

KABADDI WORLD CUP Bangladesh exit from semis

Bangladesh bowed out of the second Kabaddi World Cup when they crashed to a 48-22 defeat to hosts and defending champions India in the semifinal yesterday morning.

Undisputed kabaddi kings India, in a repeat of the first World Cup final, were pitted against Iran in the final last night at the Karnala Sports Academy in Panvel, near Mumbai.

Bangladesh, who won all their group matches, moved into the semis with a 30-15 win against Nepal in the quarterfinals on Thursday. Asiad and South Asian Games bronze medallists Bangladesh also took exit from the last four in 2005, losing to Iran.

Iran beat Japan 43-14 in the other semi.

Pakistan, one of the game's powerhouses, did not participate in the event due to visa problems.

In the other quarterfinals, India beat Malaysia 68-21, Iran beat Thailand 34-4 and Japan beat Sri Lanka 31-20.

Eleven Stars defeated Notun Bangla Krira Chakra by 33 runs in the Second Division Cricket League at the Gaibandha Stadium yesterday.


Eleven Stars elected to bat after winning the toss and scored 127-9 in the stipulated 25 overs.

Nitol-Tata to rescue BFF?

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) may find it hard to meet its expectation of sponsorship money for the B. League -- the inaugural Professional Football League -- which kicks off on February 15.

The BFF's initial target was earning about 2.5-crore taka from a major sponsor and five co-sponsors but with less than three weeks to go, it has yet to confirm a penny.

The federation has a marketing agent, India-based Leisure Sports Management, but it looked odd for the game's governing body in the country to sleep over the issue and entirely depend on the foreign organisation.

The league was scheduled to start last year but has been delayed

due to political situation and club pressures. Now it seems that the federation, which did not make any move to attract sponsors, itself is trying to make 'sponsorship' an issue to further defer it.

The officials of Leisure have arrived and even after two days, have yet to say anything about progress.

It was learned that most of the big corporate houses have showed their disinterest for sponsoring in football mainly due to the incompetence of BFF officials.

"We cannot rely on the BFF because they have really not told us about the pros and cons of league. We also do not know what's the future of it, whether the federation would run it next year or not," said an ad-firm official who handles a big corporate house.

He added that his client is not interested to make a big deal but might go for a small amount.

It seems that the BFF, which at the present does not even have a tournament committee, has not made a presentation plan to lure sponsors.

However, Nitol-Tata, who sponsored the National Football League for three consecutive years before not renewing the contract, might salvage the BFF from its blushes.

It was learned that the Leisure management has talked with Nitol-Tata high-ups as a priority for their past involvement and the organisation has agreed to be the major sponsor but for a much lower amount than the federation had expected.

Sources said that Nitol-Tata is prepared to spend about Tk 60-70 lakh and if the BFF agrees, it would make the deal within a couple of days.

The BFF expects 1.25-crore from the major sponsor and Tk 25 lakh each from the co-sponsors.

Ntini, Kallis on fire

Mohammad Yousuf saved Pakistan from total embarrassment as his team were bowled out for 157 on the first day of the series-deciding third and final Test against South Africa at Newlands Friday.

Yousuf was last man out for a sparkling 83, made off 90 balls, in an otherwise dismal batting performance.

Makhaya Ntini and Jacques Kallis took four wickets each as Pakistan collapsed after being sent in to bat.

Yousuf and Mohammad Sami shared the only worthwhile partnership of the innings, putting on 60 for the seventh wicket off only 58 balls.

Contenders march on

Last year's runners-up Sonargaon Cricketers bounced back from a disappointing defeat in the previous round to trounce Young Pegasus by eight wickets in the sixth round of the Kai-Altech Premier Cricket League at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium yesterday.

Title aspirants Mohammad also made an easy sail to follow unbeaten Abahani in the table along with Sonargaon when they clinched a 96-run victory over Indira Road Krira Chakra at BKSP.

Fresh from a six-wicket success against Sonargaon in the fifth round, Victoria kept their winning run but not before facing a tough resistance from newcomers Partex Sporting Club on way to 14-run win in a high scoring match at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium.

SONARGAON-PEGASUS

Seamer all-rounder Mohammad Sharif could not play the first match after the good news of his return to the national team due to cold but

saw his side Sonargaon Cricketers strongly recover from their first defeat in the competition.

Discarded opener Al Shahriar fell nine runs short of what would have been his first hundred in the meet but his 172-run opening stand with Mehrab Hossain Opee helped Sonargaon score 183-2 in 40.3 overs in reply to promotees Pegasus' 181.

Man-of-the-match Shahriar smote thirteen boundaries in his 135-ball knock while Mehrab smashed eight fours and a six on way to a 95-ball 69.

Earlier, coin-favoured Pegasus thrived on Saif Mahmud's 59 off 98 balls to put up a moderate total after a top-order collapse initiated by rival new ball pair Mahbubul Alam and Ashiqur Rahman, both picking up two wickets each.

MOHAMMEDAN-INDIRA

Mohammedan missed skipper Habibul Bashar from a stomach upset but it could not affect their performance at all.

Man-of-the-match Faisal Hossain led a brilliant middle order surge with a 74-ball 67 that featured six boundaries as Mohammedan

piled up 276-9 in the stipulated 50 overs. Wicketkeeper Sahagir Hossain and in-form Sakib Al Hasan chipped in with 41 and 40 runs respectively. Stand-in skipper Aftab Ahmed hit a run-a-ball 28 that produced three fours and two sixes.

Left-arm paceman Manjurul Islam caused an early damage to wrap up Indira Road, which decided to field first after winning the toss, for 180 in 44.5 overs despite a 110-ball 56 by opener Ashiqur Rahman.

Manjurul picked up three for 20 in seven overs while Hasibul Hossain was pick of the attack claiming four wickets conceding 44 runs in 6.5 overs.

VICTORIA-PARTEX

There was a battle between two Pakistani imports at Dhanmondi where Rashed Hanif's blazing 77-ball 97 went in vain as Partex gave up their brilliant chase of 296 to win after folding for 281 with nine balls to spare.

Rashed and Rafiqul Islam (60 off 61 balls) put on 94 for the fourth wicket stand to give Partex a platform but the tail failed to complete the task.

India rest key men

Lara might play 3rd ODI today

Favourite is a position the Indian cricket team does not like being in, but by resting four key players for the third ODI against West Indies at Chennai on Saturday, the management has sent the message across that they're confident of clinching the series.

Sourav Ganguly, Zaheer Khan, Mahendra Singh Dhoni and Harbhajan Singh will not play -- Gautam Gambhir and Robin Uthappa will open -- and there is the likelihood that Yuvraj Singh will return after a lengthy injury lay-off.

Early last year, India were nearing the point where their World Cup

aspirations seemed quite grounded. As it stands now, matters have changed a little. Both Greg Chappell and Rahul Dravid have clearly identified batting as the area of concern.

Saturday's match holds plenty for India's young guns, namely Gambhir, Uthappa, and Suresh Raina, back in the side after a disastrous past few months that have yielded just 183 runs at 15.25 from 15 games. Uthappa has plenty to prove ahead of the World Cup.

In recent times, Gambhir has shown few signs of being 25 and saddled with the pressure of filling Sachin Tendulkar's shoes, and his innings at Nagpur was one to derive positives from. With Virender Sehwag struggling, India needs a

leadoff man with unmistakable aggressive intent, and Gambhir and Uthappa -- riding on a successful Ranji Trophy season -- must prove that they can do the job. Dinesh Karthik gets the chance to impress behind the stumps, and his batting performances recently have shown he's got the stomach for a fight. Yuvraj had a lengthy stint in the nets, and looked good. He's been analysed by the medical staff, and Dravid sounded confident when talking of his chances. His form is crucial to India's World Cup chances, and flexibility in the field here will be a boon.

Every team has its flaws -- just as the English -- but India's bowling, for so long the flaw, has been its

Astle retires suddenly

Veteran batsman Nathan Astle announced his retirement on Friday, shocking his New Zealand teammates and further weakening their fragile batting line-up just weeks away from the World Cup.

The 35-year-old, New Zealand's second most prolific one-day scorer behind skipper Stephen Fleming, said he was struggling with motivation for the tournament after patchy form in recent seasons.

"I have been fighting this day for about eight months," Astle said in a statement.

"I so desperately wanted to go to my fourth World Cup, but deep down inside I knew that I was lacking motivation and the enjoyment levels were just not there," he said.

He said his enthusiasm first

faltered last year but he soldiered on because of a desire to play in his fourth World Cup. But a month ago "it really started to hit home that this was no longer the place for me".

Coach John Cummiskey said the decision came out of the blue, describing Astle as a "great player and a great team player".</
