Rabiul ton goes awry

DOHS, Abahani keep winning

Rabiul Karim came from nowhere to stand tall at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium with a superb hundred but it was not good enough for newcomers Young Pegasus to halt Abahani's winning streak in the Kai-Altech Premier Cricket League yesterday.

Despite the right-hander's 104, title aspirants Abahani posted to a comfortable 71-run victory when they restricted the youthful side to 204-6 after piling up 275-9 in the stipulated 50 overs at their home ground.

Another giants and defending champions Old DOHS, however, survived an Indira Road scare at BKSP with a scrappy 10-run win to maintain their all-win record in the third round and it was none other than proven fighter Khaled Mahmud who was the hero with an unbeaten 82 and two wickets to his credit.

In the day's other match, a blistering 91 not out by Shahbaj Butt steered Kalabagan Krira Chakra to an easy six-wicket victory against Partex Sporting Club at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium.

ABAHANI-PEGASUS

The team effort by Pegasus' Premiership rookies has already impressed the crowd but the way opener Rabiul batted in reply to a mammoth total, was really valiant.

The Rajshahi lad played with confidence on way to the third hundred in the league after Victoria's Hasanuzzaman and DOHS's Tamim Iqbal while wickets fell at the other end. Rabiul, who was almost undone by a bouncer from Mashrafe-bin Mortuza, embarrassed the Abahani opening bowler in the seventh over when he smashed four consecutive boundaries off the Tigers paceman. Having started the expensive over with a straight-drive, he flicked and edged the ball through to the fence before an exquisite cover-drive. His 120-ball essay was studded with a dozen fours.

Pegasus looked out of contention when they were reduced to 62-4 but Rabiul had an ally in Saif Mahmud to bounce back as the two shared 102 runs for the fifth wicket. Saif was unbeaten on 62 off 99 balls with four hits to the fence.

First-change seamer Mohammad Shahjada was the pick of Abahani bowlers with 3-31.

Abahani who were without three

key players -- Khaled Mashud, Manzarul Rana and Nazmus Sadat -- due to injury, rode on team effort with stand-in captain Tushar Imran top-scoring a chancy 73-ball 56 after opting to bat first, thanks to some poor umpiring.

Pegasus were exuberant in fielding but unfortunately, they dropped some vital catches including two off Tushar.

The other valuable knocks came from opener Zahurul Islam (49 off 40 balls), Nazimuddin (38 off 54 balls), Naeem Islam (40 off 40 balls) and Mashrafe (44 off 40 balls).

DOHS-INDIRA

Former national skipper Mahmud rescued the inserted DOHS from big trouble when the man-of-the-match shared a 70-run partnership with Dollar Mahmud for the eighth wicket. DOHS finished the curtailed 48-over quota on a modest 209-9 from a precarious 98-7.

The veteran right-hander clobbered seven boundaries during his 103-ball knock while Dollar added 25 from 45 balls.

Abdur Razzak, who later played a vital role with his left-arm spin, was the other notable scorer with a run-a-ball 31 that featured three

Flintoff leads from front

All-rounder Andrew Flintoff lifted a jittery England to a drought-breaking three-wicket win over New Zealand in the triangular series one-day international here Tuesday.

England had to work hard to beat New Zealand's modest total of 205 and secure their first victory since arriving in Australia in early November.

Man of the match Flintoff hit 72 not out off 75 balls as England reached the required 206 runs with one ball to spare at Bellerive Oval.

England captain Michael Vaughan, who suffered from hamstring tightness during the match

and is in doubt for Friday's game with Australia in Brisbane, said it was a relief to finally taste victory.

"It was an important day for us all, I knew we had to come out here and play a good game and I knew that we had to win today (on Tuesday), just for the whole momentum of the tour," said Vaughan, who batted with a runner.

"We've had a tough tour, we haven't won any games.

"It's a huge game for us, we've got the season up and running, and we must take the momentum from this game into a big game against the Aussies on Friday."

But it wasn't easy for England.

When Ian Bell fell for 45, England was 138-5 and the game was in the balance. But Flintoff and Paul Nixon (15) put on 60 to guide their side to

within eight runs to win before the latter was run out.

With 17 balls to go, victory seemed a formality, but New Zealand clawed their way back, leaving England chasing four runs in the last over.

Eventually, Flintoff picked up the winning run with a straight drive down the ground off part-time seamer Craig McMillan.

McMillan was needed as injury-plagued Kiwi fast bowler Shane Bond was off the field with back soreness during the latter stages of the England innings.

Flintoff, who also bowled impressively, batted with more restraint than usual and survived some anxious moments as the victory loomed.

Nadir Shah honoured

Cricket umpire Nadir Shah told yesterday that it was an honour for him to become the first Bangladeshi to be picked in International Cricket Council's neutral umpires' panel.

The former cricketer, who has so far conducted seven one-day internationals -- all at home -- since his debut in the Bangladesh-Kenya series in March 2006, has been selected as one of the umpires for the six-nation ICC World Cup Cricket League Division One.

The pre-World Cup tournament for the ICC associate members will be held in Nairobi from January 30-February 7. Canada, Holland, Bermuda, Scotland, Ireland and

Gibbs banned for abuse

South African batsman Herschelle Gibbs was Monday banned for two Test matches for remarks about Pakistan supporters which were picked up by a stump microphone

during the first Test at Centurion Park.

South African captain Graeme Smith said he couldn't condone the comments by Gibbs but said the team was angry about the incidents which led to the player's outburst.

Speaking before International Cricket Council (ICC) match referee Chris Broad made his finding, Smith accused Pakistan supporters of racial abuse.

Gibbs was found guilty by Broad after being charged by ICC chief executive Malcolm Speed of a Level 3 offence for using "language or gestures that offends, insults, humiliates, intimidates, threatens, disparages or vilifies another person on the basis of that person's race, religion, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin."

In addition to Speed's intervention, the Pakistan Cricket Board lodged an official complaint with Broad through their team management.

Gibbs, who was photographed leaving the South African dressing room following the hearing with two beers in his hands, faces a separate Cricket South Africa hearing Tuesday for contravening a clause in the body's code of conduct relating to verbal abuse or conduct "on the basis of race, religion, colour,

descent or national or ethnic origin."

The hearing will be conducted by former judge Mervyn King.

Television viewers heard Gibbs making insulting remarks about Pakistan supporters when a stump microphone picked up what he said to teammates in the centre of the field.

Speaking after South Africa completed a seven-wicket win over Pakistan, Smith hit out at abusive Pakistan supporters, poor security and television companies which allowed conversations on the field to be broadcast.

"There's a lot of anger," he said. "There was quite a lot of racial abuse from the Pakistan fans towards our players and I think that provoked a lot of what happened."

"There was a particular incident where I went down and got security to move guys away from (boundary fielder) Paul Harris. Herschelle was down at third man and he was copping a lot of abuse and I think even racial abuse."

Smith said the television company responsible for the stump mike were to blame for allowing Gibbs's comments to be broadcast.
