of colour, the team would be selected on merit. "There are just a few nuts and bolts that we have to sort out," he said. "I

would suggest that 13 names are already established and we just need to finalise the last two places.

"I would be over the moon if we could pick seven or more (players of colour), but we're not picking on colour, we're picking the best team."

The squad must be cut to 15 by February 13, and Gerald Majola, CEO of Cricket South Africa, said: "All these players have been involved in high level domestic or international competition, and have also been part of the high performance programme since last season.

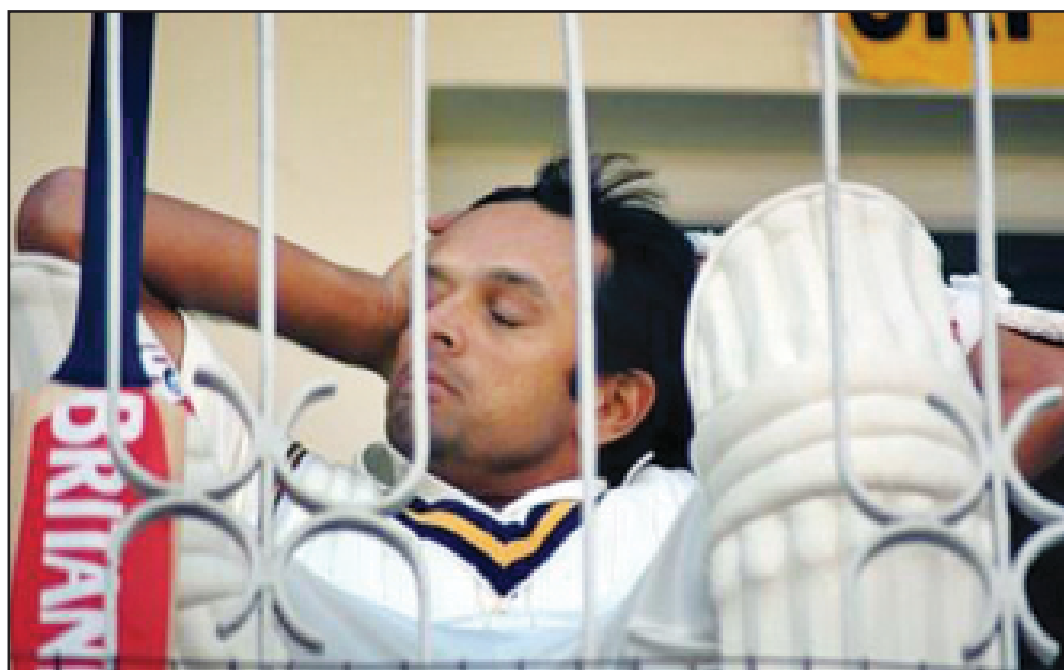
