

Three killed in road accidents

UNB, Dhaka

At least three people, including two children, were killed in separate road accidents in Sirajganj and Sylhet yesterday.

A Sirajganj report adds: Two children were killed and their mother was injured in a road accident at Moshipur in Sahajadpur upazila yesterday evening.

Police said Noor Mohammad, 10, and his brother Noor Hossain, 8, died on the spot when a Pabna-bound bus from Bogra hit them on Bogra-Nagorbari highway at about 6:00pm.

Their mother was also injured during the accident and was admitted to Sadar Hospital in critical condition.

Another report from Sylhet adds: A woman was killed and her son was injured in a road accident on Dhaka-Sylhet Highway in Dayamari area in Osmanagar upazila yesterday.

Witnesses said Rushna Begum, 45, died on spot and her son Abdul Hamid, 22, was injured as a truck hit them while they were crossing the road at 4:00pm.

Police seized the bus but its driver managed to flee. A case was filed with the police.

DFID, Unicef to help improve sanitation, hygiene for 3cr people

The UK Department for International Development (DFID) and Unicef signed an agreement in the city yesterday to support Bangladesh government in implementing improved sanitation and hygiene programmes to reach 30 million people in 34 districts across the country, says a press release.

For the five-year project from 2007 to 2011, DFID will contribute up to £35 million (Tk 483 crore), Unicef's own contribution will be approximately £4.8 million while the government investment will be around £8.9 million.

Up to 5.1 million people, particularly the poorest, will benefit from year round access to adequate supplies of safe drinking water.

Acting Country Representative of DFID Elizabeth Carriere and Unicef Representative Louis Georges Arsenault signed the agreement.

This agreement was signed to support the joint implementation of the Sanitation, Hygiene Education and Water Supply in Bangladesh

(SHEWA-B) project by Department of Public Health Engineering (DPHE) and Unicef.

Through SHEWA-B, around 1.5 million schoolchildren will benefit from safe water delivery and improved sanitation services to 7,500 primary schools, whilst 4.5 million additional children are to gain from hygiene education in their schools.

Bapa condemns Asia Energy's renewed bid

Bangladesh Paribesh Andolok (Bapa) has condemned the renewed initiative of Asia Energy to take lease of Phulbari Coal Mine by renaming itself as Global Coal Management (GCM).

In a press release issued yesterday, Bapa leaders said by changing the name, Asia Energy is hatching a conspiracy to fulfil its ill design and signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with Peoples Telecom and Information Services Limited which is now under consideration of the Board of Investment.

They demanded immediate ouster of Asia Energy from the country and implementation of the contract signed between the government and the agitating villagers on August 30 of last year.

The statement said atrocities on general students who were agitating to press home their seven-point demand, is nothing but a continuation of political repression on students to curb their rights.

Make alternative shelters for slum dwellers, hawkers before eviction'

Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) yesterday urged the government to arrange alternative shelters for the slum dwellers and hawkers before evicting them.

Acute crisis of transport in Rajshahi Govt College

Acute crisis of buses is hampering study of around 23,775 students of Rajshahi Government College, established 128 years ago.

The students attend classes boarding on only three buses, of which two are rented while some come to college using public buses from neighbouring districts of 50 kilometres distance Natore and Chapainawabganj.

Students and teachers have been demanding that the authorities should purchase more buses as thousands of students are facing hassle to attend classes.

Bozhan Uddin, a 3rd year honours student of physiology department of the college, alleged that every day we come to the college boarding on the jam-packed buses like hanging bats.

Female students suffer most, as there is no arrangement of separate transports for female students, said Farhana, a 2nd year student of Economic department.
