

Khaleda, Huda, Altaf yet to submit tax papers

BNP Chairperson and immediate past prime minister Khaleda Zia and some other high profile BNP leaders did not submit the statement papers of their wealth, income and expenditure as well as income tax returns within the scheduled deadline of Wednesday.

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia did not submit the statement papers to the respective Returning Officers (RO) in Savar, Dinajpur and Barisal Sadar constituencies, reports our correspondent.

Some high profile BNP leaders including former minister Nazmul Huda (Dohar), Altaf Hossain Chowdhury (Patuakhali-1) and former Army chief Md Mahbubur Rahman did not submit their statement papers to the concerned ROs.

"We are yet to receive the statement papers of Khaleda Zia and Nazmul Huda," said returning officer Mohammad Hanif, who is also the deputy commissioner of Dhaka.

"We will inform the concerned election officials to take actions against those who did not submit the papers," he said.

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Seven more die of cold

Container congestion reaches a new high

The container congestion at Chittagong port surpassed all previous records yesterday and the port authorities fear it would take at least a couple of weeks to clear the jam even if the country's political situation remained calm.

According to port officials, the container congestion at the port is now beyond their control. Never had the port faced such an awkward situation, they said stressing the need for a programme to clear the jam and bring the situation under control.

The port yard is crammed with over 20,000 TEUs (twenty equivalent units) of import containers against the capacity 14,500 TEUs. There is hardly any space left for keeping the arriving containers at the yard, they said.

Nine ships are in the jetties discharging goods while around

two dozen more are at the outer anchorage waiting for permission to berth.

Meanwhile, shipping companies, disappointed with Chittagong port's container and vessel congestion, are diverting their vessels to other routes as they suffer huge losses.

At least four feeder vessels, which used to operate from Chittagong to Singapore, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, have diverted to other routes. A number of the feeder vessels have also been chartered elsewhere as they were incurring losses while plying Chittagong bound routes, sources said.

The number of feeder vessels operating on this route increased to 49 earlier but it fell to 43. Now, there are 39 feeder vessels operating, according to sources.

The feeder vessel operators earlier decided not to carry any perishable goods on Chittagong

bound routes as the turn-around time for their ships was too long. They were incurring huge losses due to this, sources said.

Each ship had to wait several weeks in order to discharge its cargo incurring losses over \$10,000 per day. The feeder vessel operators are also considering imposing a congestion surcharge on Chittagong bound cargo.

Sources said the cargo handling at the port started following the end of 72-hour blockade programme but the huge congestion of containers at the port yard will take some time to clear.

Bangladesh Jute Spinners' Association (BJSJA) yesterday expressed its concern over the recently announced political programme that include blockades and hartals, as the programmes would lead the country's economy "to the brink of collapse".

Bush vows action on Iran, Syria

Beefs up defence in ME, accepts blame for blunders

US President George W Bush vowed Wednesday to crack down on Iranian and Syrian meddling in Iraq and boost defence measures in the Middle East to promote stability throughout the region.

Announcing his latest strat-

egy to tame Iraq, Bush said he had ordered the deployment of an additional carrier strike group and Patriot anti-missile systems in the Middle East to beef up regional security.

Bush told a war-weary US public that he accepts blame for strategic blunders in Iraq and that he is ordering 21,500 more

US troops into battle.

"The situation in Iraq is unacceptable to the American people, and it is unacceptable to me," he said in a speech nearly four years into the conflict. "Where mistakes have been made, the responsibility rests with me."
