## Hughes can be Fergie successor

Manchester United captain Gary Neville is glad that former England manager Sven-Goran Eriksson did not become the manager at the club.

And the influential club skipper believes Blackburn manager Mark Hughes, a former big name at Old Trafford, could go on to replace Sir Alex Ferguson when the Scot finally steps down.

Neville played with a clutch of one-time United players now in management but has named Hughes as the most suited to following in Ferguson's footsteps.

Ferguson performed a U-turn in 2002 after claiming he would retire at the end of the 2001/02 season and instead signed a new deal with the club.

Although there is no fixed date for his departure at the moment, the speculation over his successor is never far away and Neville's backing is sure to put Hughes' name firmly back in the frame.

The England full-back told the Daily Mirror: "Playing with the likes of Bryan Robson and Steve Bruce you always thought they'd go on to be managers.

"Some may have thought one of them would be our next manager but I certainly didn't think Sparky the Hughes would be a manager yet out of the three.

"He's probably now the most outstanding candidate for it.

"He really seems to have taken to management."

## Nice president steps down

The president of Nice football club, Maurice Cohen, stepped down from his post after Wednesday's 1-0 defeat to Toulouse amid pressure from majority shareholders.

"A meeting of shareholders took place this afternoon at the request of two of them, Franck Giudicelli and Marcel Gobert, who hold 57 percent of shares. They demanded my resignation," Cohen said.

"Franck Giudicelli will take over the role of club president from tomorrow (Thursday)," he added.

Nice are currently second from bottom of the French first division, having won just three games of 21 played for 16 points, one ahead of Sedan.

## Drogba named goodwill ambassador

Ivory Coast and Chelsea footballer Didier Drogba was named a goodwill ambassador for the United Nations Development Programme on Wednesday, joining other luminaries from the sport such as Ronaldo and Zinedine Zidane.

The 28-year-old, who signed for the English premiership club for a reported 24 million pounds (47 million dollars, 36 million euros) in 2004, will receive symbolic earnings of one dollar per year for his work in UNDP's anti-poverty campaign.

"I have been given opportunities to succeed in life, but I constantly think about the ones who did not have this chance. We all need to contribute to help defeat poverty," Drogba said.

He will focus in particular on the fight against HIV/AIDS in Africa and the need to change male attitudes there.

"As a man and a role model for many young boys in Africa I will do my best to promote the right messages to other men and boys to stop the pandemic," he said.

## Beast delights Wenger

Arsene Wenger believes Brazilian midfielder Julio Baptista is finally ready to play a key role in Arsenal's challenge for honours.

Baptista, nicknamed the Beast, had struggled to make an impact with Wenger's side since his pre-season loan move from Real Madrid.

But he showed he is starting to adapt to English football as his double strike sparked Arsenal's superb fightback to earn a 2-2 draw in the first leg of the League Cup semifinal against Tottenham on Wednesday.

Baptista could have been forgiven for thinking he was in for another dispiriting night after his own goal following Dimitar Berbatov's early strike gave Tottenham a 2-0 lead at White Hart Lane.

But the former Sevilla player made himself a hero with the Arsenal fans by scoring twice from close range in the second half to put his side back in the tie ahead of next Wednesday's second leg.

Wenger said: "Julio Baptista has shown again what a player he is. He scored an own goal, but instead of feeling sorry for himself he scored two for us."

"He is mentally a very strong player and he will get his chance to play more as the season goes on."

"It took him four or five months to adapt, but he is in my mind."

Wenger has allowed Baptista to adapt gradually and the League Cup has been his training ground.

He obviously enjoys the competition after scoring four times in Arsenal's 6-3 win at Liverpool in the quarterfinals.

"He likes it here and likes the atmosphere inside the squad," Wenger added. "It is a different game than in Spain but he has enough physical and mental strength to adapt."

"You can play him anywhere there is a hole. He has the sense to get into the box from deep positions when it is needed, so the central role is more suited for him."

Wenger, who may be without Alexander Hleb for several weeks after he suffered a hamstring injury, once again fielded an inexperienced side as he kept faith with his young players and he was rewarded with an heroic display.

"It is great for the confidence of the young players to know that, away from home, they can come back after a little bit of a shaky start," Wenger said.

"Many teams so young would have crumbled at 2-0, but we still had going and came back."

"I compared the game to Anfield because in that match everything went for us, but in the first half everything went against us, so it was a good test of the heart and mental strength of the team."

"I'm very proud of that because

is an important quality at the top level."

Tottenham are unbeaten in their 12 matches in the League, FA and UEFA Cups this season, but there was an overwhelming sense of resignation from boss Martin Jol.

He admitted his side had squandered a glorious chance to take a giant step towards their first final in five years and claimed Berbatov's groin injury in the first half was decisive.

"We are very disappointed but we only have ourselves to blame. We have to learn from this."

"In the first 25 minutes we were outstanding but when Berbatov went off that had a big effect. He was holding the ball up and we missed him when he went off."

"We needed to get a third goal but we couldn't keep the ball in the second half and they kept coming back."

"Even then it needed two mistakes from us for them to score, but that is another thing we need to learn. If you lose the momentum you can concede goals."

Berbatov had headed Tottenham into the lead after 12 minutes before Baptista deflected Tom Huddlestone's free-kick into his own net nine minutes later.

But Wenger's young guns refused to accept defeat and Baptista turned in Emmanuel Eboue's cross after 64 minutes before sliding in to equalise in the 77th minute.

## Mancini feeling Blue?

Chelsea owner Roman Abramovich is lining up Inter Milan coach Roberto Mancini to replace Jose Mourinho in case the Blues manager leaves at the end of the season, according to a report Thursday.

Former Sampdoria, Lazio and Italy striker Mancini is in demand after leading Italian champions Inter to the top of Serie A this season with an 11-point cushion.

And despite recently pledging his future to the club, Mancini - who is lining up Mancini to come in and

worked as an assistant to Sven-Goran Eriksson when the Swede was in charge of Lazio - is rumoured to be tempted by a move to the Premiership.

Abramovich and Mourinho have not seen eye to eye of late, mainly over the Russian billionaire's refusal to sanction the signing of new players during the January transfer window.

The Sun claimed Thursday that despite peace talks having taken place, Mourinho is secretly planning his exit from Stamford Bridge for the end of the season.

Mourinho said: "He asked me if I was staying and my answer was I think so."

However Terry has yet to sign a deal.

The Times newspaper further fuelled the speculation by claiming the contracts of all of Mourinho's assistants are being allowed to run down until their expiration in the summer.

The report said Chelsea have made no attempt to discuss new terms with Mourinho's inner circle, which includes assistant managers Steve Clarke and Balselmo Brito, goalkeeping coach Silvino Lauro, fitness coach Rui Faria and head scout Villas Boas.

The latter three followed Mourinho to Chelsea from FC Porto after he led the Portuguese giants to Champions League glory, and Mourinho has stated he would not work at the club without them.

The Portuguese is understood to be as equally fond of Clarke.

A former Chelsea player who made 421 appearances, Clarke was presented with an award in mid-week to honour the 20th anniversary of his arrival at the club.

However Abramovich's advisers have already proposed that Clarke, the last remaining link at the club to former Chelsea chairman Ken Bates, be replaced with Portsmouth's director of football, Avram Grant.

That possibility has led Mourinho to warn Abramovich of meddling in his appointments.

Mourinho played a major role in making sure that Clarke, the club's former youth team coach, was handed a three-year contract although no extension has yet been discussed.

## Defensive backing for Becks, Ron

Real Madrid's Spanish international defenders Ivan Helguera and Michel Salgado on Wednesday leapt to the defence of out-of-favour team-mates David Beckham and Ronaldo.

"Ronaldo's one of the best in the world, if not the best. I don't think it's fair, the situation he is in," Helguera told Report Marca.

Helguera himself was also frozen out at the start of the season and had to train with Real's reserve team before winning over Italian coach Fabio Capello.

He said he thought Ronald and Beckham had not been well-treated and still had something to offer.

"I also went through that. You have to be fair and respectful with people who try to give their all, especially a club as great as Real Madrid," added Helguera.

Salgado said at a press conference on Wednesday that it might be rash to sideline a clutch of players with half the season still to play.

"The coach decides who will play more often and who less but this is a squad and to leave three or four players on the outside five months before the end of the season is not good for the squad," he said.

Beckham had only started a handful of league games this season prior to announcing his summer move to Los Angeles Galaxy on January 11.

Capello responded two days later by saying that Beckham would never play again for the Spanish giants.

Ronaldo, his appearances blighted first by injury and now by the fact the club want to get him off their books, with AC Milan apparently chasing the three-time World Player of the Year, is also now on the outside looking in.

"This is a decision not by the players but by the coach and the club. I can't say more than it's a luxury to leave out a player of this type (Ronaldo), but I'm sure they have their reasons," added Salgado.

Capello has turned his attention in the last month to new signings Gonzalo Higuain and Fernando Gago as Real bid to win a major title for the first time in four seasons.

The young Argentine pair arrived during the winter transfer window and have made an immediate impression, which will heighten the discomfort of Beckham and Ronaldo, and the exit of the two 'galacticos' now seems imminent.

confidence will be high when I play there in the final."

Shevchenko has endured a miserable time since his pre-season move to the English champions.

His failure to reproduce the form he showed with Milan led to him being dropped by Jose Mourinho amid repeated reports that he had been signed by his friend Roman Abramovich, the club's billionaire owner, rather than the Chelsea manager.

But Shevchenko looked more like his old self against Wycombe and his hard-working display earned praise from Mourinho just four days after the Portuguese coach had pointedly ignored him as he walked off the pitch after Chelsea's 2-1 Community Shield defeat against Liverpool.

Shevchenko has scored in both his previous matches at the Millennium Stadium, but has not finished on the winning side.

He was on target for Ukraine in a drawn 2001 World Cup qualifier against Wales and then claimed his first goal for Chelsea at the same venue in their 2-1 Community Shield defeat against Liverpool in August.

Shevchenko said: "I have scored in my last two visits to Cardiff but I have yet to win there. It is important that if I score we get the right result.

"The stadium has been good for me, but not for my teams. Still, my

happiness and I think this game can give him a bit of that."

"The process (of adapting to Chelsea) was a frustration for everybody. Especially for him and also for me."

"For him because he wants to perform and give everything for the team and for me because I wait for more and in some matches he was a bit frustrating."

Mourinho's own future remains uncertain but, publicly at least, he maintains that Abramovich's decision to turn down his repeated requests for a new defender will not affect his situation at Stamford Bridge.

"I keep saying the support (of Abramovich) has no relation to no signings," he said.

"I worked for Leira in Portugal where we had no money to pay the salaries on time. So it is not about money."

"Also Ricardo (Carvalho) is back, it is not so dramatic as it was one month ago. One month ago is much more difficult than it is now. That is why we don't need a new player so desperately as we did two or three weeks ago."

"If we have a little bit of luck with no more injuries, I think we can do it without any more players."
