

FIGHTING POVERTY WITH EDUCATION

Children's edn takes priority in Burichang

Poverty could not hold back Maya Debnath, daughter of a rickshawpuller, from continuing her education. She didn't even miss a single class at her school. According to her teachers, she is also doing well in her studies.

Maya, a student of class V at Burichang Government Primary School, also helps her family earn some money as her ailing father Khokon Debnath finds it difficult to make ends meet.

She along with her siblings makes paper packets and sells them to nearby shops. Her younger sister Shikha is also a student of class two at the same school.

Maya lives in a thatched house with her parents, which is located just behind the school. They have no property except this house. But she did not surrender to poverty. She manages to keep her and her sister's education on track through selling paper packets.

Her source of inspiration is her mother. "My mother told me that poor students can also do many things like others through education," said Maya.

"Our schoolteachers also inspire us a lot to pursue studies," she added. Mohammad Yunus, headmaster of Burichang Primary School, said they give old answer sheets to Maya's family and they made packets from the sheets in a particular time of a day. Maya then sells the packets to different shops, which helps meet educational expenses of the two sisters.

Against all the odds, the two sisters did not miss a single class and they are doing well in their studies, he told a group of journalists who visited several schools in Burichang recently under a project titled 'Communication activities for children and women development'.

Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha (BSS) is executing the third phase of the project with the financial assistance of Unicef.

There are many other families like Maya's in Burichang, Comilla, who

give topmost priority to their children's education, although they are suffering from grinding poverty.

The enrolment rate in the schools in Burichang is about 96 percent and the mothers play a vital role in this regard, according to a survey on primary education.

A total of 46,816 children, aged between 6 and 10, are currently enrolled at a total of 137 government, registered non-government and community primary schools where the percentage of girls is higher than that of boys.

The dropout rate has also decreased to 5 percent, it added.

Government scholarship programmes also contribute to the rise in the attendance in the primary schools, said many schoolteachers and parents in Burichang.

If the government increases the number of such scholarships, many parents will refrain from sending their children to workplaces, they observed.

Mohammad Yunus said a total of 59 students, out of 61, have com-

pleted the primary level last year.

He also said the dropout rate of the school is only three percent and the number of dropout has decreased in the last couple of years.

He, however, said the attendance rate decreases during the harvesting period as many parents engage their children in the work at fields.

"But we are trying to increase the number and we often hold meetings with the parents to encourage them to send their children to schools," he said.

Upazila Education Officer Sanchita Das said about 96 percent of children in Burichang are now going to school and they are trying to raise the figure to 100 percent.

However, she thinks quality teachers and structural development of the schools have contributed to the rise in enrolment in the primary schools.

"We are trying to enhance the quality instead of quantity," she said.

A fire broke out at a television assembling unit at Pallabi in the city yesterday evening, destroying all electronic equipment and tools.

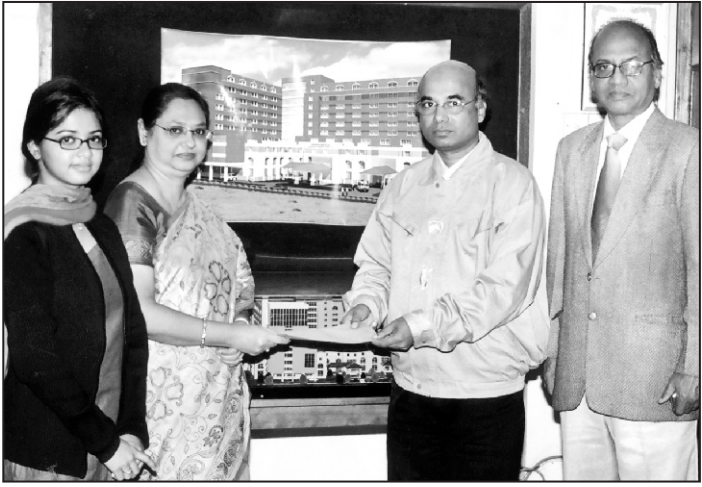
Fire brigade source said the cause of the blaze, which started at around 5:45pm, could be known immediately. But they suspect that an electrical short-circuit might

Two killed in Sirajganj road accident

At least two people were killed and 15 others were injured in a road accident on the Dhaka-Pabna highway at Moshipur in Shahzadpur Upazila of Sirajganj district yesterday.

Police and witnesses said the accident took place at around 2:30pm when a Pabna bound truck collided head-on with a Dhaka bound bus, killing Saidul Islam, 35, helper of the truck on the spot and injuring 16 others.

Among the injured, an unidentified person, aged about 60, succumbed to his injuries on the way to hospital, while the rest 15 were taken to different hospitals and clinics in Shahzadpur and Sirajganj town.

Drive against illegal rickshaws in Rajshahi

Rajshahi city has become almost rickshaw-free following the launching of a drive against illegal rickshaws by law enforcement agencies.

The city dwellers witnessed an unprecedented crisis of rickshaw and suffered a lot for want of rickshaws yesterday.

Police sources said they have launched the drive against the rickshaws that do not have valid licences and carry lamps.

Police seized hundreds of rickshaws from different city points

in the last several days, rickshaw-pullers said.

Ashraf Mia, 35, a rickshawpuller at city's Sagarpara, was seen waiting on the office premises of Ward-21 Commissioner to get back his rickshaw.

Police on Thursday seized his rented rickshaw, as it had no valid licence from Rajshahi City Corporation (RCC), Ashraf said.

Another rickshawpuller Jamshed of Shaheb Bazar area alleged that the on-duty traffic police have seized the seat of his rickshaw. He has failed to recover

his rickshaw seat, the only earning source of his seven-member family.

Meanwhile, RCC authorities said around 10,000 rickshaws were registered with the corporation while more than 25,000 rickshaws have been plying illegally.

The rickshawpullers and owners demanded immediate end to the drive against small-earning rickshaws pullers.

Rajshahi Metropolitan Police sources said their drive would continue until they receive further notice from the higher authority in this regard.

Global warming to speed up

A draft UN report projecting a big rise in temperatures this century is likely to add fuel to the debate about whether the world is facing dangerous global warming, experts said yesterday.

The draft, by 2,500 scientists and due for release in Paris on February 2, is expected to warn of more heat waves, floods, droughts and rising seas linked to greenhouse gases released mainly by burning fossil fuels, scientific sources say.

World leaders, including former US President George Bush, signed a UN Climate Convention in 1992 with an overriding goal of stabilizing greenhouse gases at levels preventing "dangerous (human) interference with the climate system."

However, it did not define "dangerous" and the issue has been a vexed point in efforts to slow climate change ever since.

"The new report should fuel the

debate" among scientists and in the media, said Jan Corfee-Morlot, who heads work on climate change at the Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD).

"For politicians, the question of what is dangerous is not formally on a negotiating agenda, but it is in the background."

The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) is expected to predict a temperature rise of 2 to 4.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels by 2100 with a "best estimate" of a rise of 3 degrees C, scientific sources said.

That is a narrower range than the 1.4-5.8C in the previous IPCC report in 2001 -- even the minimum 1.4 rise would be the biggest in a century for 10,000 years. Temperatures have risen about 0.6C since 1900.

SLOWER SEARISE

Among good news, the new report will narrow and revise down forecast sea rises this century to less than half a meter from 9 cm to 88 cm (3.5-34.5 inches) in the 2001 report.

The European Union and many environmental groups want the world to cap any rise in temperatures at 2 degrees C over pre-industrial levels, saying such a rise would cause dangerous changes to nature such as more heat waves.

"The IPCC cannot say what is dangerous because that is a political judgment," said Bert Metz, a climate expert at the Dutch Environmental Assessment Agency.

"But it gives the ingredients for

the politicians to draw conclusions...as the EU has done."

Corfee-Morlot said it might be easier to set targets such as limiting the concentrations of carbon dioxide or temperature rises than to define dangerous benchmarks.

Inuit peoples say a melting of the Arctic ice is already "dangerous" for their hunting culture, for instance, while Russia might benefit from a slight rise in temperatures because of fewer deaths from cold and higher yields of some crops.

A 2006 report by Nicholas Stern, the chief British government economist, projected a rise of 3 C would mean that between 1 billion and 4 billion more people would suffer water shortages and put an extra 150 million to 550 million people at risk of hunger.

Other experts say the risks have been exaggerated.

"I don't think the IPCC will reflect the sense of catastrophe that has built up in the climate change debate," said Bjorn Lomborg, the Danish author of "The Skeptical Environmentalist."

Under the Kyoto Protocol, the UN plan for fighting global warming, 35 industrial nations have agreed to cut emissions by 5 percent below 1990 levels by 2008-12.

President George W Bush pulled the United States out of the protocol in 2001, saying it would damage the U.S. economy and wrongly exempted developing nations from the first phase.
