Players still looking

The players' transfer of this season's First Division Cricket League got off to a quiet start as only a few teams took part in the bourse at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

There was a contrast among the players, as only a few put pen to paper with their teams while the majority who showed up from different parts of the country were frantically looking for a team.

Several cricketers were seen with their kits, having just arrived in the capital but with their fate hanging in the balance. The delay in transfer dates has been blamed for their problem.

"We came here from Comilla but my old club refused to keep me. I have approached several (club) officials but none have responded kindly," said one cricketer requesting anonymity.

The advent of 'cheap' and 'free' players have also affected this year's transfers as most clubs now look for young, upcoming players rather than players who would ask for bigger financial packages.

Meanwhile, Jatrabari were among the first teams to make it to the big bowl, signing up a number of players while Surjo Torun signed allrounder James Mobbakil and batsmen Ujjal and Shakil from newly promoted Premiership side Partex.

Lalmatia, Utara Sporting and Eskaton signed a few players apart from newly promoted Sadharan Bima.

The transfers will continue today and will end tomorrow evening.

Gibbs learns fate today

South Africa batsman Herschelle Gibbs is expected to find out on Thursday whether his two-Test ban for making racist comments will be upheld.

Former Australia captain Richie Benaud heard his appeal via telephone on Wednesday and must make a decision by the following day.

The teleconference also involved Gibbs, ICC match referee Chris Broad and their legal representatives.

The third Test against Pakistan begins in Cape Town on Friday.

Benaud, one of the longest-serving members of the ICC Code of Conduct Commission, has the power to increase or decrease Gibbs' ban and his decision is final and binding.

Gibbs' comments were allegedly made after teammate Paul Harris was verbally abused by members of the crowd who were supporting Pakistan in the opening match at Centurion.

He was found guilty of "language or gestures that offends, insults, humiliates, intimidates, threatens, disparages or vilifies another person on the basis of that person's race, religion, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin".

He played in the second Test, which Pakistan won to level the series at 1-1, pending his appeal hearing.

Akhtar fined in Woolmer row

Pakistan express fast bowler Shoaib Akhtar was fined of 2,500 dollars for his alleged misbehaviour with coach Bob Woolmer, who had threatened to resign if disciplinary action was not taken against the speedster.

Team manager Talat Ali imposed the fine on Akhtar only after Woolmer's threat, a Pakistani newspaper reported on Wednesday.

Woolmer had threatened to resign if no action was taken against Akhtar who, he claimed, had misbehaved with him on the second day of the second Test against South Africa at Port Elizabeth, Urdu daily 'Express' said.

The altercation occurred on the ground before the start of the day's play and carried into the dressing room after Akhtar informed the

management that he could not bowl on the second day due to a hamstring problem," the report said.

"When Woolmer learnt about this, he pointedly told Akhtar that if he was not fit he should not have come to South Africa and his absence in the middle of the match would create a lot of problems for the team. This incensed Shoaib who had a war of words with the coach," the report said.

Woolmer is reported to have told Ali that he was going to resign if the matter was not investigated into.

Ali, a former Test player, asked all the other players about the incident and although many of them wanted Akhtar to be forgiven, the team manager decided to fine the bowler.

Akhtar will return home on Friday after obtaining permission from the Pakistan Cricket Board to remain in Johannesburg for two days on personal expenses.

Win lifts Fleming

Booyed by his side's first win of the triangular one-day series, New Zealand captain Stephen Fleming believes his team is poised to build momentum as the World Cup approaches.

"We are hoping to get a couple more (wins) and then get a little bit of momentum towards the end of this tournament," he said.

"It would be great to make the finals of this tournament and then we have another tough series with Australia at home.

"Then when you hit the World Cup you are pretty sure you have covered all your bases and that has really been our plan over the last six months."

Fleming said New Zealand's top order frailty was still a concern and the skipper admitted he was one of the main culprits, his 20 against England continuing his dry run in Australia.

"We've been doing a lot of good things off the field, but it has been worth nothing because our performances have let all that down," he said in Adelaide on Tuesday.

"It has been pretty frustrating for all the people at home because we have played a pretty poor brand of cricket.

"But if we can get a bit of confidence into it -- you've got the likes of (Scott) Styris, Jacob coming back in and performing the way he did, Kyle Mills coming back and the guys that have been competing over here -- then we are not in bad shape," Crocker said.

Rudolph puts SA aside

South Africa batsman Jacques Rudolph is to put his international career on hold to play cricket for Yorkshire after signing a three-year contract with the English county.

Yorkshire have already signed their two permitted overseas players for the 2007 season in Australia fast bowler Jason Gillespie and Pakistan batsman Younis Khan.

However, under the controversial Kolpak ruling, Yorkshire believe Rudolph, 25, will be classed as a 'home' player and be available for selection when the English season starts in April.

"I am very proud to be a Protea and to represent my country. I will, of course, continue playing domestic cricket with the Gestetner Diamond Eagles as a Kolpak player," middle-order batsman Rudolph said in a statement Tuesday.

"This was not a decision to take lightly, and I discussed the matter fully with (national coach) Mickey Arthur and (convenor of selectors) Haroon Lorgat.

"We have all agreed with my view that this experience would be good for my cricket," the left-hander added.

In 35 Tests Rudolph has scored

2,028 runs including a best of 222 not out on debut against Bangladesh in Chittagong in 2003.

Rudolph made his decision after being overlooked by South Africa in favour of Ashwell Prince and Hashim Amla.

However, Cricket South Africa (CSA) officials believe Rudolph could yet return to international cricket following his spell at Yorkshire.

"CSA has nurtured Jacques's talent since he was a teenager, and we regard him as one of our national assets," said CSA chief executive Gerald Majola.

"However, he is only 25 and the general view is that with this added experience in county conditions he will become a more rounded player.

"We wish him all the best and are confident that he will return as an even better cricketer."

Rudolph's most recent international appearance was against Sri Lanka in August and this could yet cause a problem with his registration.

Under the rules of the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB), to qualify as a Kolpak signing a player must not have played international cricket or first-class cricket in another country -- except as an overseas player -- within the 12 months prior to the start of the season.

However, Yorkshire chief executive Stewart Regan said: "The ECB

have confirmed they are not able to enforce that, so as long as he has signed the declaration (not to play for South Africa) he is perfectly fine.

He has given us an undertaking that he will not seek to play for South Africa while he is under contract with Yorkshire."

Rudolph's signing comes after some difficult moments in the off-

even though he had three years left on his contract and had been offered the county's captaincy after Adams's U-turn.

The European Court of Justice handed down the Kolpak ruling in 2004. In cricketing terms it means a player who is a national of a country which has an association agreement with the European Union, such as South Africa, and is in possession of a valid UK work permit, is treated as if he were a British or other European citizen and can therefore qualify as a domestic player for county cricket.

Yorkshire were the last English county to insist on selecting players born solely within their own boundaries, a policy that was only formally abandoned in 1992 when India's Sachin Tendulkar arrived at Headingly.

Rudolph's decision to put the county ahead of international commitments is not unprecedented.

During the mid-1970s legendary Yorkshire opening batsman Geoff Boycott opted out of England duty for three years after being overlooked for the captaincy of his country.

Yorkshire finished sixth out of nine teams in the first division of the County Championship last season, narrowly avoiding relegation.
